Fall Lamb Sales Should Be Kept

Producers who are marketing lambs this fall should obtain and save adequate records of their sales in order that they can make proper application for payment under the wool incentive program, Mr. Max M. Kalmbach, Chairman, Washenaw County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said today.

Sales records of lamb producers selling lambs this fall must include the name of the buyer, his signature, and the number of live-weight lambs sold, with the description "washers" showing. Payments are made only on lambs that have never been shorn.

Mr. Kalmbach says, "Get these fall sales records together now and keep them at home in safe place or file them with the county ASC office. The final date to apply for payments on 1958-59 lambs is April 30, 1959. Producers may submit payment applications to our county ASC office anytime between now and December 15."

The Chairman warned again that lamb feeders, particularly those who have shorn lambs, should keep accurate records of the length of time they have owned a specified lot of lambs. Producers who have owned lambs 30 days. These factors are important because under the Wool Act payment is based on the weight gain of the lambs during ownership of the lambs.

Recent figures show that payment on 1957-58 unshorn lambs in Washenaw County came to \$2,722,641. Shorn wool payments amounted to \$2,191,931. National figures as of September 30 showed wool incentive payments of more than \$13 million and lamb payments of over \$3 million.

Bridge Now State's Top Attraction

A Chipewah Indian dream to build a bridge across the Straits of Mackinac has come true. "Big Mac" as the five-mile long suspension bridge is called, has been added to the State's top attractions in a survey conducted at the University of Michigan...

"Lost" Corn Saved Pays Drying Costs It pays to dry corn, especially if you are using a field drier, declares Bob Maddox, agricultural engineer at Michigan State University.

Saving grain lost due to moisture and stalk breakage will pay for the drying costs. Field picking means more grain in the crib.

CORN PICKED with a field drier usually needs to be dried in regular bins. A well-planned batch drying unit which includes a fan, heat source, power unit and a batch tray will permit a farm operator to process shelled corn at the rate of 125 to 150 bushels per hour, Maddox explains.

Batch unit capacities range from about 175 to 450 bushels. Operating costs for the heated air unit average from 3 to 6 cents per bushel, depending on the moisture content of the grain.

Running the fan when temperatures are below 50 degrees will help to remove moisture from the corn. Running the fan when temperatures are below 50 degrees will help to remove moisture from the corn.

AERATING or ventilating shelled corn in large cribs with low air flows will maintain quality and prevent crusting and mold on top and sides of crib. Operating on one horsepower motor will be used for large cribs. Shelled cribs holding under 2,000 bushels will require even smaller equipment.

Maddox says the same drying equipment can be used for wheat, soybeans and white beans. The more the drier is used, the cheaper it is to own.

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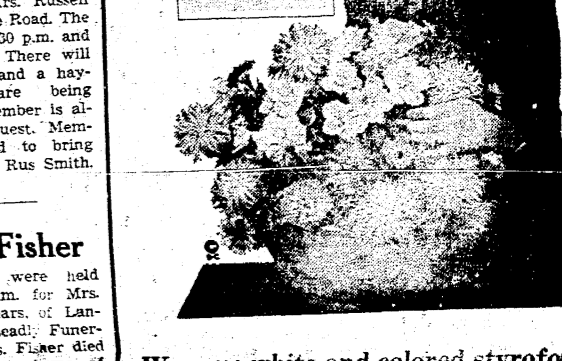

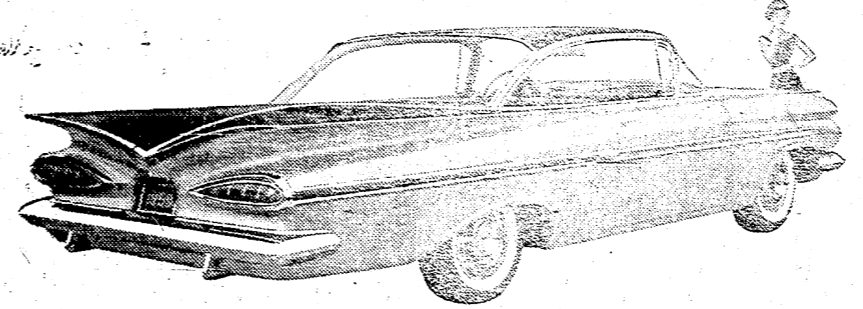

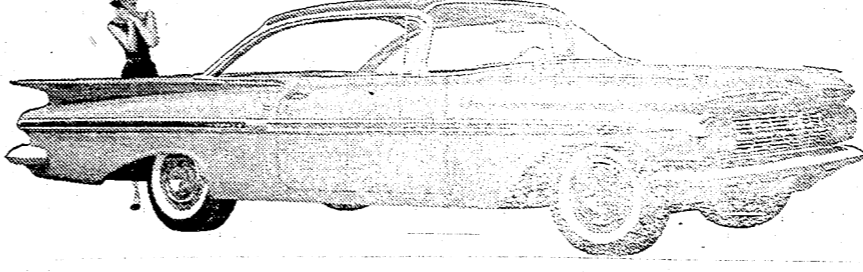
