## Population INCREASES

A research analyst of the County Planning Commission calculated that the population of the county will be between 173,000 and 177,000 when the U. S. government makes its official census next year. Using a system recommended by the U. S. Census Bureau Harry Gold says this would be an increase of about 35,400 over the official census of 134,606 men, women and children in the county in 1950. The planning commission will publish Gold's figures later, the first time in the history of the county that such accurate figures on the county's population in off-census years has been made available. It is figured that the county's population at the moment is 169,300, an increase of 34,794 since 1950. From April 1, 1950 to April 1, 1958 the population of the county grew from 134,605 persons to an estimated total of 164,300, an increase of 29,700 persons or 22 percent. Washtenaw county has been increasing in population during the past ten years at a faster rate than the United States or the East North Central States. The County's average annual rate of growth has been 2.5 per cent per year, compared to 1.7 rate for the East North Central States and 1.5 for the U. S. as a whole. All communities in the county experienced population increases except Superior township which lost 1/5 of its population between 1950 and the present. Some communities grew fast while others remained almost the same size as 10 years ago. The 1950 figures in parenthesis are as follows:

Ann Arbor city, 65,000 (50,077), 29 1/2 percent; Ann Arbor township, 3,100 (2,795), 10.9 percent; Manchester village, 1,500 (1,388), 8.1 percent; Manchester township, 960 (907), 4.7 percent; Milan, 450 (2,073), 18.2 percent; Saline city, 2,050 (1,533), 33.8 percent; Saline township, 930 (933), .4 percent; Sharon township, 700 (670), 4.5 percent; Sylvan township, 1,200 (731), 23.6 percent. Other nearby town increases are Chelsea, 2,700 (2,380), 4.7 percent; Dexter village, 1,600 (1,307), 21 percent; Freedom township, 940 (890), 5.6 percent; Bridgewater township, 1,100 (939), 9.7 percent.

## Erwin C. Roller Manchester Painter Dies At Age 53

Erwin George Roller, 53, of 326 Ann Arbor St., Manchester, an area painter most of his life, died Thursday afternoon at University Hospital in Ann Arbor following a long illness. Mr. Roller was born Nov. 19, 1905, at Manchester, a son of George & Anna Funk Roller. He & Bernadine Schoeing were married in 1924. She survives. Survivors in addition to his wife include a son, Diane Roller, of Manchester; four grandchildren, four brothers, John, Frederick, Herman & Albert Roller, of Manchester; and two sisters, Mrs. Anna Scheen of Detroit and Mrs. Bertha Collins of Chelsea. Funeral services were held at 2:30 p. m. Sunday at the Jenter Funeral Home in Manchester, with the Rev. Jesse Epps officiating. Burial followed in Oak Grove Cemetery, Manchester. Mr. Roller had been employed at the Double A Products Company for the past 7 1/2 years.

## Manchester Lacks Two Teachers

For the first time in many years the Manchester school system opened short two teachers. There is no regular teacher assigned to the first grade and no vocal teacher. Mrs. Ted Peame, who taught vocal music in the schools last year was offered a position in the Grand Rapids school system and resigned his post, according to Superintendent Robert Masten. He pointed out that Mr. Peame could not be captured for his decision to change positions at the last moment because the Grand Rapids appointment offers the teacher many advantages which Manchester could not, and is a class A school. Janice Klager is substiting as a first grade teacher for the first two weeks of school to enable school officials to try to secure another teacher. Miss Klager is a senior at Michigan State University. Two new bus drivers have been hired. Armin Hauesler will replace Ray Hoener and Claude Gage is another bus driver added to the staff. Head of the bus drivers is Alvin Clark who is also a custodian of the Nellie Jackson school. Other custodians in the school system are David Curtis, Bill Lemming and Louis Tool in the Manchester schools and Mrs. Minnie Cerwinka at the Pleasant Lake school. With the new Nellie Jackson addition ready for occupancy the school officials invite the district residents to see what they have built at less cost per square foot than the most inexpensive house. The lack of state monies has financially embarrassed most government controlled agencies. The school board has had many discussions about the lack of funds for school operation. The unanimous consensus of opinion is that the local school board will borrow money to operate as long as this avenue is available. If the time comes that no money is available, drastic action will have to be taken. In all probability it is felt that the tax statement will not exist this long.

### HEARING ON REZONING SET FOR SEPTEMBER 30

The Manchester Township zoning board will hold a public hearing Wednesday, September 30 at 8 p. m. to consider rezoning the property just east of the village limits from agricultural to business. It is reported that the 500 foot frontage on Austin Road is being considered as a possible tavern site. The meeting will be held at the Manchester township hall.

