Employers of the more than 1200 Michigan National Guardsmen are being asked to help make it possible for them to train for active duty in peace and war.

Over the years most employers have been cooperative in granting troopers time off for the two-week summer training period.

Maj. Gen. Ronald D. McDonald, the state's new adjutant general, has asked trade associations and the chambers of commerce in all communities to carry the message to employers.

The training periods run between July 25 and Aug. 22 for all units. Three major installations are involved. Last year all-over training attendance reached a record 97.5 per cent of assigned strength. In his letters to employers and chambers of commerce, Gen. McDonald stressed the importance of training.

Bad check passers are increasing in Michigan, bringing a warning from State Police Commissioner Joseph A. Childs to "treat everybody as a stranger."

An increase of 21 per cent in the number of fraudulent checks processed by the state police during the first four months of 1959 and a 40 per cent increase during May has been reported. Detective Sgt. Fred C. Kelly, head of the fraudulent check detail at state police headquarters, said the increase probably is due to bettering economic conditions.

He explained that, contrary to popular belief, bad check passers are more often successful when the economy is healthy, when there is a general feeling that most people have money to back them up. Kelly's records show that July and August are the months at the height of the tourist and vacation season when most small merchants become the victims of check passers.

Lansing, the hub of the state's government since its early days, is winning up its centennial celebration.

One of the highlights was a four-hour parade west on Michigan Ave. toward the capitol building, watched by 175,000 persons lining the curbs.

The parade theme was "The History of Transportation," featuring the earliest cars made at Detroit and Lansing, covered wagons, ox-drawn carts, bicycles, a helicopter and two airplanes. There were queens - Miss America, Miss Michigan, the Lansing Centennial queen candidates and others.

With the parade, Lansing dramatized its place in history and gave life to its centennial theme - "Tread of the Past - Confident of the Future."

Graduates of Michigan's colleges and universities have a better chance at employment than they did a year ago - but the boom days of the early 1950s are over.

Authorities in education are saying that high school graduates, though in a better position, still would be well advised to continue their education.

When the alma mater rings for the last time at commencement this year, there will be jobs waiting especially for those with good records in science, mathematics and engineering.

Most of the non-specialized graduates will have trouble. The poorest job prospector among the specialists is the geologist. He is entering the profession at a time when industry is reducing exploring activities.

Finally, somebody said it. Taxes must be imposed during the off-election year of the party responsible faces defeat at the polls.

Sen. Haskell L. Nichols, a Republican from Jackson, urged in a debate that "now is the time to act the statesman" and pass a bill to solve the state's financial problems.

He said that next year will be too late - both for the condition of the state and for politicians who want to put their best foot forward to the voters.

He has been meeting frequently with other Commission members and Commission Chairman Elton Rosagart of Drayton Plains, Mich.

COUNTY BAR-B-Q A BIG PROJECT

Washtenaw County Fair Chicken Bar-B-Q, June 14th will require the work of hundreds of people. The barbecues of which there are four, each 40 ft. long will be manned by at least 40 men and women. Two shifts of at least 40 each will be needed.

An anticipated 4000 people are expected to be served.

**SURPLUS FOODS MADE AVAILABLE TO LOW INCOME FAMILIES**

Surplus Foods provided by the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture, the State of Michigan and Washtenaw County, will be made available to Washtenaw County low income families, starting with the June 23rd distribution according to information released by the Washtenaw County Dept. of Social Welfare.

Individuals & families may make an application for the available surplus foods anytime between the hours of 8:30 A.M. and 11:45 A.M. Monday thru Fri. in Room 35 in the basement of the County Building in Ann Arbor.

Foods which are available at this time include butter, rice, dried milk, corn meal, white and whole wheat flour and dried eggs.

Surplus foods are distributed on the fourth Tuesday of each month by Russell's Grocery in Ypsilanti and Ann Arbor Packing Company in Ann Arbor.

If an applicant is approved for surplus foods by the Welfare Dept., he is provided with an identification card which includes the name of the store where he is to pick up his surplus foods.

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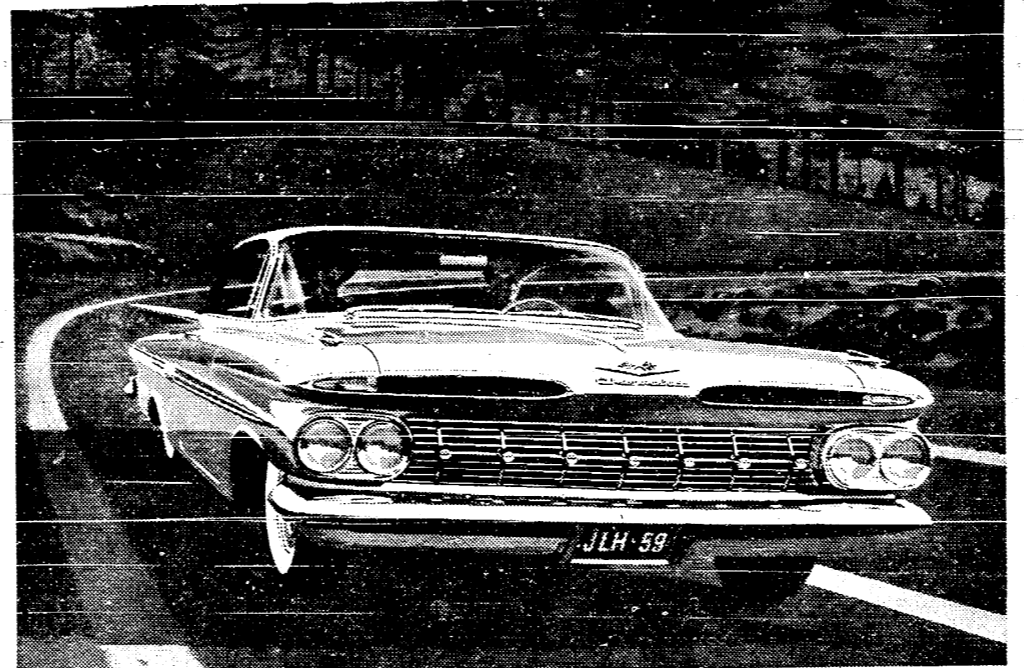
