Jack L. Shipman Named To Head Red Cross Chapter

Jack L. Shipman will lead the Washburn County Chapter of the American Red Cross for the coming year.

Shipman, who lives at 7 Shipman Circle, Ann Arbor, was elected Tuesday evening at the annual meeting of the County Red Cross Chapter at which 175 persons were in attendance.

A resident of Ann Arbor for 30 years, Shipman attended University High school, Yale University and received his AB from the University of Michigan in 1947, after service in the Air Force.

Until 1958 he was District Commercial Superintendent of the Michigan Bell Telephone Co. A member of Theta, a director of the Masonic Temple Association and he received the Distinguished Service Award given by the Junior Chamber of Commerce for outstanding community service for the year 1957. He has been active in many community drives, serving the United Fund, YMCA, and the Red Cross. For the past two years he has been second vice chairman and chairman of Finance of the Red Cross.

—A 19-year-old Bridgewater township youth escaped injury when his 1950-model car was side-swiped by a New York Central freight train in Manchester township.

Harry Sturdevant of 13311 Bemis Rd., was driving south on the Sharon Hollow Rd. when the accident happened. Sturdevant said he heard the warning whistle of the train as he approached the unguarded crossing but was unable to see the freight in time to stop.

The youth slammed on the brakes of his car. The vehicle spun around at the crossing with the rear of the car smashing against the side of the train's locomotive. L. D. Headley, engineer of the train, said he did not see Sturdevant's car until after the collision. The car was demolished.

Largest Cement Plant to Open Soon
FINDLE, Mich.—The nation's largest cement plant will start operations in this Southeastern Michigan community next fall.

Robbie B. Martin, general manager of the Dundee Cement Co., said a combination of factors favored selection of Michigan for the \$30 million plant which will have a capacity of 20 million bags of cement a year.

One of the major factors, he said, was the "market potential." "Engineering studies indicated Michigan is expected to be one of the fastest growing states over the next decade and that the entire Great Lakes area will continue to develop at a quicker pace than the country as a whole," Martin said.

DEARBORN, Mich.—Ford Motor Co. has announced it will spend \$25 million improving its steel manufacturing plant here. The expansion is expected to be completed by 1962.

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NYC ABANDONING LINE HERE
The New York Central has petitioned the Interstate Commerce Commission for permission to abandon 18 miles of its line between Manchester and Jackson. The stretch of track is on the Central's route between Toledo and Jackson.

Only two communities, Napoleon and Norvell, are on the route. Norvell, the line reports, has developed no freight traffic in years and that in and out of Napoleon is rapidly approaching the vanishing point.

Since September there has been no service between Jackson and Napoleon. The daily run has been between Adrian and Manchester with only an occasional run as far as Napoleon.

The Central reports it has lost on the Napoleon-Jackson operation and rehabilitating the line would cost a quarter of a million with no freight improvement in sight to justify the expenditure.


