**MRS. H. T. YUNGCLAS CELEBRATES 95 YEARS**  
Mrs. H. T. Yungclas, Manchester resident, celebrated her ninety-fifth birthday Wednesday, April 29, with an open house and dinner at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Franklin M. Rack. Present from out of town for the birthday were Mrs. Yungclas' son, a son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. William H. Yungclas of Webster City, Iowa.

Although nearing the century mark, Mrs. Yungclas keeps house at 418 East Main, moves around nimbly with the aid of a walker, and keeps a lively interest in ever-day affairs.

Mrs. Yungclas was born near Streator, Illinois, in 1864, when the Civil War had a year to run before the "Stillestness at Appomattox." She has vivid memories of seeing a covered wagon across Illinois, by ferry across the Mississippi, and by wagon

trails across the Iowa plains to a farm near Webster City. Among her experiences are teaching school in the late 1880's in Rapid City in the Black Hills, riding horseback to and from school.

Among the characters inhabiting the Rapid City region in those days were Wild Bill Hickok, Calamity Jane, Red Cloud and Sitting Bull. She has lived through more than one Indian uprising.

After her school teaching days, she and her husband, H. T. Yungclas, farmed near Webster City, Iowa, for sixty-six years. They retired and moved to Manchester in 1946. Her husband passed away in 1932 at the age of ninety.

Her oldest son, James Yungclas, lives at Renwick, Iowa. In all, Mrs. Yungclas has three living children, fourteen grandchildren and eighteen great-grandchildren.

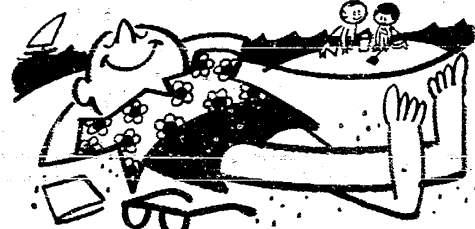

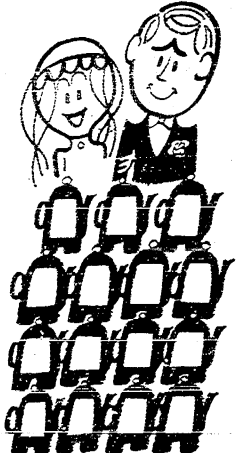

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### Manchester Eyes Extra Tax Election

Tentative approval has been given by the Manchester Board of Education for a special election on a .3-mill extra tax to balance the school operating budget for 1959-60. Two mills were levied this year.

A final decision and election date will be made after the Jackson County Allocation Board decides what portion of 15 mills will be given to the Manchester district, which is a fractional district, lying partly in Jackson county and partly in Washtenaw county.

The district is behind \$63,000 in state aid payments, Dan Boudell, treasurer, reported. It has enough money to meet today's payroll, but bills cannot be paid until some of the state assistance is forthcoming.


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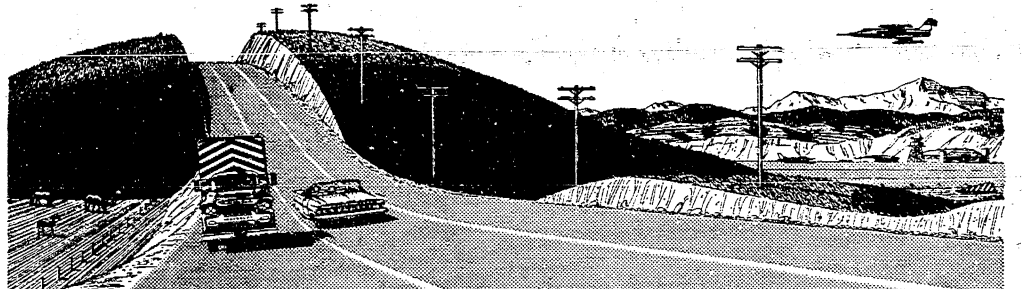
