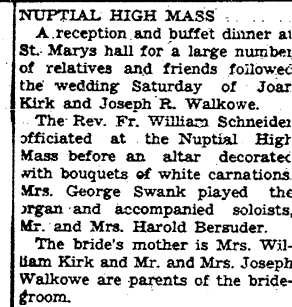

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RESOLUTION TO CONSTRUCT SEWER ON MORGAN STREET.

WHEREAS, a petition has been filed, and a request made to the Village Council to extend and construct a sanitary sewer north on Morgan Street beginning at the intersection of Morgan and Vernon Streets, and the Village Council, after careful investigation of the petition, deems it advisable for the best interest of the inhabitants of the Village of Manchester to construct a 14 inch sewer in accordance with the map, plans and specifications now on file with the Village Clerk and Public Works Department;

NOW THEREFORE, Be it Resolved that a sanitary sewer be constructed on Morgan Street, northwardly beginning at the intersection of Vernon and Morgan Streets, and to run for a distance of 320 feet;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the costs thereof be distributed as follows:

(1) Lot 8 and the south half of Lot 9, block "L", Thomas Morgan's Addition to the Village of Manchester, forty percent (40 percent) of the cost thereof, owned by Robert Berry, and wife, all permit to sell popcorn, peanuts, etc. from Herbert Widmayer site on corner of E. Main St. and Clinton Sts. for a period of one year All years. Carried.

(2) Lots 13 and 14, block "H", Thomas Morgan's Addition to the Village of Manchester, sixteen percent (16 percent) of the cost thereof, owned by Lee Creech and wife.

(3) Lots 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12, block "H", Thomas Morgan's Addition to the Village of Manchester, twenty-four percent (24 percent) of the cost thereof, owned by Clyde and Ruth Lester;

(4) The remaining cost of twenty percent (20 percent) to be paid by the Village of Manchester;

(5) The total estimated cost for said projects is \$1,000.00.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this notice be published in The Manchester Enterprise for two successive weeks, and that a copy thereof be served on each of the owners of the above properties within seven days from passage of this resolution.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Village Council will meet on May 4, 1959, at 7:00 o'clock p.m. in the Village Hall, 150 South Clinton Street, Manchester, Michigan, to hear any suggestions and objections from any persons interested, or liable to be assessed for said project.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that each of the aforementioned properties be levied upon by special assessments to raise the funds in proportion to the percentages set forth in this resolution.

Parr, defeated incumbent William I. Scheel of Salem township on a roll-call vote, 22 to 10. Scheel was serving a second term as chairman, and his name was put into nomination by Supr. John W. Rae of Ann Arbor for an unprecedented third term.

E. A. (Al) Wolter of Scio township was unanimously elected vice-chairman of the board.

Parr, who has been board vice-chairman for the past two years, is on the board's ways and means, legislative, administrator's and county clerk committees. He is a Manchester township farmer.

Wolter, who was appointed to the board in 1957 to succeed the late Albert Trinkle, was recently elected to his third term. He is chairman of the board's legislative and roads and bridges committees, and is a member of the board's equalization, planning and inter-county committees.

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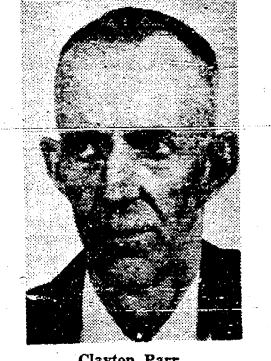
