## Study Local School Problem

### Washenaw County Roads Are Hazardous

The Ground-Hog may say that there will be six more weeks of winter but according to the amount of materials and money spent to date the winter is over for the Washenaw County Road Commission. 5941 tons of salt costing about \$60,000 have been used so far this winter to remove the ice and snow from the primary paved roads in the county. This compares with 5104 tons used all last season and 6028 tons used during the 1967-68 season. All last season a total of 75 tons of calcium chloride (at \$35.00 a ton) was used to mix with about 2000 cubic yards of sand for ice control work on the gravel roads. This year 125 tons have been used so far to mix with about 8200 cubic yards of sand. Both of these chemicals are in high demand and are difficult to obtain at this time. It has been extremely difficult for the road commission to maintain minimum stockpiles of these materials.

The Washenaw County Road Commission's present problem is what to do with the 2" of ice that covers the major part of the Washenaw County road system today. First, what have the commission's forces been doing to try to keep traffic moving. Commission equipment and equipment operators, the using heroes of this battle, have been salting, plowing, scraping and sanding continually since the middle of December. Howard Miner of the commission points out to be a little more specific for the three day period last Friday, Saturday and Sunday, these commission employees spread a total of 687 cubic yards of the sand chloride mixture on the gravel roads of the county. It required about 1 1/2 cubic yards per mile and cost about \$120 per mile. Approximately 97 miles of a total of 1116 miles of gravel roads in the county were sandied in this period.

The extremely low temperatures that have prevailed recently have seriously hampered the commission's efforts to provide a little traction on this 2" of ice. It is not practical now if it physically or economically possible to remove this ice with chemicals. At present the road commission applies salt only to the main county pavements. To provide this salt service to all the gravel roads in the county would cost an additional \$125,000 a year. The amount received by the road commission for local roads is about \$300,000 per year to maintain 928 miles of local roads. It appears that the amount spent for ice and snow control this year will double the normal amount spent and means that other maintenance services on these roads will have to be reduced this year to balance this additional expense for this service.

Road commission efforts have been directed to applying sand mixed with calcium chloride to all ice covered roads to improve traction. It has been an extremely slow operation, sometimes the trucks must back up the hills to do this spreading. Even where the sand chloride has been spread it is necessary that the driving public use extreme caution because it is not created by the quick freeze following the rain are very hazardous.

### County Red Cross Annual Meeting; Fund Drives Told

Manchester was host to the Washenaw County Chapter of the American Red Cross, January 27th. Over fifty board members, American Red Cross staff members and volunteers from the Ann Arbor office and interested local residents met at the new Methodist Church hall for dinner which was served by the W.S.C.S. Every area in the county was represented at the meeting which was an unusual accomplishment considering the uncertain condition of the weather.

Following a welcome by Mayor Eugene Bentschneider, a speaker, E. C. Lester of Ann Arbor, conducted the business meeting for the organization. A report was given by Jack Hagan, chairman of the disaster committee, with information on the devastating floods in Ohio, Indiana and Pennsylvania, New York and West Virginia and recent burn-outs in the county where the Red Cross was able to assist. Mr. Jack Shipman reported on the seven combined United Community Fund and Red Cross drives in the county. Five of the seven met their goals or more (including Manchester with \$7099 collected, a record). This combined effort obtained 94 per cent of the Washenaw County American Red Cross budget. There are still small portions of the county which will contact their drives in March during Red Cross Month. The 6 per cent needed should be collected at that time.

A report was also given for the water safety program which assists the local recreation department each summer at Wampers Lake. Plans are now being made and recreation committees were urged to contact the Ann Arbor office for scheduling.

### Fair Board Elects Three Members

The Manchester Fair Board opened meeting was held January 28th in the High School with a very good attendance. Terms of three of the Board members has expired.

