

### Nearly 65 Years Is History Of Bank

This history of the bank dates back to June 30, 1884, when the Union Savings Bank officially opened for business with a paid capital of \$12,500 as compared to \$3,555,451.56 at this time.

It was hardly a good year in which to start a new enterprise because in 1884 there had been a severe nation-wide panic. Business houses were crashing, banks closing their doors, and railroads going into the hands of receivers. In the year 1884 there were bread lines in all cities, the great Pullman strike took place in Chicago and Coxey's army of unemployed marched on Washington. Although the town of Manchester suffered less than the rest of the country, there was a general collapse of farm prices and money was scarce.

Under these conditions it took courage and vision to open a new bank. Much of the credit goes to A. J. Waters and Walter Mack, who canvassed prospective subscribers by horse and buggy until the necessary capital was raised.

The first directors' meeting was held on June 30, 1884 on the third floor of Arbeiter hall. The names of the original officers and directors are: president, Benjamin English; George Henschel, first vice president; Dr. C. F. Kapp, second vice president; Edwin E. Root, cashier; Arthur J. Waters, John Wuerthner, John Horning, Walter Mack, F. P. d. Breitenwischer and Arnold Kuhl.

At the first meeting the directors decided to purchase the corner lot on which the bank now stands, for the price of \$1,000. It was decided to tear down the two-story building known as Union Hall, then standing on the corner and erect a modern three-story structure in its place. The third floor of the new building was to be given over to the Masonic Lodge. The Union Savings Bank was installed in its new quarters with Edwin E. Root behind the window as cashier and sole employee. In those days Main street was a dirt road and one of the expenses was a charge of 25 cents a week for the bank share of sprinkling down the road. Cobblestone gutters and plank sidewalks bordered both sides of the street and lighting was by kerosene lamps mounted on poles. In those days, hitching posts formed a continuous fence at the edge of the sidewalks.

In the beginning years the bank was a one-man shop. Ed Root came down in the morning at seven-thirty to build the fire in the coal stove behind the counter and sweep out the bank. He served customers, handled the cash and kept books. Banking hours were from nine to four and frequently Mr. Root worked extra hours until ten in order to keep the books up to date. Root ran the business alone until Edwin English joined the staff a few years later as a part-time employee.

From the first year the bank grew steadily and as the years passed there were inevitable changes in directorship. Bennett C. Root graduated from high school in 1905 and joined the bank. Deposits and resources grew rapidly in those years, with dividends on the common stock and interest on deposits paid regularly. In 1907 the bank weathered its second national panic. The chief difficulty was that of finding enough cash to do business. In those days farmers were shipping livestock several times a week and then coming to the bank to cash their checks. Ordinarily correspondent banks were called on to produce the needed cash but in 1907 they refused to part with large sums. So, instead of asking for large sums each correspondent bank was asked for smaller sums and the bank remained in a sound position throughout the panic. In 1907 merchants helped overcome tightness in cash by using railroad pay checks for currency. These checks were in five and ten dollar amounts.

At the bank grew in size and strength Manchester was growing and changing in appearance and in 1908 the waterworks were installed. The automobile arrived and gas buggies replaced horse drawn vehicles.

In 1920 John Horning, the bank's second president died and Dr. C. F. Kapp was named president. At his death in 1924 Edwin Root succeeded as president and the Union Savings Bank had its greatest growth and also most trying times. Bennett Root started his long career as cashier. In 1927 Edward Kirk joined the staff and in 1929 LeRoy Marx went behind the counter. Both men are in the bank today. Mr.

Bennett Root is chairman of the board of directors. There were 395 votes cast. All township candidates on the Republican ballot were elected. The result of the election is as follows:

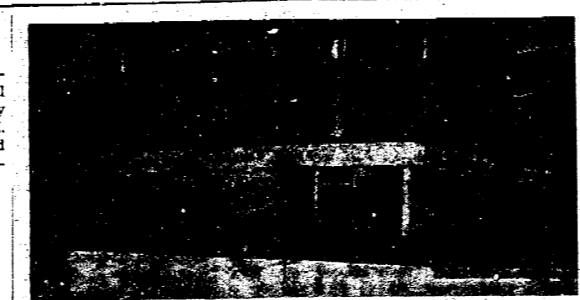

Mr. Boutell also said that much credit should go to Edwin I. Broecker, Architect, for his efforts in laying out and supervising the work.

The bank officers and employees also expressed thanks to their customers for the patience and fine cooperation given during the remodeling program, and while the bank was being operated in the temporary quarters in the former Peoples Bank Building. It was back in May 1936 that the Union Savings Bank and the Peoples Bank consolidated.

