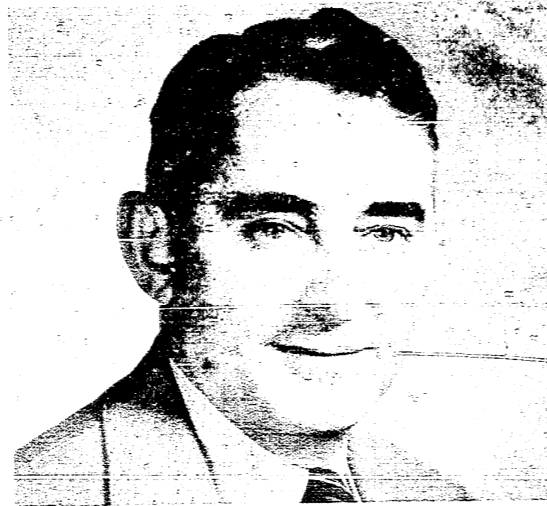

### Birthday party

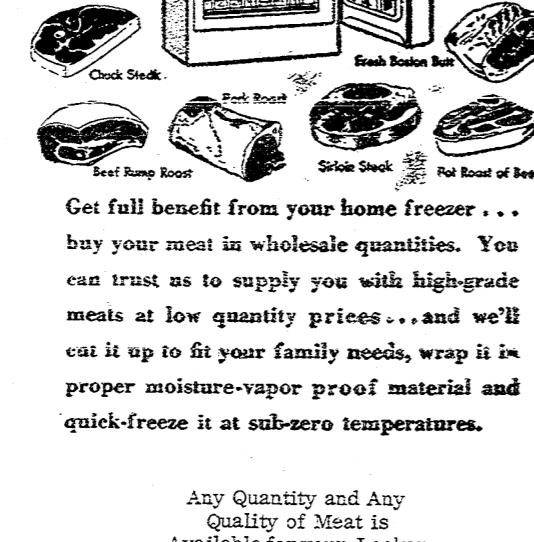

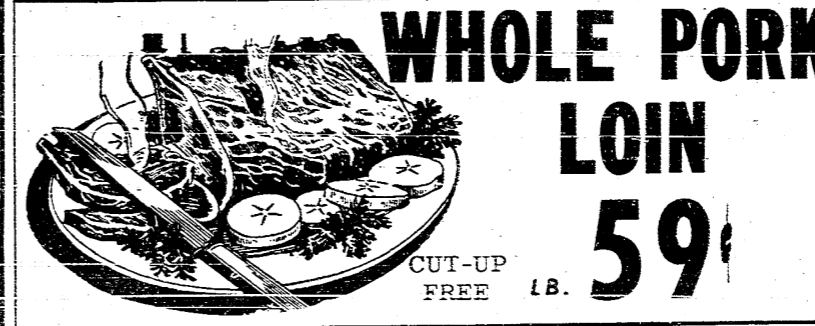

**Immunization Schedule**

A new schedule for administration of "Booster" immunizations for diphtheria and tetanus (lock-jaw) and vaccinations for small pox will be changed for the spring immunization clinics conducted in the schools by the Washburn County Medical Society according to Dr. Otto K. Engelle, county health officer.

The booster injections will be given in kindergarten and in the sixth grade. In schools without kindergarten the immunizations will be offered in the first grade. Previously injections were recommended every 3 years following the initial series of 3 or 4 injections.


Children transferred to the county during the current school year will be given an opportunity to have immunizations at the clinic, and children who have never had any immunization before will be taken in at the clinics if parents request service. No immunization will be offered to preschool age children. After careful study it is indicated that such a schedule will protect a child from these contagious diseases.

Local physicians and staff of the local hospitals serve at the clinics without pay and services of the clinics are available to the children without charge.

Numerous individuals and volunteers assist at the clinic in each area. In the next few weeks, Dr. Engelle said, every parent will receive a letter from the health department explaining the change in schedule. Only those children who are in the categories listed, however, will be given slips to be signed and returned to school requesting an immunization.

Locations and dates of the clinics will be released soon. Last year the clinics served over 11,000 children.