Re-elected to three year terms were Marie Schneider and Willis Uphaus. Now on the Board is Ed Yaman. He replaces Earl Koebbe. Willard Mann resigned as a member after having served 14 years. At the road commission are also deeply concerned and will continue to cover as many miles with sand and chloride as possible to hold the situation. However, we must remind the folks that live on the county roads that during the next eight weeks anything can happen. Right now a little snow with a slight wind could block many miles of road. Rural residents should stock up on fuel, food, etc. because in spite of the best service possible by the road commission's forces, the county roads could be blocked for several days by snow, sleet, washouts from rain or mud.

In conclusion, the Washenaw County Road Commission wishes to assure the people in Washenaw County that they will do everything possible within their physical and financial limitations to help traffic keep moving during this emergency, hoping that Mother Nature will assist them with a break in the weather.

### Four Point Program As A Nucleus For Group Discussions

Six small citizens groups are now scheduling informal meetings for the purpose of discussing school education and financial problems. The four areas of discussion will be centered around the following topics:

1. What can be done to maintain and improve the share of the first-year millage received by the school.
2. How to financially maintain the present school program.
3. If financial aid is impossible, where to cut the program so as to operate within present income.
4. How can the enormous financial deficit over the next few years.

The board of education has appointed six temporary chairmen to call the first meetings. These people include Willard Mann, Reno Feldkamp, Stanley White, Mrs. Louis Vogel, Carl Settle and Herbert Jacob.

The group will select a permanent chairman and vice chairman. These people will meet with the board of education on March 9 to share opinions and recommendations.

This information will be used at the March 16th PTA meeting. The board of education is very optimistic with the enthusiasm of the group and hopes to be able to plan next year's program early this spring.

### Mothers March Nets \$18,373

About \$18,373 was collected throughout Washenaw County in the annual Mothers' March which climaxed this year's March of Dimes campaign for a county total of \$95,000.

Reports from this year's march of more than 1,000 Washenaw County women are not complete because of the most difficult weather conditions in the history of the annual drive, county chairman, Mrs. William Wood said. Several rural areas have not yet reported march results, she explained, and returns from other fund raising events are also not complete. As of this date the total reported is about \$30,373. Official total last year at this time was \$41,636.

Manchester to date has about \$1490 in: Milan \$775; Saline \$648; Whitmore Lake \$103 and Chelsea \$185.

Chelsea was the only community to top last year's contributions. A total of \$4,617 has been reported from marches in the rural townships by rural area chairman, Mrs. Norman Wallace of Manchester.

ings on the subject last summer. At the start of the 1959 legislative session, Rep. E. D. O'Brien (D-Detroit) introduced the measure to set up a pilot camp for 60 youths.

The pattern is taken from the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) program of the depression era when young men found themselves with nothing on their hands and no jobs.

Changed slightly to fit the needs of modern youths, the camps would be for those whom probate judges feel should have a change of environment before their existing circumstances cause them trouble.

Other plans of the DeMaas committee include a "family court" to gather together all the social problems of a family for solution together.

As many as 100 or even different court systems and jurisdictions now are used often on the same family. Often the problems of the parents are interrelated with those of the children.

Sending a boy to Boys Vocational School or to prison for a crime might solve the immediate problem without doing anything to remove the cause.

The family court idea is expected to run into legal problems in the presently exclusive jurisdiction of probate courts over youths through their 18th birthday.

The question is whether to give circuit courts more jurisdiction over younger offenders, give probate court more jurisdiction over older youths.

Meanwhile, the state's prisons are getting more and more overcrowded as the inmate population grows.

The Michigan Crime and Delinquency Council estimates there will be a 30 per cent increase in prison population by 1970 unless greater emphasis is placed on parole and probation.

The state now has 10,500 prisoners and the budget for operating the prisons last year was \$11,000,000, not counting the millions spent to keep families of inmates on welfare.

This total cost will almost double by 1970 unless the system of preventive penology is altered in Michigan, the council said.

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**Michigan Mirror**

**CAMPS FOR YOUTHS** as the first major step in preventive criminology are being planned in Michigan.  
They will not be for the boy who is already in trouble with the law, but for the neglected and aggressive lad who is a potential menace to society.  
The idea came out of a committee on juvenile delinquency headed by Rep. Harry DeMaas (R-Battle Creek) which had a series of hearings on the subject last summer.

