

New Winter Sports Areas Available

A new recreation area and improvements and expansions approximating a quarter of a million dollars to existing facilities will be available to winter sports enthusiasts in West Michigan during the 1958-59 snow fun season.

The new winter sports center, increasing the West Michigan total to a second 34, is State's No. 1 located five miles northeast of Harbor Springs.

FEATURES OF the new area, which represents an initial investment of approximately \$150,000, will include four ski runs, ranging up to 4,500 feet, double chair lift and chalet with accommodations for 45 skiers.

Other improvements in the popular 31-county winter sports section, according to a survey by West Michigan Tourist and Resort Association, include new ski-lifts, additional ski runs, expanded sleeping, eating and parking accommodations and enlarged snow machine coverage.

Boyne Mountain Lodge in Boyne Falls, one of the top 10 ski resorts in North America, has completed the largest expansion project in the West Michigan area. The Mountain's \$125,000 program included installation of a 2,250-foot double-chair lift, longest in the Midwest, expansion of its snow machine to cover two-thirds of its ski area and lengthening of T-bar and J-bar lifts.

THE MOUNTAIN chair lift, with a carrying capacity of more than 800 skiers per hour, is the third lift of its kind at the popular winter resort.

Cherwell, west of Cadillac, the widest and most diversified ski area, spent \$80,000 for the approaching season to expand its snow machine, cafeteria and rental shop, to widen runs and construct a new 250-car parking lot.

Harbor Highlands near Harbor Springs will complete an \$80,000 lodge for the 1958-59 season. The lodge improvements since last season total approximately \$50,000.

AVALANCHE at Boyne City will have a new Pomalift in operation for the coming season. The \$20,000 expansion program at Avalanche also includes a new ski slope and expanded beginners' area.

The Manistee Ski Area will have a new parking area and has added nine panes to the interior of its two-story lodge and widened several runs.

Holiday Hills near Traverse City has completed installation of a snow machine, relocated and improved two rope tows and refurbished its rental shop.

Ice skating will be added to the winter sports menu of Newage Winter Sports Park, which previously has featured tobogganing and skiing with one track adjoining the area's club house. Mount MacSaba at Charlevoix is also adding a skating ring to its facilities. Other improvements include an electric tow and toboggan slide.

BUCK HILLS, in the Beulah-Benzonia area, will approximately double its facilities for the coming season with the addition of three new ski runs, three rope tows and a club house expansion.

A wing will be added to the club house, two new runs constructed and lighting installed in a portion of the area at Mount Manselona.

Other west Michigan sports centers, all of which are preparing facilities for the 1958-59 season, are Echo Valley at Kalamazoo, Thunder Mountain and Watloon Hills near Boyne Falls, Briar Hill near Mesick, Lake Valley east of Kalamazoo, Glacier Hills at Bellaire, Ward Hills between Baldwin and Ludington, Hickory Hills and Sugar Loaf Mountain near Traverse City, Brady's Hills between Lakewick and Ambie, Ski-Away at Presque Isle, Wissinewa Mountain at Lake City and Brook Park at Ionia.

Novelty Voodoo Dolls Can Cause Illness, Death

Novelty voodoo dolls that can cause serious illness and death have been found in Michigan, the Michigan Department of Health reported today.

The dolls are made in Haiti for sale as souvenirs and "twizle sticks" for mixing drinks. Persons who have the dolls in their possession should burn them immediately, the state health department urged.

THE EYES OF the doll are made of seeds from the lethal jequirity plant and contain enough toxic chemicals to cause fatal poisoning if eaten by an infant.

The doll's head is made of a cabbage root shell. The shell contains an oil chemically similar to the oil in poison ivy plants. Just touching the cabbage shell can produce skin blisters in 35 to 50 minutes.

AFTER A RECENT allergic skin outbreak in 50 high school students at Atlanta, Ga., was traced to the novelty dolls, the U. S. Public Health Service asked the Haitian government to halt shipments of the dolls to this country.

The doll wears a hat about two and a half inches wide made of braided straw dyed with bright and attractive colors. The head is about an inch long and is shaped like a kidney. Dried grass attached at the ears and chin simulates sideburns and a beard. The head with its decorations are placed on a thin stick about nine inches long.

THE STATE HEALTH department said similar dolls with heads made of coffee beans but without the jequirity seeds as eyes are not a health problem. Coffee beans are much smaller than cashew nuts and the non-poisonous dolls can be recognized by their smaller head size.

Couple Whose Car Sail Off Bridge Hospitalized

A Pleasant Lake couple, injured Christmas Eve when their car careened off a wrecked bridge, were in good condition at Herrick Memorial Hospital Tuesday, Monday.

Sheriff's officers said William Clouse, 28, and his wife, Mrs. Avis Clouse, 38, were injured when their car went off the bridge which had partially collapsed minutes before.

Deputies said a milk truck driven by Earl Van Sickle, 28, of Manchester, started over the bridge which spans the Raisin River on the Sharon Valley Rd. in Sharon township about 9 p.m. The east end of the bridge suddenly collapsed, sending the truck careening into the shallow water.

Van Sickle and two companions, his brother George and Harold Berke of Manchester, climbed from the truck with minor bruises.

Minutes after a car driven by Clouse and traveling west on the Sharon Valley road appeared on the bridge site, Clouse was unable to stop in time to avoid moving onto the sagging span. His car also sailed into the river.

The Clouses were able to climb from their car and were taken to Herrick Memorial hospital.

The Rev. T. W. Mennel officiated at the ceremony. Bert Gardner was the soloist, accompanied by the organ by Mrs. T. W. Mennel.

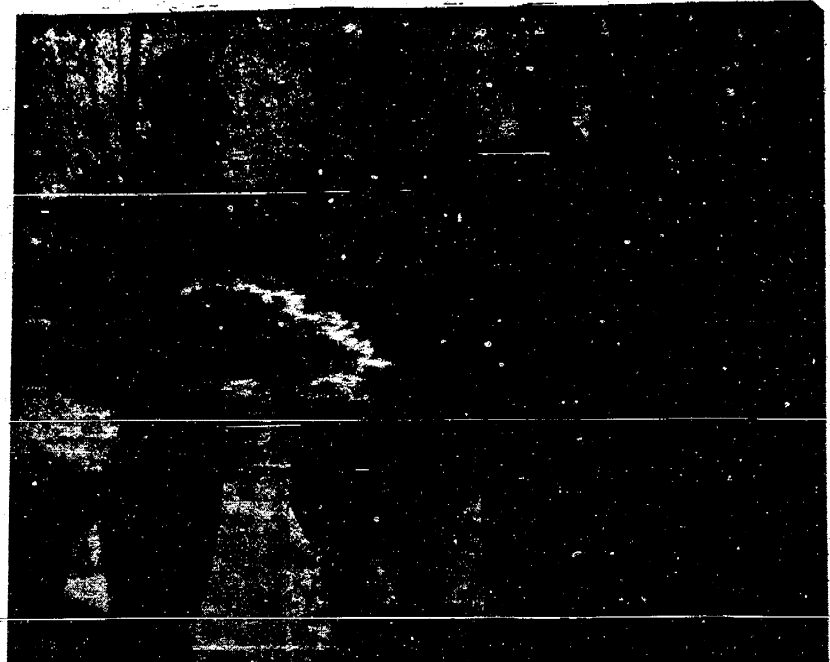
The bride asked her sister, Miss Joan White, to be maid of honor, and bridesmaids were Miss Anne Mennel and Miss Margorie Heber of Saline.
