### Easter Seal Drive Reaches 55 Percent Of its 1959 Goal

The Washtenaw County Chapter of the Michigan Crippled Children's Society has reached only 55 per cent of its goal of \$12,000 with the drive ending on Easter. Mrs. Stanton G. Rosch, Easter Seal Chairman for the County made the announcement Monday and expressed hope of greater contributions this week. Proceeds from special events being used for the first time this year in the drive have not yet been included in the total. A Bunny Hop and Skate Day held in the Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti areas were quite successful and will be made county wide projects next year. Also the final sum will be increased by the donations of a third and fourth grades in two elementary schools in Ann Arbor. The children of these grades conceived the idea and made class projects creating collection displays for the Society in their respective school corridors.

Money received from this drive provides for any crippled child or adult in the county such services as medical care, hospital equipment, special education, speech, occupational and vocational therapy and transportation. The drive also is the only source of funds for a two week summer camp session each year. The local chapter leases the University of Michigan Fresh Air Camp, provides a full quota of specially trained directors, counselors, doctor and nurse, and gives forty to fifty seriously crippled persons in Washtenaw County a country vacation with arts and crafts, picnics, and boating and swimming where possible. **Civil Defense Planning Outlined For County**  
The following letter was received at the Enterprise and we print it for our information:  
FROM: Welfare Coordinator  
TO: All Zone and Township Directors and Zone Welfare Chiefs  
The Emergency Welfare Services of Washtenaw County Civil Defense is now in the preliminary stage of planning, the end result of which will be an operational plan to assist persons in the event of an enemy attack or an enemy attack warning. The responsibility of this Service is, for all matters pertaining to administrative activities and coordination of all Welfare operations, to the Zone Welfare Services. The Welfare plan is at the point of being published and will be given full distribution to all Zone and Township Civil Defense Directors and Zone Welfare Chiefs.

The possibility of an attack on this country is gaining momentum every day. The fact cannot be overlooked that we, in this county, are adjacent to a prime target area according to present Office of Civil Defense. This being planning of the State of Michigan, we as Civil Defense workers have a definite responsibility to the residents of Washtenaw County. Clothing, Housing, Registering, and Rehabilitating all persons made homeless in our county, and evacuees from any other area, plus Civil Defense agencies in Reception and Care areas. Under present planning persons residing in Salem, Superior, Ypsilanti, and Ann Arbor Townships will be evacuated from their homes to the Reception and Care Areas in Chelsea and Manchester, upon the Attack Warning Signal.

It is the duty of the Zone and Township most important activity of Civil Defense, WELFARE, is NOW. We have been a bit reluctant about the fact that we can be bombed, but the possibility is here NOW. The responsibility rests with those persons of LOCAL GOVERNMENT and volunteers who form the Civil Defense Organization, to PLAN, RECRUIT, and TRAIN, in order to save lives, re-unite families, and to continue our government when and if a major disaster falls upon our community.

It may sound "redundant" but it is said with sincere thought that IT CAN HAPPEN HERE. The situation today warrants some planning and thinking on our part in order to PREVENT, MINIMIZE, REPAIR, and RECOVER from injury and damage resulting from a bomb burst.

The Welfare Coordinator will aid and assist all Welfare personnel in all zones in order to reach their objective. Coordination with the Zone and Township Directors is the prime purpose of this office and availability of help will always be present here.

6. Meetings with Directors and Welfare personnel of Zones 6 and 7 will be scheduled in the very near future and meetings with qualified elector present and in line at the polls at the hour prescribed for the closing thereof shall be allowed to vote.