**Voters In School District Here  
 Face Possible Millage Hike**

The state financial condition has  
 seriously reflected hardships upon  
 schools, with Manchester schools  
 behind some \$30,000 dollars in  
 promised state assistance, school  
 officials pointed out and there is no  
 assurance that the money prom-  
 ised by the last year's state aid bill  
 is going to be received. As the  
 schools and universities can bor-  
 row money and the state cannot,  
 this responsibility has been left  
 up to the schools. The Manchester  
 school district has just repaid a  
 \$75,000 loan and in turn has ap-  
 plied to borrow \$40,000 more to  
 assure no payless paydays.

Taxpayers in the Manchester  
 Public School District face the  
 likelihood of a special millage elec-  
 tion this summer to balance the  
 school operating budget for 1959-  
 60.

Money shortages during the last  
 four years have forced curtailment  
 of the school bus service and out-  
 backs in the elementary vocal  
 music and physical education pro-  
 grams. In addition, one full-time  
 and one half-time teacher  
 was removed from the payroll this  
 year.

The Manchester district started  
 the current school year \$21,000 in  
 the red. It borrowed \$75,000  
 against future taxes and paid this  
 sum plus \$1,000 interest, back by  
 March 1. On April 1, it borrowed  
 another \$40,000 to meet payroll  
 requirements.

Superintendent Robert Masten  
 says that Manchester schools are  
 behind about \$23,000 in promised  
 state assistance, and there is no  
 assurance this money will be re-  
 ceived.

Before going to the voters with  
 a special millage proposal, the  
 Manchester school board probably  
 will await announcement of the

1958—Both Jackson and Wash-  
 tenaw counties allocated 9.5 mills  
 for schools, but another provision  
 of the law cut the Manchester dis-  
 trict's tax spread to 9 mills. Be-  
 cause the state constitution limits  
 county tax power to 15 mills, the  
 combination of county, township  
 and school allocations cannot ex-  
 ceed that figure. When Jackson  
 county authorized a .5 mill alloca-  
 tion for Norvell township, this  
 amount was pared from the school

Named To State  
Wide Committee

The Michigan Retailers Association recently announced the appointment of Mr. Walt Schabile of Schabile's, Manchester to the organization's Community and Public Affairs Committee. As Chairman for Manchester, Mr. Schabile will serve as the representative and Governmental Affairs leader for the Association in this area, as well as acting to coordinate state-wide activities with all retailers in our community.

In making the appointment, Mr. Howard C. Grimes, President of the Association, stated: "By accepting this most vital assignment, Mr. Schabile has contributed greatly to the unified effort so necessary if the retail industry is to be properly represented in the state of Michigan. I am sure that the merchants in his area will lend their full support, and that they will be, in turn, well-represented on the over-all state committee."

Washnetaw County Rates As State's 'Wool Capital'

Washnetaw County rates as the "wool capital" of Michigan with more than twice as many sheep as in any of the state's other 82 counties.

About 700 of the estimated 2,700 farms in the county have sheep flocks and shearing goes on year-around, with most of the emphasis in this spring months.

There are in the neighborhood of 75,000 sheep in Washnetaw and many are clipped by their owners. Other farmers, especially those with large flocks employ professional shearers.

One of these "custom shearers", Robert Kirk of 14130 Shovelers road, Manchester township has been shearing professionally for 25 years.

Kirk is also vice-president of the Michigan Sheep Shearers Association, leads a team of four to eight specialists who "make the rounds" of large sheep flocks to clip wool fleeces.

More than half a million pounds of wool is sheared in Washnetaw county annually—enough for two suits of clothing for every male resident of the county.

Most wool is sold to the textile mills in the East and South yielding at least \$100,000 of income to Washnetaw farmers every year.

Professional shearers generally use electric clippers and barber from 65 to 75 sheep a piece a day when shearing. It takes from two to six minutes to remove the wool from a sheep and the fleeces average about seven pounds each.

Kirk estimates that he shears from 12,000 to 14,000 sheep every year.

### Crash Near Chelsea Kills Woman, 83

An 83-year-old Sylvan township woman was killed and two other persons were injured last Wednesday afternoon in a two-car collision about three miles south of Chelsea.

Miss Bertha E. Spaulding of 3660 Waltrous Rd., Sylvan township, was pronounced dead at the scene by a doctor. Sheriff's deputies said Miss Spaulding was a passenger in a car driven by her brother, Warren Spaulding, 76, also of 3660 Waltrous Rd., at the time of the crash.

Officers said Spaulding was driving south on M-92 and had started a left turn onto Jerusalem Rd. He turned directly into the path of a car northbound on M-92 operated by Miss Ruth M. Eisenman, 26, of 13155 Waters Rd., Freedom township, deputies said. The impact of the crash hurled Miss Spaulding from the car.

