New Rules Govern Cattle At Fair

The health requirements for cattle exhibited in Michigan have been revised for 1958. They have been put into effect and will be put into effect immediately and form 170 must accompany cattle exhibited at the fair.

ALL CATTLE EXHIBITED MUST BE ACCOMPANIED BY A certificate for exhibition. (Form 170), which is issued by Michigan Department of Agriculture.

HOW TO APPLY FOR FORM 170

Members should completely fill out the enclosed Form A (application for Form 170) and send to Michigan Department of Agriculture, Livestock Disease Control Division, Lansing 15, Michigan. A COPY OF FORM A WILL HAVE TO BE COMPLETED FOR EACH ANIMAL EXHIBITED, EXCEPT THOSE WHICH REQUIRE A BLOOD TEST. If additional copies of Form A are needed, contact the Extension Office. The Form 170 is good for 30 days, with the following exceptions which are valid for 90 days:

- Cattle identified from herds tested within 1 year and which are officially recorded as accredited or certified herds.
- Cattle originating from herds not under quarantine and blood tested for brucellosis within 1 year of the opening day of show and located in a modified certified brucellosis free area.
- Cattle originating from a herd, all members of which are over 1 year of age, except steers, spayed heifers and official vaccinates approved negative tests for brucella disease conducted within 1 year of date of show at not less than 8 month intervals.

No animal will be approved for how for which no Form 170 has been obtained or if it has passed expiration date.

2. NO ANIMAL WILL BE APPROVED FOR EXHIBITION FROM HERDS UNDER QUARANTINE.

3. When exhibiting an animal UNDER 12 MONTHS OF AGE AND NOT VACCINATED:

- No blood test required
- Identified by original ear tag, registration number or tattoo number
- Accompanied by Form 170
- Must come from a herd not under quarantine

5. When exhibiting an animal OVER 12 MONTHS OF AGE AND NOT AN OFFICIAL CALFHOOD VACCINATE, OR AN OFFICIAL CALFHOOD VACCINATE OVER 30 MONTHS OF AGE:

- Must have passed a blood test within 30 days of show, except those animals which qualify under the exceptions listed above
- Must have Form 170
- Identified by ear tag number, registration number or tattoo number
- Must come from a herd not under quarantine

6. Steers, heifers and spayed heifers all exempt from bangs test requirements, and may be exhibited from a brucellosis quarantined herd, BUT IN ALL CASES MUST BE ACCOMPANIED BY FORM 170. Cattle must be identified as not under quarantine and located in a modified certified brucellosis free area, or a negative tuberculin test within 30 days prior to show.

To avoid delays in receiving your Form 170 make sure the entire Form A is completely filled out.

Read these regulations over closely so that you do the right thing and are not prohibited from showing. REMEMBER, ALL ANIMALS EXHIBITED, INCLUDING STEERS MUST BE ACCOMPANIED BY FORM 170. Allow APPROXIMATELY 2 weeks to obtain Form 170.


