Dog Vaccination Clinics Underway In County

Rabies Vaccination Clinics, conducted each year at this time by the Washtenaw County Veterinary Medical Society and the Washtenaw County Health Department will begin this week at Superior Township Hall on January 7, 1959 at 4:00 p.m. and will continue through January 23, 1959, according to Dr. George Bowler, Public Health Veterinarian on the staff of the Health Department.

These clinics are conducted to facilitate compliance with a county ordinance requiring all dogs to be vaccinated for rabies before issuance of a dog license. This required vaccination has virtually eliminated rabies as a threat in Washtenaw County, according to Dr. Otto K. Engelke, Washtenaw County Health Officer.

"Practicing veterinarians are voluntarily staffing the clinics," said Dr. Bowler. They are offering a reduced rate of \$1.50 per vaccination administered at the clinic. Rabies vaccination may be had at any time from any veterinarian, however, for his regular fee for such services.

The reduced fee applies only for the clinic hours listed below. In past years, representatives of the Township Clerk's office have been present at the clinics to issue a license to anyone wishing to purchase it at that time.

Licenses may be purchased before March 1st to avoid paying the late registration charge. License fees before March 1st are \$2.00 for males and unsexed dogs and \$3.00 for females.

Short 10-minute talks about those "little things" that come along to take small bites out of the milk check are scheduled for Thursday, Feb. 5. Getting equal time on the program are "adders" that can put a few dollars into the check.

HERE ARE A FEW OF THE 19 TOPICS slated for 10-minute talks: "Are You Buying Too Many Milk-ers?" "Milkmen for Milk-Covers—Can I Afford It?" "How Long Should a Dairy Cow Be Dry?" "Blind—This Can Be Laid to 'Blenda-Life' Live Yeast For Cows" "Liquid Protein and Minerals."

The Farmers' Week program begins at 9:30 a.m. in Anthony Hall auditorium. Other Farmers' Week dairy programs are planned for each of the five days, Feb. 2-6. Topics up for discussion include dairy herd health, disease control, milking systems and forage crop feeding.

ALL PROGRAMS have ample time allowed for questioning the speakers. Michigan State research scientists and extension specialists along with out-of-state guests will appear on the program throughout the week.

Public Health Problems Today Same As In 1873

1958 marked the 85th year Michigan has had a state public health agency, and the state health commissioner observed today that some of the public health problems confronted during the past year were of the same general type as those confronted in 1873.

The State Board of Health was created by the state legislature in 1873 and was succeeded in 1919 by the state health commissioner and the Michigan Department of Health.

"In 1958," Dr. Albert E. Heustis said, "communicable diseases were still a threat, just as they were in 1873. Vaccines have brought most of the 1873 killers under control, but any communicable disease is capable of staging a strong comeback anytime we drop our immunity guard."

He cited paratyphoid as an example. Crippling polio struck 500 Michigan persons in 1958, after causing only 121 cases in 1957. "Polio bounced back in 1958 even though we have an excellent vaccine to use against it," Dr. Heustis said. "But the vaccine can't protect us when it's on 'warehouse shelves.'"

Dr. Heustis estimated that the following percentages of Michigan people by age groups still have had paratyphoid: 10-14 years—25 per cent; 15-19 years—25 per cent; 20-24 years—25 per cent; 25-29 years—25 per cent; 30-34 years—25 per cent; 35-39 years—25 per cent; 40-44 years—25 per cent; 45-49 years—25 per cent; 50-54 years—25 per cent; 55-59 years—25 per cent; 60-64 years—25 per cent; 65-69 years—25 per cent; 70-74 years—25 per cent; 75-79 years—25 per cent; 80-84 years—25 per cent; 85-89 years—25 per cent; 90-94 years—25 per cent; 95-99 years—25 per cent; 100 years—25 per cent.

Other communicable diseases remained at previous year's levels or even declined, Dr. Heustis reported. Diphtheria, a leading cause of death in 1873, dropped from a recent high of 150 cases in 1957 to less than a dozen in 1958. Typhoid fever, another leading 1873 killer, was blamed for only 12 new cases this year, same as in 1957.

"One reason typhoid fever has been brought under control," Dr. Heustis commented, "is that Michigan cleaned up its public water supplies early in this century. As a result, Michigan hasn't had a case of typhoid fever traceable to a public water supply since 1934."

BUT THIS admirable string is in danger of being snapped, he warned, because private and public sewage treatment facilities in urban areas are inadequate, particularly in the Lower Peninsula, are either inadequate or completely lacking. "Many people will soon be drinking their own or their neighbors' sewage unless we act quickly to improve our sanitation," Dr. Heustis said.

Other major public health developments mentioned in his report in reviewing 1958 included: CHILD HEALTH — Births exceeded 200,000 for the third straight year although they were down slightly from the 1957 all-time high of 207,268. In the last 10 years the number of Michigan children under 10 years of age has increased by 42 percent and now stands at 2,884,527. By 1960 this group will increase by another 600,000. This increase in numbers is bringing with it an increase in the need and demand for maternal and child health services.

TUBERCULOSIS — TB is still a major public health problem in Michigan. In 1957 there were 400 TB deaths—about one-fourth the TB death toll 10 years ago. But the number of persons who became ill with TB this year was close to 5,000, about the same as 10 years ago. TB continues to be a heavy financial drain on patients' families and state taxpayers. And unless public health workers are given the means to use available case-finding techniques, Michigan can expect 40,000 to 50,000 more new cases in the next 10 years.

