Easter Seal Sale Short of Goal

An annual camp for crippled children will be conducted by the Washtenaw County Society for Crippled Children and Adults, Inc. although returns from the 1959 Easter Seal Sale fell short of the \$11,861 collected last year.

However, the society may have to curtail some of its direct aid to crippled persons during the coming year. Society Treasurer Howard Hilton said.

Total contributions at the end of the sale stood at \$5,865, which is 75.74 per cent of the amount which the group usually raises.

Society officials noted that few additional contributions will be made so that the drive can come near its annual goal.

'Baker's Acres' Famous Resort Has Been Sold

Dr. Earl Baker, who built an 17-capacity motel "into one northern Michigan's leading resorts, has announced that he has sold "Baker's Acres" and will retire.

With his retirement, the famous mothers' vacations given annually by Dr. and Mrs. Baker to deserving Michigan mothers will be curtailed. Mrs. Baker is the former Charlotte Stables, a Manchester intermediate school principal for many years.

Purchasers of the motel area, four miles east of Traverse City are Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Nield and Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Edegren, all of Dearborn. The latter couple has vacationed many summers at Baker's Acres.

Dr. Baker, professionally a music instructor and researcher purchased the motel site in 1936, and built facilities for 18 persons. Now the capacity is 122.

Each fall, he and Mrs. Baker would take selected mothers - usually from large families - into the motel for a week's rest, free of charge. The Bakers entertained the women, planned their itinerary and menus.

Dr. Baker said he would continue to live in a new home he has built adjacent to the acreage. He said he hesitates to completely write out the mothers' vacations but has no plan yet to continue them. He hopes he may be able to do so on a curtailed basis, he added.
