World's Wheat Production Soars to All-Time High

Russia, Red China Also Report

With the prospect of bumper wheat crops in the United States. Russia and Red China, the world's three leading wheat producers, world bread grain production has been pushed to an all-time high. Search On For Giant Gobbler

This year's record wheat crop in the U.S. is an estimated 23 per cent above last year with the prospect of a surplus next July 1 large enough to supply the nation's domestic needs for two years.

The "king size" gobbler will be presented to Gov. G. Mennen Williams as a highlight of the turkey festival to be held at Lansing Civic Center Dec. 2, 3 and 4.

The next largest bird will be given to State Director of Aggiven to State Director of Agriculture George McIntyre.

THE BULK of the increase in world wheat production is in the United States where the flow of grain is compounding the government's wheat surplus problems.

The government has already this year extended price support loans on 237 million bushels of 1958-crop wheat against only about 47.5 million bushels on the same date. Aug. 31, last year.

The Commodity Credit Corp. h ad 1,067,147,000 bushels of wheat under loan or in government warehouses on Aug. 31.

By July 1, 1959, after accounting for exports and domestic consumption, a carryover of 1.300,000,000 bushels is anticipated. This is the largest in history and about 420 million bushels more than in 1957.

Items such as the proposed national "self help" plan for promoting turkeys, compulsory government inspection at processing plants, integration in the turkey industry and turkey merchandising efforts will be covered by nationally known speakers.


