Michigander Plants Millionth Tree

LAKE CITY, Mich. (The Press) Michigander, a renowned Michigander whose "green thumb" is helping to bring new forests onto the horizons of this region soon will plant his millionth tree.

The occasion will be public Tree Farm dedication ceremonies at 10:30 a.m. Oct. 15 at nearby Englewood Plantations, whose owner, Albert J. Engel, Sr., a former congressman and ex-member of the Michigan state legislature, is helping to restore the forest heritage of a one-million-acre timber empire.

Forty-three Michigan tree farmers, including Engel, will receive Tree Farm certificates from the Michigan Tree Farm Committee headed by Rowland W. Blaine, chief forester for the American Box Board Co., Filer City. A tour of the Englewood Plantations will be a highlight of the ceremonies.

Engel himself will push a dibble into the soil and plant his one millionth tree since starting a reforestation program in 1941. Blaine was admitted to the bar in 1910; he served in the Senate of the Michigan State Legislature from 1921 through 1931; and he served as a member of the United States Congress from 1935 through 1950.

Engel actually did not get started in his reforestation program until 1941—and even then, because of his congressional duties, he had to leave much of the planting program to his long-time friend, Ben Shoenberger, who now jointly refers to his "bugaboo."

Mortality was high on early plantings of spruce in "tree peckers" in 1941-1942, but experience was a good teacher and in the 15 years that followed, a truly amazing story unfolded. Shoenberger planted 553,822 trees on 1,400 acres, and he has harvested and sold 687,722 Christmas trees for a gross sales of \$95,015.50. All of the rehabilitated lands which were once abandoned and considered worthless.

Aside from raising Christmas trees as a quick cash crop, Engel has planted 118,018 Norway and white pine for the lumber needs of coming generations. In 1957, he produced 250 gallons of maple syrup from sugar birch scattered throughout 100 acres of his property. He maintains about 50 sheep and 800 bushels of oats from submarginal lands.

Albert Engel's demonstration of high quality timber production can be grown in Michigan. He has been a leader in their development. Said James W. Butler, executive director of the Michigan State University. "The lesson most we learned from Mr. Engel's successful operation against the odds was that, while technique can be improved, we do have control methods and management procedures available which a conscientious grower can use successfully and profitably."

Polio Vaccine Available To Children To 19

A polio vaccine made available by the health department by an anonymous donor is available for administration to children under the age of 19 years whose parents are willing to pay for the vaccine.

Prof. Hunt discloses that thousands of coats are lost each year in Michigan. "There must be a tremendous waste," he says, "but from the standpoint of providing sport they are important numerically."

"The coat is a waterworn, using water areas exclusively," he added. "It can drive as much as 30 feet and swim with legs, feet and wings to get aquatic plants. You can combine use with a good-sized flock of canvasback or redhead ducks. When these birds come to water, the coat steals what they drop."

Prof. Hunt described the coat as a small, light, and sturdy white raincoat with a generally white interior. The coat is found over a large portion of the continent and extends to the central parts of Canada and south into the West Indies and Central America.

"Many people have the idea that coats are good fliers if they have viewed them along a marsh where they fly a few strokes and then rise," Prof. Hunt said. "They actually are good fliers if they get up one of the water."

The males are vicious fighters with long sharp claws. They will jump up and meet feet and breast, fighting with beak and wings. Sometimes they will back on the water and fight with their claws. They fight to protect their nesting territory.

The coat's legs are eight to 12 inches in length and are used to walk and leave the nest immediately after hatching. Their food consists of vegetable matter but they also eat frogs, tadpoles, insects and crabs.

County X-ray Starts Nov. 5

A community type chest x-ray survey beginning November 5th and continuing through 21st was announced for Washtenaw County today by Dr. Otto K. Engler, County Health Officer.

The x-ray survey will be the same as those conducted in the past except that the number of days of operation will be substantially reduced. Dr. Engler said the mobile unit will be in the county a total of 15 working days.

The objective of the department during the November survey will be to screen as many people as possible who have not been screened before. "Many of the people who take advantage of our survey operation are persons who have had x-rays in previous surveys," he said.

Screening will be done in the following order: 1. High school seniors. 2. High school juniors. 3. High school sophomores. 4. High school freshmen. 5. High school graduates.

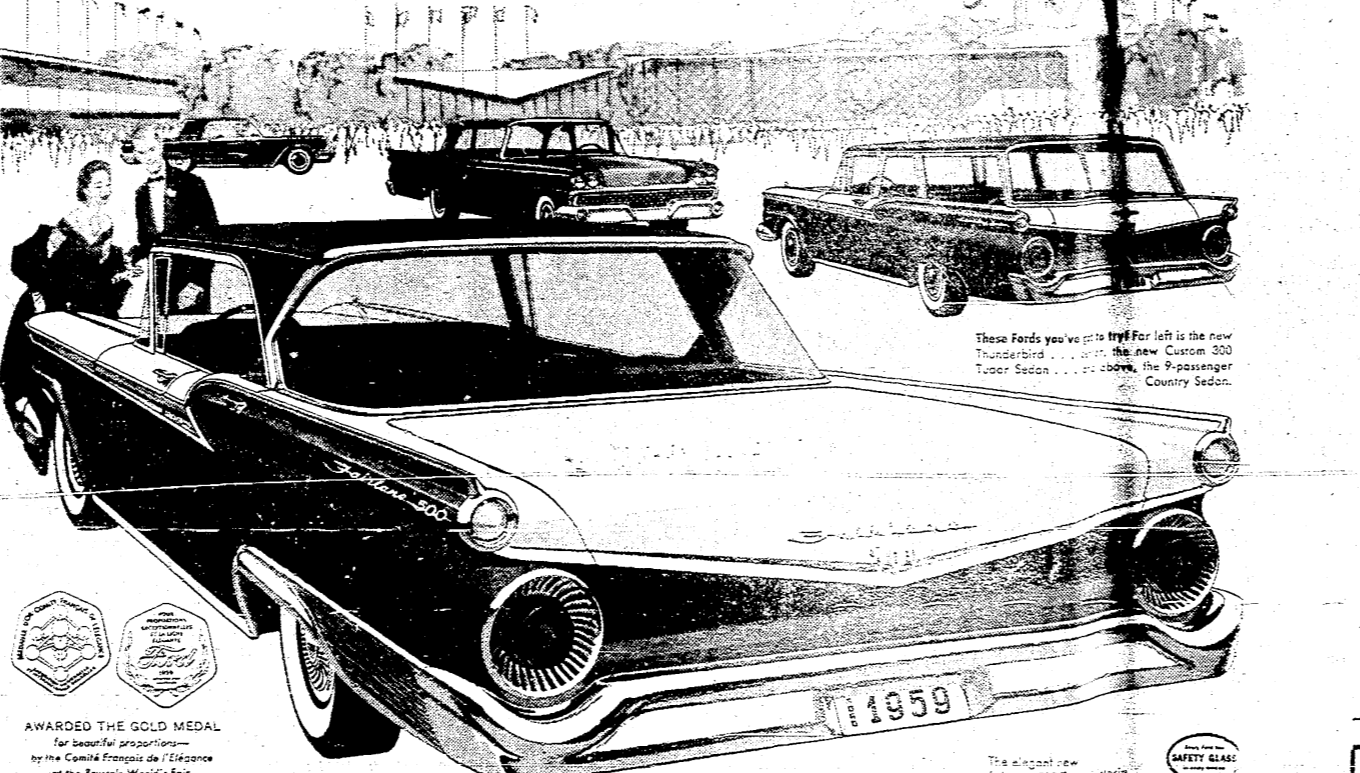
