More than 400 Michigan cities and villages are expected to take part in the exchange of mayors, which is always the highlight of the Michigan Week observance throughout the state.

Inaugurated in 1954, the Exchange between chief executives of cities and villages has proved a valuable means of getting communities of the state better acquainted with each other. The mayors and village presidents also have an opportunity to learn first hand of the problems of other communities and how their resources and facilities are applied to these problems.

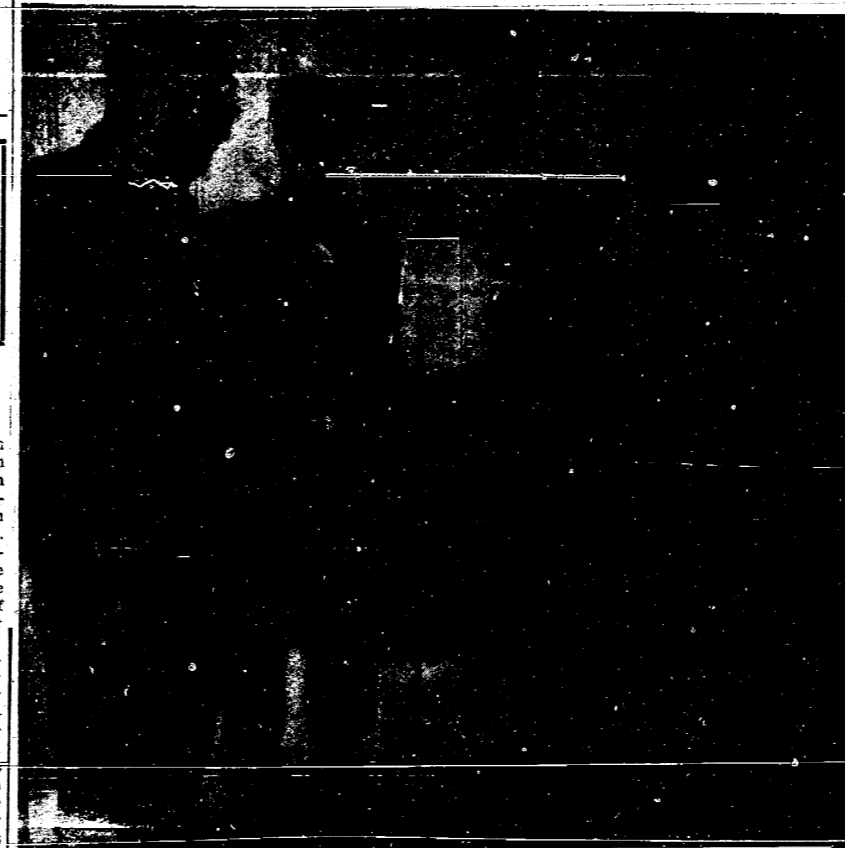

LABOR MIGHT BE FORCING

LABOR MIGHT BE FORCING industry to provide a general annual wage in an economic war of attrition. The principle of GAW was established some years ago by UAW President Walter P. Reuther. It won a compromise in labor-management negotiations, but fell short of victory. But now, by extending other phases of labor's fight for more security, it is possible to see signs of success. Labor unions always have considered the state's unemployment compensation program, in a degree. Last week, it got support from an unusual quarter. Three University of Michigan professors reported results of their research showing that jobless benefits in all states are generally inadequate. They said that all workers should be covered, Michigan's law covers those in plants with four or more workers. They said benefits should last 30 weeks, some seven and one-half months, Michigan's runs 26 weeks, or 30 months. They said that a worker should get 40 per cent of his take home pay while jobless. Michigan's ranges from 40 to 50 per cent. The AFL-CIO in Michigan is now campaigning for perpetual unemployment compensation, benefits for the entire period of unemployment, no matter how long. Republicans in the legislature are proposing a plan under which workers would contribute to the fund which is tapped for the benefit checks. The ideas as first brought up for consideration by the unions, but Republicans stole a march on them by publicly announcing the idea early. Oddly, unemployment compensation started first as a fringe benefit for workers, negotiated by unions with a strike threat as its major weapon. At present, employers make 100 per cent of the contributions to the fund based on a payroll assessment. The more jobs they

Anthony R. Krusa, Yeoman seaman, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold W. Krusa of Route 2, 3200 parcel Farm Harbor, T. H. Feb. 18 aboard the destroyer escort USS Epperson for a five-month tour of duty with the U.S. Seventh Fleet in the Far East. The Epperson is a unit of the largest commands afloat in our modern sea arm, comprising some 184 ships, and 45,000 officers and men. During the cruise the destroyer escort will make stops at Hong Kong, the Philippines and Japan. Joseph R. Scholfield, electronic technician third class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. K. A. Scholfield of 6133 Jefferson Rd., Brooklyn, Mich., is serving aboard the destroyer tender USS Bryce Canyon operating with the U.S. Seventh Fleet in the Western Pacific. The 10,000-ton tender, which departed its home port, Long Beach, Calif., on Feb. 16, has won first place in battle efficiency competition among small Pacific Fleet destroyers during each of the past four years. 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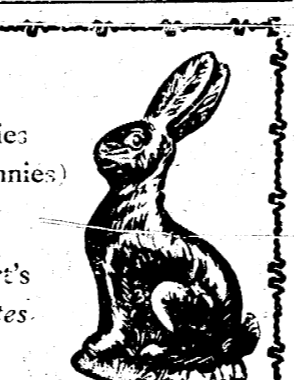
