Local Teacher Gets Scholarship To Driver Ed

Willard J. Becker, a teacher at Manchester High School, is one of 70 state teachers awarded all-expense scholarships from Automotive Club of Michigan to attend the 30th Driver Education Institute at University of Michigan, August 4-15.

Satisfactory completion of the two-week session, featuring both classroom and behind-the-wheel instruction, will qualify teachers as driver-training instructors for state secondary schools.

The institute, sponsored twice each year by the University, the State Department of Public Instruction and Auto Club, have graduated more than 2,000 driver instructors since the course was initiated in 1939.

This year's graduates will join 1,200 full and part-time driving teachers who will instruct an estimated 100,000 students in Michigan during the school year. Last year 90,000 students completed the course, and existing prerequisites for drivers under 18 years of age. School officials state that 200 new teachers will be required this year to handle the increased load and serve as replacements.

Instructors at the institute will include Alan A. Vesnali of the University staff and members of Auto Club's safety and traffic department.

In a public statement on July 16, Prosecuting DeVine said, "Lillie has materially advanced the cause of law enforcement in the county," and that the Department is now "well organized and Sheriff Lillie is making increasing use of modern investigative and administrative techniques."

Shots Reduce Polio Deaths

Immunization continues to reduce death and crippling from polio, the Michigan Department of Health reports.

During the first six months of this year, only ten cases of paralytic polio and one death were reported, as contrasted with 16 paralytic cases and two deaths during the first half of 1957.

Since the polio vaccine was first tested in 10 Michigan counties in 1954, there has been a steady decline in the widespread use of polio vaccine had out crippling cases to 121 and deaths to 12.

NEED 3 SHOTS. The heartening reduction in polio deaths and crippling can continue only if parents make sure that their children receive the full three doses of vaccine, beginning at the age three months, explains Dr. F. S. Leeder, director of Disease Control, Records and Statistics of the state health department.

"If the 200,000 children who will be born in Michigan this year are not properly immunized, he warns, paralytic polio could make a tragic return."

It is equally important that adults be protected, he says, because the disease strikes at all ages. There are ample supplies of vaccine. Dr. Leeder urges to begin immunization against crippling polio, he suggests seeing the family doctor without delay or consulting the local health department.

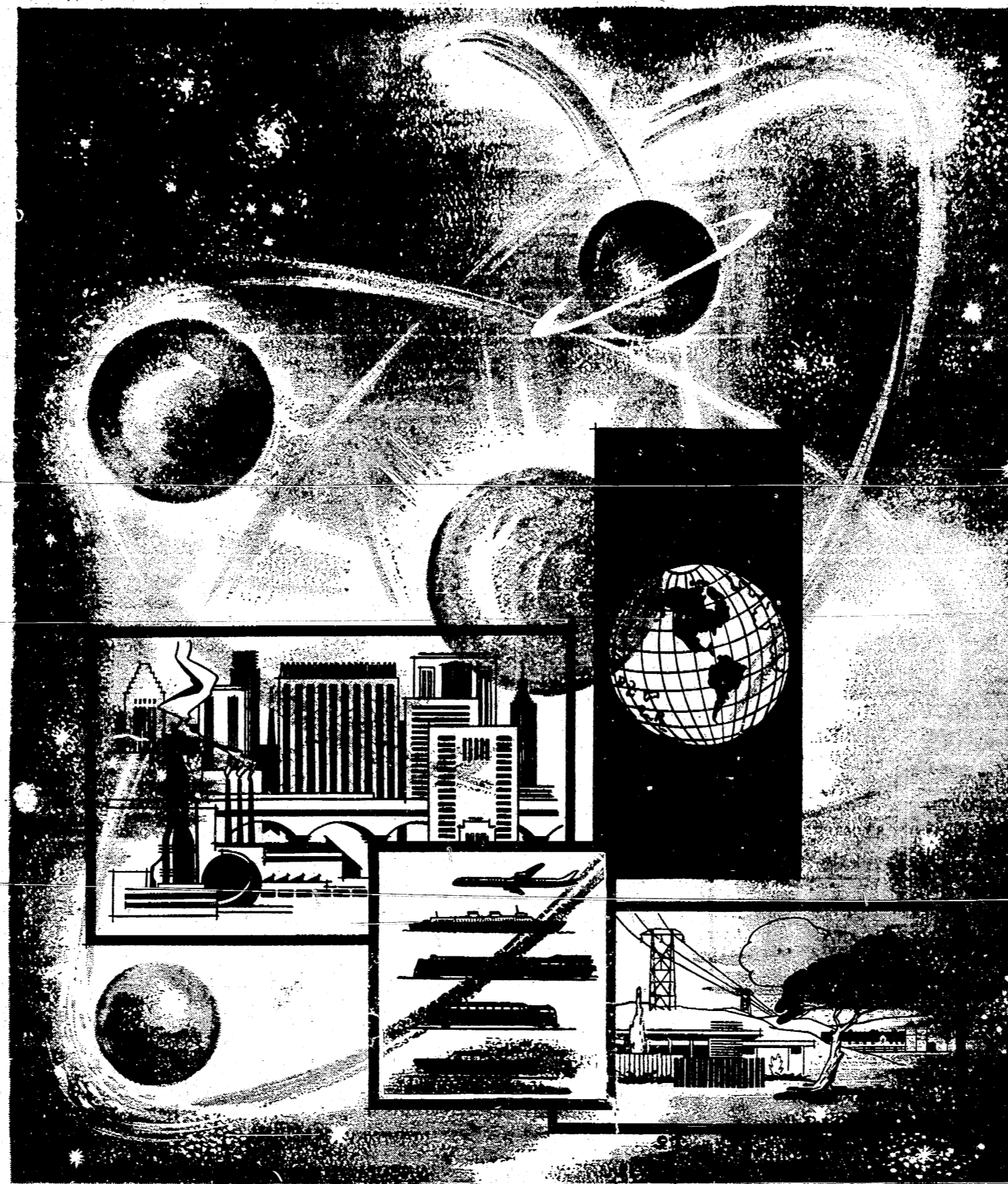
