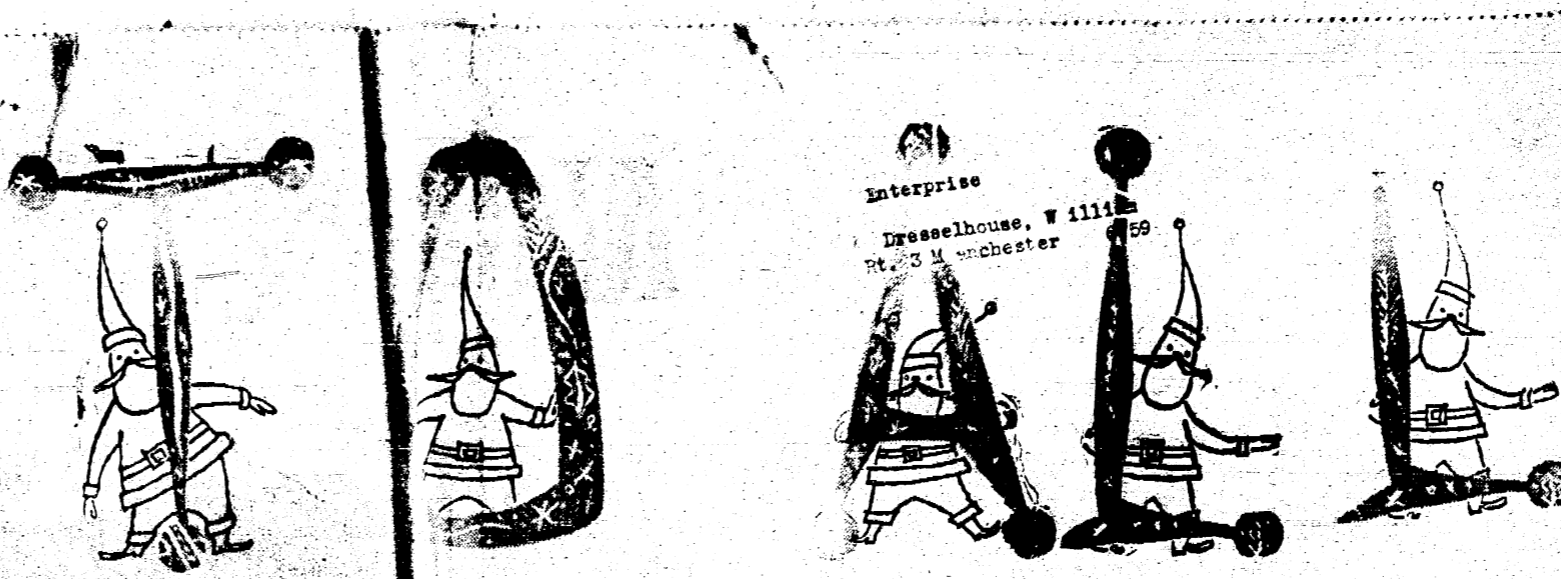


Merry Christmas



FCI plans full schedule of Christmas activities

Warden N. F. Stucker of the Milan Federal Correctional Institution sends a listing of events which he expects will be observed at the Federal Correctional Institution on a busy holiday season. Most of the activities will be observed on Christmas Day as well as the day following, December 26th, in accordance with Executive Order issued by President Roosevelt excusing all Federal employees from duty who can be spared. Only necessary activities will be maintained with a minimum force to perform the duties involved.

Schedule of activities planned for the benefit of the inmates during the holidays is as follows:

- 12-21 - Protestant Christmas Service in Chapel.
- 12-22 - Christmas Dinner.
- 12-23 - Protestant Christmas Carol Service in Chapel.
- 12-24 - Christmas Dinner in the Mess Hall.
- 12-25 - Catholic Mass in Chapel.
- 12-25 - "The Vikings" Movie.
- 12-26 - Tournament of Champions in Gymnasium at 1:00 p.m.
- 12-27 - Basketball Game - Outside Team vs FCI (Afternoon).
- 12-28 - Movie "The Key".
- 12-31 - New Year's Eve - Late TV and Radio Shows.
- 1-1 - Movie "The Bridge on the River Kwai".
- 1-2 - "Ring Fling" Tournament in Gymnasium at 1:00 p.m.
- 1-3 - Basketball Game - Outside Team vs FCI (Afternoon).
- 1-4 - Movie "Witness for Prosecution".
- 1-5 - Talent Show by inmate personnel (Afternoon).
- 1-6 - Movie "Witness for Prosecution".

Christmas trees will be decorated and placed in Dining Room and all housing units during the Holiday Season. Each inmate is permitted to receive one box of candles, cookies or glazed fruit from authorized correspondent - box not to exceed four pounds in weight and must be by all contents can be inspected. This is the only time of year that relatives are permitted to send in gifts to inmates. Because of the Holiday Season, visiting relatives and friends of inmates will not use visiting facilities. It requires additional help in our Mail Room to register, inspect and properly route the Christmas cards sent to inmates. In addition they will be permitted the freedom of visiting between the housing units which represents a relaxation of daily regulations. Truly, an atmosphere of tolerance and good feeling prevails during the Christmas Season at the Milan Correctional Institution.