Spaulding, a farmer who made his home with his sister, suffered a fractured left elbow and a visible fracture of the right shoulder, suffered head and body injuries. Both were taken to St. Joseph Mercy Hospital where Spaulding was reported in fair condition and Miss Eisenman is in satisfactory condition.

Prosecuting Attorney William F. Ager, Jr., took a brief statement from Spaulding at the hospital. Ager said an investigation of the crash is continuing. Miss Spaulding is the fifth person to die on county highways in 1958. That record is 13 days behind the pace set last year when the fifth fatality occurred March 19 but almost three months behind the traffic deaths of 1956. That year the fifth fatal accident was recorded on Jan. 7.

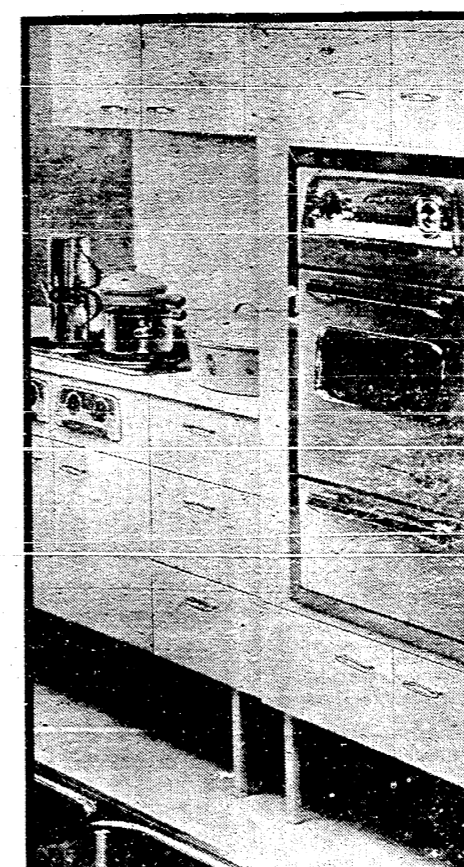





**Michigan Mirror**  
INDUSTRY is booming in Mich-  
igan.  
The state with the problems of  
economic climate" was ranked  
fourth in industrial plant growth  
during the past year and the fu-  
ture looks even brighter.

Consumers Power Co. is plan-  
ning a \$100,000,000 electric gen-  
erating plant on Lake Michigan  
at the mouth of the Big Pigeon  
River, 30 miles west of Grand  
Rapids.  
It required a special act of the  
Michigan legislature to give the  
company use of state-owned sub-  
merged lands.  
The bill would authorize the  
state conservation department to  
grant an easement over 63 acres  
of submerged Lake Michigan land  
in Port Sheldon township, Ottawa  
County.  
President Dan E. Karn said the  
new plant would serve Grand Rap-  
ids, Muskegon, Kalamazoo and the  
other communities in the 41-com-  
munity area supplied with electricity  
by the company.  
Coast to fuel the plant will be de-  
livered by lake boats.  
"We are now in the preliminary  
construction work on the site and  
hope to begin construction of  
breakwaters and a deep ship and  
water intake channel by the sum-  
mer of 1960," he said.  
"Actual plant construction will  
begin this summer with the first  
unit of 260,000-kilowatt capacity  
scheduled to begin operation in  
1962."

The submerged land is shallow  
rivermouth area and because of  
the shallowness of the water, it is  
navigable only by small craft.  
The company's petition to the  
legislature promises that the gen-  
eral public will be able to use the  
breakwater and port for a harbor  
of refuge.

**DEMOCRATS** in Michigan are  
promoting Gov. G. Mennen Wil-  
liams as a presidential candidate  
in 1960. They are getting little co-  
operation from the nation's polli-  
sters.  
It poses the question of what  
Williams intends to do following  
his present term, which will give  
him 12 years in the executive of-

tion (WHO) said in Tokyo that her  
husband has "had enough" and  
will not run for governor again.

2. Michigan Democratic leaders  
wear upset when a Chicago polit-  
ical writer took a poll of 1956 con-  
vention delegates without meet-  
ing Williams.  
3. The palace guard in Lansing  
is running for the governor's  
office. There are Secretary of  
State James M. Hare, Treasurer  
Sanford A. Brown and Lt. Gov.  
John B. Swainson, Supreme Court  
Justice George Edwards is also  
mentioned as a candidate.  
Williams, himself, is non-  
committal, but his close colleagues  
consider this is his last term.  
If Williams holds true to form,  
no one will know for certain until  
the last minute.