VENEREAL DISEASE — Syphilis and gonorrhea together make up the fourth most frequently reported communicable disease in Michigan. No major increase in cases occurred in 1958, but the trend toward a heavier concentration of cases among teen-age groups continued. Seventy-seven per cent of all gonorrhea and 14 per cent of all early syphilis is now being reported in the 15-19 age group in Michigan.

Local License Plate Service At Suttons

Secretary of State James M. Hare reports that automobile covers in nearly 200 Michigan communities will be able to purchase their own license plates in their home communities instead of traveling to branch offices elsewhere in the county.

"This program is set on at no additional cost to the taxpayer or to the persons purchasing their license plates," Hare said. "The community service program is made possible through the cooperation of civic-minded local citizens who are providing the quarters where the plates are being sold and by branch managers who are willing to put in many hours of extra time to bring plates to other communities so that they do not have to travel across the county to the regular branch office."

This program was initiated on an experimental basis last year. The word of its success and convenience spread so that this year we are extending the service to around 80 additional communities.

Unlike the 1958 program, which was largely a one-night stand proposition, some of our branch managers will offer daytime and repeat services in a few of the larger stops on their January itineraries.

The program saves a great deal of travel time and expense for both rural and urban groups. It also helps to sell plates early in the year and avoid the long lines as the February 25 deadline nears.

CAR OWNERS MUST FILL APPLICATION BLANKS. Car owners are reminded that they must this year fill in their own application blanks. This is part of an economy drive which will save the taxpayers of Michigan approximately \$250,000.

Application blanks, which can be picked up at all branch offices and many police stations, auto dealers, and other places throughout the State, should be filled out in black ink letters or typed.

Hare reminded all vehicle owners that they must bring their car titles to complete the registration process, whether they get plates in the regular branch office or at the temporary community service sales point. Personal checks cannot be accepted.

Ninety sheep and 12 head of cattle perished in a fire which leveled a barn on the Don Irwin farm, ten miles northwest of Manchester, Thursday. The total loss was estimated at \$25,000.

Great Lake firemen, called at about 9 a.m., were nearly an hour enroute to the blaze because of the dicy weather. The 8-mile run normally would take about 10 minutes.

Without the wrecker truck which accompanied the two fire trucks, pulling them back onto the road for or four times, firemen might have never reached the fire, Chief Walter Theisen said.

Michigan Mirror

MICHIGAN AND FIVE other states are fighting in court to keep Chicago from stealing the Great Lakes.

The simple statement of a complex problem distorts the issues on both sides of the court-room, but the danger is here and immediate.

Chicago for decades has been draining water out of Lake Michigan for navigation at the rate of 1,200 cubic feet per second. That much is all right with all concerned.

But the city is increasing its flow to 2,000 cubic feet a second for another purpose: treatment of sewage. The water then goes through a sewage canal, ultimately reaching the Mississippi river.

The result is a development impossible except in the wildest of dreams. The level of the Great Lakes is being lowered!

Atty. Gen. Paul L. Adams has charged that the drainage into Chicago is damaging the recreational lure of Lake Michigan, lowering property values, and creating chaos.

If the drain continues, the level of the Lakes will be lowered another two inches, reducing the tonnage freighters can carry into available dockage, space and ports.

Adams warned that this alone will cost shippers \$4,000,000 a year and raise prices of products shipped into Michigan by boat.

Not only will Lake Michigan's level be lowered, but, ultimately a heavy impact is foreseen on the other Great Lakes which surround Michigan on three sides.

Chicago officials, visiting Lansing for a conference on the problem, said the citizens are turning to their only natural source of water to help them solve their sanitation problems.

Michigan and the other protesting states are insisting that Chicago return the water, treated and restored, to Lake Michigan.

Chicago people said this would double the costs of pipelines at a time when financing merely the taking of water for a public purpose is burdensome.

States involved in the legal fight, which is now before the United States Supreme Court, are Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York, Minnesota and Wisconsin.

While that case awaits action, three of the states, Michigan, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin, refused to allow three small Chicago suburbs to finance an \$18,000,000 pipeline to the lake. It was blocked by refusal of the states to agree to a "non-litigation" guarantee, demanded by investors before they would buy the revenue bonds.

investment in the values the Great Lakes offer. A high percentage of the state's economic life depends on them.

An added factor of significance is the opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway, which is expected to carry Michigan products to world markets and return the goods of other nations to the state.

It probably will be months or years before the case is finally decided, but the problem will smolder until then.

FOOD-BUYING HOUSE wives with the family budget to juggle in an era of rising prices have a champion in state government.

It is the foods and standards division of the State Department of Agriculture.

The department, headed until Jan. 1 by Miles A. Nelson, a veteran career state employe, makes certain all goods meet the Michigan standards before they are sold. Its range of operations is amazing.

It constantly checks the accuracy of weight machines, from the penny scales patronized by pound-conscious citizens to the giant scales that weigh coal.

The department checks to determine if packaged goods contain the same weight as advertised on the label, guards against false claims for all products and approves labels.

In Nelson's office there are samples, a bottle of beer with a claim suggesting it has more inside than others of the same size, a misbranded package of sausage, or a jar of pickles that did not measure up to Michigan standards.

Nelson has been a fighter for perfection in his department and has not hesitated to seize a shipment of potatoes or other produce that didn't measure up. He has one job answer to complainants:

"Let's look at the law on that subject."