"Santa Claus" Warnhoff Rushes Work on his Toys

The greater Saline area's "Santa Claus," Albert E. Warnhoff, sat quietly in his little workshop at his home that wintery afternoon and busied himself diligently with his lifetime labor of love — the making of thousands of toys for needy and sick children in area hospitals.

OVER THREE years some 58 of them, to be exact. Mr. Warnhoff has made more than 36,000 toys and repaired countless others.

Until his retirement from active business due to illness four years ago, Mr. Warnhoff, who will celebrate his 70th birthday next March, only worked part time on his beloved hobby. Part time, that is, except for working nights, week ends, holidays and vacations.

HOWEVER, when illness forced him to retire after 25 years' service with one Ann Arbor Lumber company and 19 years with another, toy-making and repairing for needy and sick children really became a full time job.

Warnhoff, who runs the school for the blind in Saline, is a devoted father, a devoted husband, a devoted citizen, a devoted volunteer, a devoted member of the Kiwanis Club, Lions and Optimist Clubs, the King's Daughters and G.I. Scouts. Just to mention a few.

Institutions where the hearts of needy and sick children were gladdened by his toys include Mercy Hospital, Veterans Administration Hospital, Beyer Memorial Hospital, Rackham School for Handicapped Children in Ypsilanti, Ypsilanti State Hospital and the Michigan Children's Home in Ann Arbor.

The Ann Arbor Lions Club recently took him and a helping sack full of toys to the Michigan State School for Blind Children in Lansing. While there he was awarded the "Key to the City" by the Mayor.

I STARTED making toys when I was about 12 years old," Mr. Warnhoff said.

"Everybody was poor then; they didn't have it like they do now. So, when a little girl in the neighborhood was taken sick with diphtheria I felt pretty badly and I made her a cradle for her doll."

"Then her doctor, Dr. John Katt - a great big, hulk of a man with a handle-bar mustache and mutton chop whiskers - said to me, 'My boy, your work did that little girl more good than all of my medicine. You ought to keep up the good work.'"

"So I did and that's how I got started," he reminisced.

EARLY IN the twentieth century, "somewhere about 1902, we lived in a house at the corner of West Street and S. Main St., eight acres from where the American Legion Hall is now," continued Mr. Warnhoff.

"West street was only half a block long and ended in weeds and woods. In fact that entire section of the city was mostly fields, weeds and woods. It was just like living in the country as the only part of the city that had been at all built up was the downtown section."

"And I can still remember," he laughed, "that when I was 10 years old I got a splinter in my right toe on one of the wooden sidewalks and had to be taken to the hospital."

"Our home was just two doors from the Ann Arbor-Saline toll gate and farmers had to pay a two cent charge to go between the two cities."

MR. WARNHOFF lives at 1315 Franklin St. in Ann Arbor with his wife Ethel.

His first wife, who was burned to death in a fire only seven months after their marriage, was the former Nattie Schlab of Saline.

Smiling reflectively to himself Mr. Warnhoff summed up his lifetime, "I think I have had just about as much fun in my life as some of our greatest millionaires and if I had my life to live over I'd do the same thing again."

Ask Repeal of State Law on Fingerprints

Repeal or modification of the state law requiring the return of the fingerprints, arrest cards and descriptions of persons released without prosecution or found not guilty was given the support of law enforcement agencies at a meeting of the permanent legislative committee of the Michigan association of chiefs of police, sheriffs, judges, justices of the peace and prosecutors and the attorney general's department and state police.

A SPECIAL committee has been set up by the agencies to have the change introduced at the next session of the legislature.

The measure was enacted in 1951 and amended in 1958 to provide for the mandatory return when the accused is released without charge or by court order when acquitted.

Present workings of the law are impractical and impeding justice, according to identification officials and police. In its place it is proposed that the use of such information from the records be restricted to enforcement agencies and controlled to prevent misuse.

AN ALTERNATIVE proposal, but regardless as less desirable, would provide that the return not apply in any case when the accused had prior conviction except traffic offenses, or when he was involved in a sexually motivated crime.

Getting at State Police headquarters in East Lansing, the permanent committee voted to have the following measures recommended:

1. Amend the law to require a physical test of drivers for introduction. The proposed measure would conform with the standards of the national uniform vehicle code.

2. Shift the responsibility of the physical test to the state police for a stop sign by yielding the right of way.

3. Amend measures providing for the use of concealed weapons by members of the militia or National Guard authorized by these agencies.

4. Amend the performance of duty when the gambling law is violated.

5. Amend the penalties of conviction in terms and fines up to \$500 for subsequent offenses.

6. Amend the punishment in respect to other a jail term or fine.


