COMMUNITY FUND

Manchester Area 1959-60 United-Community Fund and Red Cross Drive goal will be \$2,000. President James C. Hendley announced this week. Final action on the budget for the campaign was taken at a meeting of directors last Wednesday night. Budget Committee Chairman, Walter Schable, presented the budget, which his committee has been studying for the past month. The largest increase is in the Manchester recreation account. The past year's record for the Recreation Department warrants the substantial increase requested, the board decided. Attendance at playground this summer averaged 95 boys and girls per day for the eight-week period—the largest number in the history of the playground program.

This year's quota is only \$338 more than was raised in last year's drive, which went over the top by \$662. Other organizations among the 43 sharing in the drive are the Manchester Clovers, Manchester High School Council, High School Band, Pleasant Lake School, Carr Park Association, the Salvation Army (county and national), Boy Scouts, American Red Cross (bloodmobile), Michigan United Fund (includes 31 different agencies), Michigan Crippled Children, and Volunteers of America.

Mrs. Louis Vogel, campaign and business chairman, announced the following chairman: Mrs. John Bunney, organizations: Mrs. Phillip Kern, out-of-town business; Mrs. Hazel Walker, rural; Mrs. James Baker, village; James C. Hendley, industrial; and Mrs. Frankis Rock, campaign supplies and publicity. Captains for Mrs. Baker's village teams include Mrs. Earl Koebe, Mrs. John Pippenger, Mrs. Delbert Ludwig and Mrs. Wilbur Maurer.

Rural captains will be announced next week by Mrs. Walker.

This year's campaign is scheduled for October 12 through 24, with emphasis on reaching the goal in the two-week period.

"This is the eleventh year that the Manchester area has held a United Fund Drive," says Mr. Hendley. "The area has exceeded its quota in nine out of ten campaigns, a record equalled by few communities of our size in Michigan."

HAY LOST IN FIRE

Upon arriving they found a stack of 3,500 to 4,000 bales of hay burning within 100 feet of the house and farm buildings. At one time the roof of the house caught fire, but was extinguished with little damage.

The entire Clinton department was at the scene for more than two hours, after which about half of the equipment returned to the village in the event of another fire. Eight men stood by to watch the fire which was expected to burn for some time. The cause has not been determined.

MUSIC TO GROW BY

Children and music go together. In the world of sound, children naturally learn to love beauty, harmony, rhythm. The only limits to their musical horizons are the limits of the music they hear. A five-year old we know, asked to name her favorite recordings, answered, "Bozo the Clown and Brahms' Fourth." At five there are no "classics" just music to hear and enjoy.

Modern parents recognize the important part music plays in their children's development. Good music, reproduced with true fidelity, provides a healthy mental stimulus that builds into a life-time of pleasure. And there is no better way to awaken a child's interest in playing a musical instrument than through a program of carefully selected recordings reproduced on a high-fidelity, stereophonic phonograph.
