Tips On Winter Driving . . .

EAST LANSING—Members of the Michigan State University Highway Traffic Safety Center and the Michigan State Police teamed up today to issue some seasonal money saving advice to Michigan motorists.

Michigan's icy, snow-clogged streets and highways may slow down drivers, but they have an "economic safety" message. Reported injury accidents increase. The number of property damage accidents to vehicles shoots up sharply. And up go repair bills.

This observation was made by Orrin Lucas, traffic analyst, Michigan State Police. "In my experience," he said, "the same accident trend invariably asserts itself when our roads are suddenly hit by ice and snow. Fatalities usually drop, but injury and property damage accidents climb. This year has been particularly bad over a long period of time."

Lucas pointed to the adverse weather and highway conditions in December as an example. Provisional figures for that month show a 19 per cent decrease in highway deaths but a 10 per cent increase in injury accidents and a 16 per cent increase in property damage accidents. Preliminary figures for January indicate a greater decrease in deaths, show similar increases in other accidents.

Richard W. Bishop, assistant professor, teacher education department, and the M.S.U. Highway Traffic Safety Center, feels that this trend indicates that drivers slow down—but not nearly enough.

"Motorists slow down enough to keep from killing themselves when they do lose control of their vehicles," he said, "but they don't slow down enough to keep their cars going in the right direction. These accidents are costing motorists unnecessary dollars."

Bishop offered the following proving ground recommendations to drivers based on observations during slide test demonstrations held recently in Clintonville, Wis.

Wisconsin and conducted by the Committee on Winter Driving Hazards of the National Safety Council.

"Traction is the important question on slippery road surfaces just how much—or how little traction you have is vital. And traction varies greatly depending on the condition of the road. Just what it is that's making the slick—snow, rough ice, glare, etc.

"The first thing is to find out just how slick the road is. In short, 'get the feel of the road.' When there's no traffic around you start out and keep on trying them from time to time. If the temperature rises, ice gets more treacherous. Ice is slicker at around 22 degrees and it will take you farther to stop than at 0 degrees. It's the film of water from the ice melting at higher temperatures that causes the trouble.

"This means that you may be able to stop at a stop sign without any trouble on your way to work in the morning. Yet the same speed at the same interest rate may be entirely too fast. You find yourself skidding into the intersection because the weather's warmer; the ice is slicker."

There are tricks that will help you keep control of your car. Drive at a speed well under that at which the rear of your car starts to slide around.

Avoid sudden acceleration and deceleration. Keep your speed constant and pick up speed and slow down gradually. This is the kind of error that causes one car to slide into another in passing. Always remember that front wheels that are sliding can't turn your car.

This means, stay away from the brake pedal as much as possible. If you do have to brake, don't slam them on and hold them there. You'll lock the wheels, go

Willow Run Airport Handles Domestic Flights

WILLOW RUN—Close to 2.34 million air travelers utilized the facilities of Detroit-Willow Run airport last year, according to Albert Henwood, vice president of Airlines National Terminal Service Co., Inc. (ANTSCO). The eleven Willow Run-based airlines handled 2,083,496 boarded, through and deplaned passengers in 1958, he said.

He explained that this impressive passenger total required 196,118 aircraft movements at Willow Run in 1958, a figure which will keep the airport well up in the national ratings for airport traffic volume.

"Despite the fact that two trunk carriers and one local service airline have transferred operations to the Wayne County field, Willow Run still handles the majority of all domestic airline flights and passengers in southeastern Michigan," Henwood declared.

The couple lived in Seio township until 1924, when they moved to Ann Arbor.

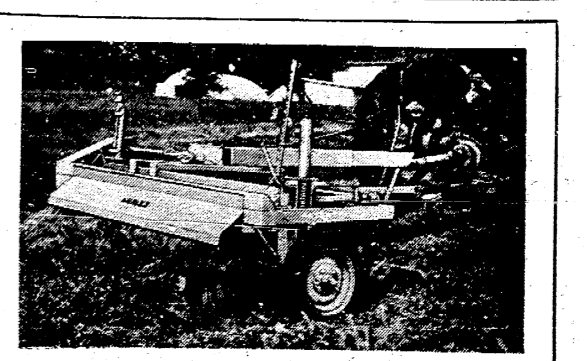

Grade School Language Use Is Debated
EAST LANSING — The teaching of foreign languages to grade school children is still subject to debate among educators.
 Dr. Georges J. Joyaux and Dr. Donald A. Yates of Michigan State University's department of foreign languages maintain that the United States cannot effectively lead the world if more Americans do not know more foreign languages.
 The cold war, the shrunken world, American industrial expansion abroad, increased travel and foreign civil and military commitments have pointed out a severe shortage of foreign language experts, they assert.
 Drs. Joyaux and Yates favor language study for all children to increase their understanding of other cultures and to make it easier for them to become proficient in languages if they want to. The grade school is the best place to start, they claim, because people learn a second language best between ages four and 10.
 Dr. Donald H. Hughes, M.S.U. associate professor of teacher education on the other hand contends there are many practical reasons why the early language teaching cannot be done on a large scale in the immediate future. Familiar with several languages himself, he claims there is no proof of the desirability of teaching foreign languages in grade school.
 Some of Dr. Hughes's objections: Not enough qualified instruction in a foreign language. Crowded grade school curriculum, expense and lack of motivation on the part of children.
 The foreign language instructors say the curriculum should be changed and more qualified teachers trained. Children, they maintain, enjoy a foreign language as they would a second one.

The notary public or other officer administering the oaths shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

Unregistered Persons Not Entitled To

SEC. 491. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 116, P. A. 1954.)

Transfer of Registration, Application, Time

SEC. 506. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto, and the address from which he was last registered, or by appearing in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Transfer of Registration On Election Day

SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village shall have the right to make application to have his registration transferred on any election or primary election day by executing a request over his or her signature for such transfer and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct in which he is registered. Upon receiving such request the inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and if the signatures correspond then the inspector shall certify such fact upon said request and the applicant for transfer shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.
