The first time in the history of Manchester high school four generations have successfully completed their high school courses. ## Ackerson Addition To Become Reality 401 Cast Ballots

Four hundred and one voters went to the polls Monday to cast their ballots on the school bond issue. Dan Boutell was elected to succeed himself as a member of the school board. There were 276 votes for him and 25 write ins and throw outs.

Proposition 1—Shall the Board of Education be authorized to dispose of the one-room school building and site primarily known as the Pleasant Lake School of former School District 1, Freedom township? There were 331 Yes and 66 No.

Proposition 2—Dealing with the limitation on the total amount of taxes to be assessed against all property in the school district, for all purposes except taxes levied for the payment of interest and principal on obligations incurred prior to December 8, 1952, be increased 3 mills of the assessed valuation, as equalized, for a period of 20 years for the purpose of providing a debt retirement fund to pay the principal and interest on bonds not to exceed \$200,000, for the erecting and furnishing an addition to the Nellie Ackerson Elementary school and remodeling the intermediate school. There were 244 Yes and 154 No.

Proposition 3—Shall Manchester school district borrow \$200,000 and issue its bonds for the erecting and furnishing the addition, etc. 269 Yes and 143 No.

Proposition 4—Shall the Board of Education be authorized to transfer the balance of the 1945 debt retirement fund of \$667 to the Building and Site? 255 Yes and 67 No.