### MICHIGAN CHORALE

A four-engine Super Constellation airliner carrying 100 teen-age Michigan Chorale singers home from a European concert tour made an emergency landing at Detroit Metropolitan Airport Tuesday after one of the engines failed. The chartered Flying Tiger craft developed engine trouble shortly after taking off from Gander, Newfoundland, on the last leg of a flight from Helsinki, Finland. The plane made a safe landing but airport fire trucks and emergency stood by. There were 112 passengers on the plane, including 100 members of the Michigan Chorale, a teen-age singing group, and a dozen adult counselors. The group has just concluded a two-month good-will concert tour in several European countries.

### New Hours For Library

New hours for Manchester Township Library have been approved by the library board to meet the needs of the community when the library opens September 15. Mrs. Lorna Scully, the new librarian at the local library, will welcome suggestions for bettering the service for the twenty-four hours per week that the library is required to be open to the public. The following schedule includes two noon hours, one early and one late in the week, to enable school bus transported children to return and check out books during the week. It also includes two evenings in the middle of the week for extra study hours and for adult use. In accordance with schedules for many small libraries, all day Monday and Saturday afternoon and evening are closed. For your convenience, our following twenty-four hour per week schedule out and put on your bulletin board: Tuesday 12:00 to 8:00 p. m. Wednesday 1:00 to 8:00 and 7:00 to 9:00 Thursday 1:00 to 8:00 and 7:00 to 8:00 Friday 12:00 to 8:00 Saturday 9:30 a. m. to 12:30 p. m. Book fines will not be imposed for the days the library has been closed—August 24 to September 15.

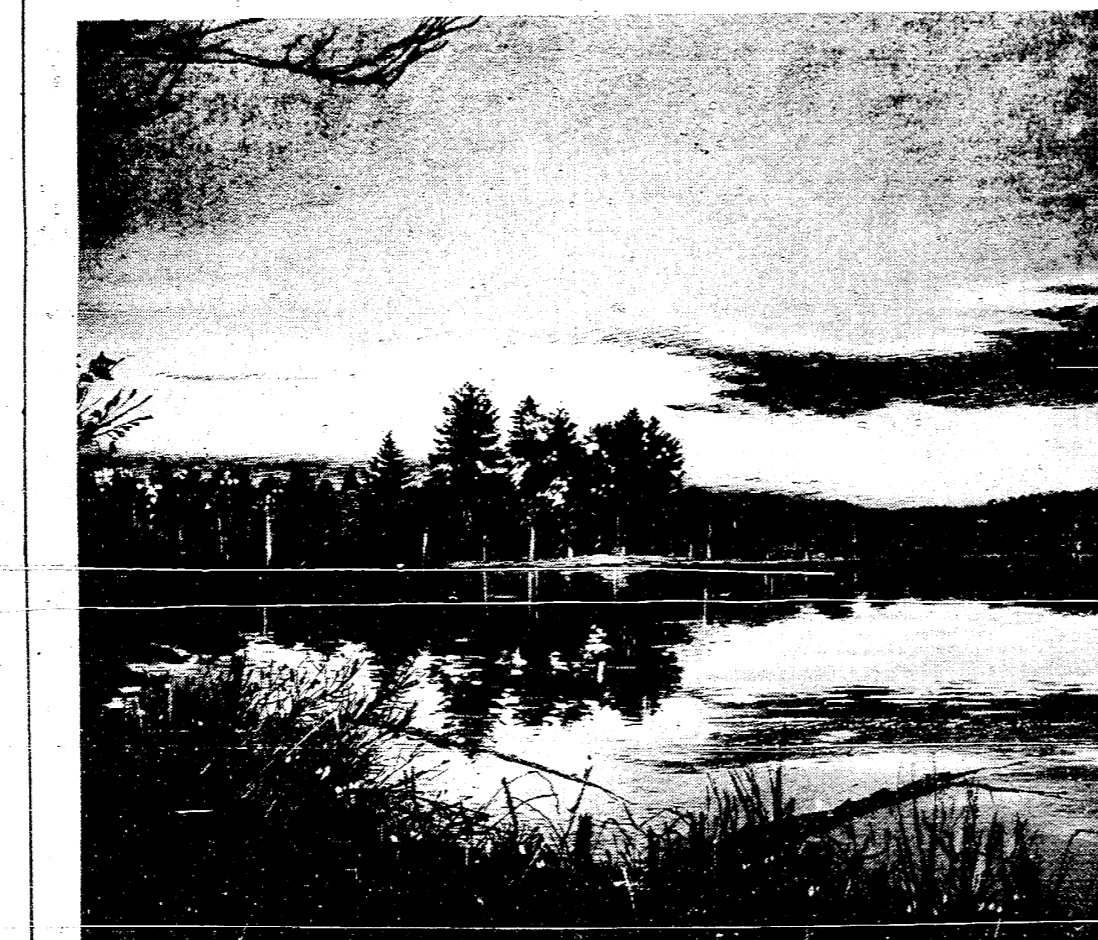
