Michigan Mirror

School Problem Seen As Hot Issue in State

If the 1959 Legislature had not had a tax squabble this year, by far the hottest issue of the session would have been schools — especially the Little Red Schoolhouse.

The question of providing a school aid formula for Michigan's more than 2,300 school districts was debated in party caucus sessions, in committees and on the floor of both houses.

It was put aside temporarily in the Senate to become a final order of business before adjournment. The Senate, however, made quick work of a controversial House-approved bill to force consolidation of districts not having high schools. The bill was studied in the Senate Education Committee.

Michigan has a basic pattern of school district organization that Linn M. Bartlett, state superintendent of public instruction, said was "established in the middle of the 19th Century to meet the needs of a pioneer society and a frontier economy."

Bartlett was primary backer of the bill to require all districts to operate kindergartens through 12th grade programs by July 1, 1962. The districts not now having a K-12 program would have a choice of annexation or consolidation if they did not choose to run their own high schools.

Opponents of the measure said it would give Bartlett's office powers of a "dictatorship." The K-12 bill prompted the largest public hearing of the 1959 session. March 18, it passed the House by a 66-36 vote late in May.

One-room schoolhouses are fast fading from Michigan. In the 11-year period ending in 1957, the total number of school districts had been cut in half, according to a study by the Citizens' Research Council of Michigan.

"It appears that those districts which are too small to offer a desirable range of educational opportunities are gradually disappearing from the Michigan scene, but far too many of them still exist," the council said.

Figures supplied by the Citizens' Research Council of Michigan show Michigan 10th among 48 states in combined state and local expenditures per pupil for local schools.

The Michigan expenditure of \$405 was 82% or 11% per cent more per pupil than the 48-state average.

The council also noted Michigan spent \$8.63 per \$1,000 of personal income on combined state-local expenditures for local schools.

The \$8.63 figure was \$4.23 or 34.5% per cent more per \$1,000 personal income than the 48-state average.

Other figures supplied by the

Research Council showed that the University of Michigan and Michigan State University had higher undergraduate tuition for resident students in the 1958-59 academic year than all other public universities except Ohio State.

MSU charged \$235 and UM \$250, compared with the next highest, Purdue, at \$225. Ohio State was high with \$275.

Michigan's one-man grand jury system won its fight for life in the Legislature this year.

The Senate Judiciary Committee tabled a House-approved bill to repeal the one-man jury system.

When Gov. G. Mennen Williams signed the present grand jury system into law in 1951, he said he felt the Legislature had made an "apparently substantially effective effort to remedy the defects of the one-man grand jury system and to prevent further abuses which brought the institution into disrepute in the past."

Michigan's present law is a modification of the statute used in the famous Carr-Sigler grand jury investigation in Lansing involving legislators and lobbyists.

The juror was Circuit Judge Leland W. Carr, now a state supreme court justice. The late Kim Sigler, who later became governor, was the prosecutor.

One of the key figures in a slaying believed to be linked with the Carr-Sigler grand jury is dead.

When Pete Mahoney, Southern Michigan Prison inmate, died in the University of Michigan Medical Center, Warden William Mahoney knew nothing about the 1948 murder of State Sen. Warren Hooper, a grand jury witness.

Mahoney was sentenced for robbery, but Sigler was hopeful he would one day give a clue to the unsolved Hooper slaying.

OUTDOOR TELEPHONE BOOTHS are really handy to have around—so much so, in fact, that a vacationer was found living in one in the resort town of Carolina Beach, N. C. He had set up housekeeping with an old broom, a small oil stove, a frying pan, cooking oil, eggs and cheese. There seems to be no limit to the convenience of these outdoor booths. New Tissue Test For Alfalfa
 MSU soil science department has set up a new tissue analysis service for determining whether alfalfa plants are short on boron.
 "Farmers can take the top 2-3 inches from about 25 plants, let them dry naturally and ship them to the University soil testing laboratory at East Lansing, for the analysis," according to Ray Cook, head of the soil science department. The analysis service costs \$2.
 Boron deficiencies are spotty in Michigan, Cook says. "But they generally show up on soils that are alkaline or only slightly acid," he explains.
 "If alfalfa looks good," the scientist says, "there is little reason to test for boron. Yellowing in alfalfa fields that is not due to leafhopper feeding is likely to indicate a boron deficiency."
 The new service was initiated because conventionally used soil testing procedures were found to be inaccurate when it came to testing for boron, Cook notes.

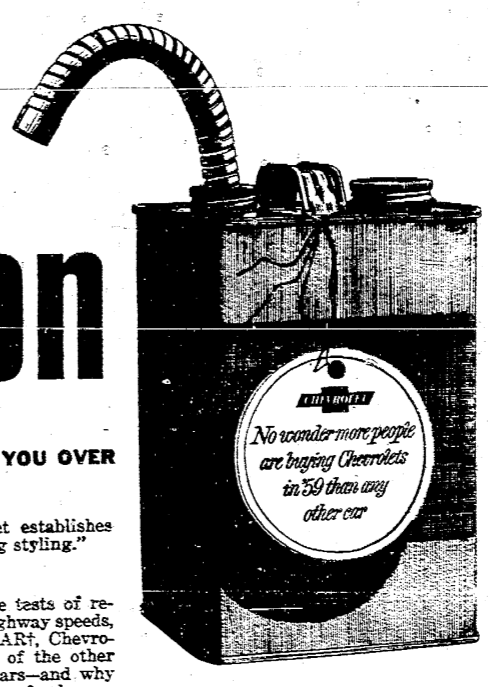

Tips For Keeping Tiles In Place

The drains in sandy and organic soils present two big problems — keeping the unstable soils out and holding the firmly in place, according to Willard A. Cutler, agricultural engineer at MSU.

"Thin sheets of vinyl plastic and duramat can keep tile from getting out of line or tipping on end," Cutler explains.

"There place a continuous plastic sheet in the ground, and then lay the tile on top of it. Cutler says the material is water tight and will keep sand from entering the tile at the bottom of the joints."

Cutler recommends glass mats to keep fine soil out and let water in. "Otherwise," he explains, "the drains may fill up and then they become almost useless."

"You may need to use both the stabilizing material and a fiber filtering mat in muck fields or in fine sandy soils," says Cutler.

"Most drainage contractors have information about these new materials," the engineer notes.

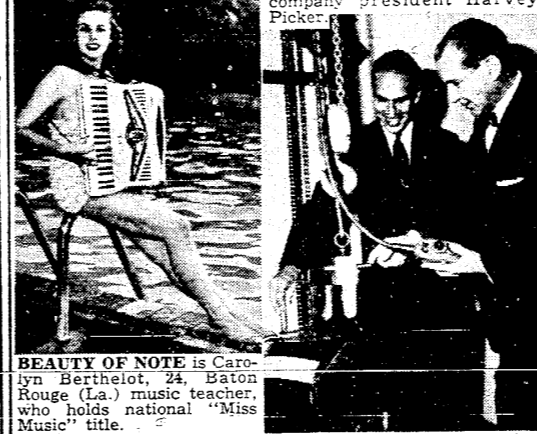