The pattern is taken from the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) program of the depression era when young men found themselves with nothing on their hands and no jobs.  
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As many as 100 or even different court systems and jurisdictions now are used often on the same family. Often the problems of the parents are interrelated with those of the children.  
Sending a boy to Boys Vocational School or to prison for a crime might solve the immediate problem without doing anything to remove the cause.  
The family court idea is expected to run into legal problems in the presently exclusive jurisdiction of probate courts over youths through their 18th birthday.  
The question is whether to give circuit courts more jurisdiction over younger offenders, give probate court more jurisdiction over older youths.  
Meanwhile, the state's prisons are getting more and more overcrowded as the inmate population grows.  
The Michigan Crime and Delinquency Council estimates there will be a 30 per cent increase in prison population by 1970 unless greater emphasis is placed on parole and probation.  
The state now has 10,500 prisoners and the budget for operating the prisons last year was \$11,000,000, not counting the millions spent to keep families of inmates on welfare.  
This total cost will almost double by 1970 unless the system of preventive penology is altered in Michigan, the council said.

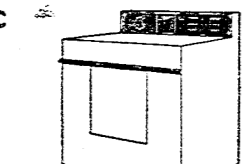

### Local Man Qualifies As Operator

Allen Luchardt, 208 Vernon St., Manchester, is among 94 Michigan men who have been certified by the Michigan Department of Health as qualified sewage treatment plant operators. The certificates are signed by Dr. Albert E. Heustis, state health commissioner.

"These certificates," Dr. Heustis said in Lansing, "mean a great deal to these men, their home communities and to the entire state. They certify that the men are professionally competent to do a highly important job that protects the public health through efficient operation of an important public works."

"These men are to be congratulated by all of us for the effort and time they have spent in gathering the knowledge and skills that have qualified them for certification."

Michigan law requires municipal sewage treatment plants to be operated by persons certified by the state commissioner. To win certification, an operator must pass a written examination and rigid state health department standards of education and experience.

Certificates are classed A, B, C or D according to the level of the operator's education and experience. Different examinations are given for each of the four classifications. The certificates permit a person to operate a class A, B, C or D treatment plant, the size, type and location.

There are now about 200 municipal sewage treatment plants in Michigan and all but seven are now operated by certified persons. Seven is considered a normal number of vacancies because of transfers, deaths and other turnover.

With the certification of 94 more men, the state health department believes that for the first time since the certification program was started in 1954 municipalities will now be able to draw from several certified operators whenever a vacancy occurs.

**VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ORDINANCE NO. 82**  
An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 39 of the Village of Manchester, which is an Ordinance regulate the use and operation of vehicles on the public highways within the Village of Manchester, Michigan, to provide for the arrest of and penalties to be imposed upon persons violating its provisions, and to repeal all prior Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict therewith.  
**THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ORDINANCES:**  
1. That subsection (b) of Section 48, Article V, Ordinance No. 39 is amended to read as follows:  
(b) When two vehicles enter an intersection from different highways at the same time, the driver of the vehicle on the left shall yield the right-of-way to the vehicle on the right. Provided, however, Where signs bearing the message "yield right-of-way" are erected, by resolution of the Council, upon the approach to an intersection, a driver approaching such sign shall slow to a reasonable speed for existing conditions of traffic and visibility, yielding the right-of-way to all traffic on the intersecting street which is so close as to constitute an immediate hazard. The driver of any vehicle traveling at an unlawful speed shall forfeit any right-of-way which he might otherwise have hereunder.  
2. That this Ordinance shall become effective 20 days after its adoption.

The foregoing Ordinance was adopted at a regular meeting of the Council of the Village of Manchester, held at the Village Hall, in said Village, on Feb. 2, 1959. Said Ordinance was ordered published in the Manchester Enterprise, a newspaper having general circulation in the Village of Manchester, within one week after its passage, and was so published on Feb. 4, 1959.
