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90th YEAR

"How does it seem to be 90 years old?" Kindly Mrs. Charles Altenbernt repeated the question asked her by a reporter. "When I think I'm really that old it doesn't seem possible. When I used to read about others celebrating their 90th birthday I never dreamed I'd live that long. Sometimes as I think back to my own childhood and the early years of my married life it does seem far away and a long time ago. Things have changed so much. The young folks today would have a hard time adjusting themselves to the old ways. As I look back it seems that we had more time to do things. Today everyone is in such a hurry. But then I guess we used to hurry too."

Mrs. Altenbernt is the former Margaret Bross, daughter of the late Henry and Anna Bross, who was born on a farm in Freedom township, October 7, 1869. Nicknamed "Maggie" when she was a little girl she is best known as Maggie Altenbernt.

The couple began their married life February 8, 1890, on a farm in Freedom township. Times were hard and farming was a real struggle, particularly if there wasn't much money to do with. Mrs. Altenbernt knows what it means to "kill the soil" and she didn't get the information from a book. Many a field she has plowed and her husband in their farm work. Maggie knew well the steps necessary to produce a pound of butter, for she not only churned, she milked the cows.

With the outside work, the cooking, the baking and sewing for six children, I found no time for recreation. Evenings after the children were safely tucked in bed I did the sewing by lamp light. We didn't buy clothes 'ready to wear' in those days. I made all the overalls for the boys and in the winter they were lined with flannel for extra warmth."

One of her profit-making enterprises on the farm was the raising of turkeys. This was hard work she pointed out and a person always had to be watchful of the turkey who would steal a nest. The sizes of her flocks varied but she remembers that the last flock she raised was an even hundred birds for market. The money which the turkey buyers paid came in very handy.

Maggie's heart has been heavy many times through the years. Two of her sons, Clarence and Erwin have died. Her husband died in May 1943. This climaxed over 60 years of farming. Then she and her son Ernest moved to their present address at 702 Vernon Street. She also has three daughters, Mrs. Fred (Martha) Toelle and Mrs. Bert (Alma) Uphaus of (Frieda) Baser of Jackson. She has 9 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren. She also has one sister-in-law, Mrs. Louise Woodhurst of Jackson. Because of a heart condition the doctor has restricted her

activities. She cooks the meals for her son and herself, and now and then bakes a pie or cake. Then too, many are the cookies grandma has made for the great-grandchildren. Their visits are somewhat limited now for she requires more rest and quiet.

For pass time she sews carpet rags and can thread a needle either with or without her glasses. Today her heavier housework is done by her daughters. Sometimes she goes to Jackson to visit her daughter for several weeks at a time. She enjoys company and likes to keep up on current events. She stands straight and tall, is able to walk out around the yard and definitely doesn't look to be ninety years old.

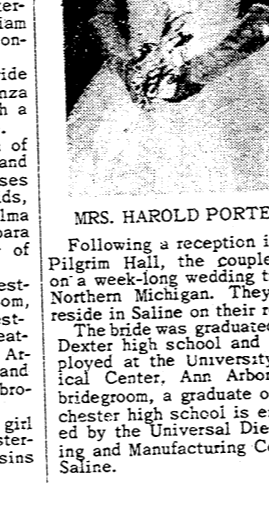

The local students are among 10,000 of the highest scorers on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test. The Semifinalists named today outscored over 550,000 classmates and thus moved a step closer to the goal of all-winning one of the coveted Merit Scholarships to be awarded in the 1959-60 Program.

The Semifinalists now face another rigorous three-hour examination, which will further confirm their high scores on the NMSQT. This second test will be given on December 5, 1959. Those who repeat their high scores on this second test will become Finalists in the competition.

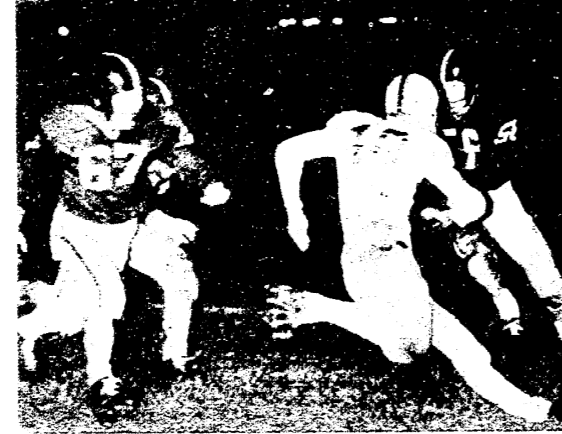
In the final phase of the competition, high school grades, extra-curricular activities, school citizenship, and leadership qualities of the students will be evaluated along with the scores on the tests.

About May 1, 1960, the names of the Merit Scholars will be announced, the exact number depending on the degree of sponsor support of the Merit Program.

The competition is open to students in any public, private or parochial high school in the United States and possessions.

SCHOOL BUS LAW

David H. Soule, co-ordinator of Washtenaw school bus driver education, says the number of violation tickets issued represents "an alarming ignorance" of the bus-passing law by motorists here. The law requiring motorists to stop for school buses applies on all highways in the county except divided expressways outside of city or village limits of a community, Dexter and Manchester are the only villages which have passed local ordinances requiring motorists to stop for standing school buses within their corporate limits. The Washtenaw police agencies have issued a new warning to motorists about violating the state law which forbids passing a stopped school bus from either direction. Sheriff's deputies and state troopers have issued a total of 10 tickets for violation of this law in the past two days, it was learned.

Officers said many of the persons ticketed said they were not even aware of the provisions of the law. Authorities reminded drivers that the law requires cars and trucks to come to a complete stop when approaching from the front or from the rear of a school bus which has stopped to load or unload children.

Municipal Court Judge Francis L. O'Brien has indicated that all persons charged with failure to stop in front of or behind a standing school bus will be required to appear before him. Many traffic violation tickets can be taken care of by paying in the stipulated fines, but the judge is deeply concerned about the bus-passing tickets.

Some officers said they were told by ticketed motorists that they had expected to see the mechanical arm on the bus working and when they failed to see it, moved on. School and police officers emphasized that the mechanical signal is no longer in use by school buses. The only signal required by school buses when stopping is the alternately flashing amber signal lights on the rear and front of the vehicle they said.

Most bus drivers are trained to put those lights on well before they stop in order to give motorists nearby ample opportunity to observe them.

Officers say that when children are getting on or off a bus it is impossible to tell in which direction they might run. The law is designed to prevent a child from being hit by a car through his own carelessness or through that of the motorist.

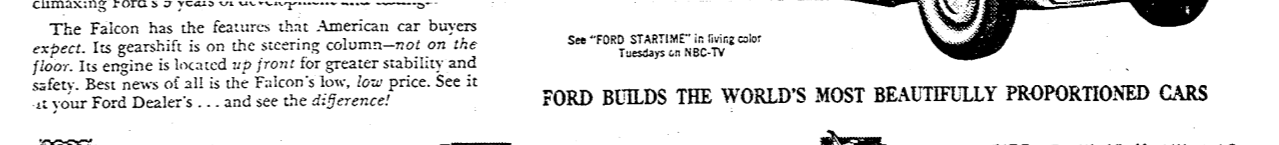

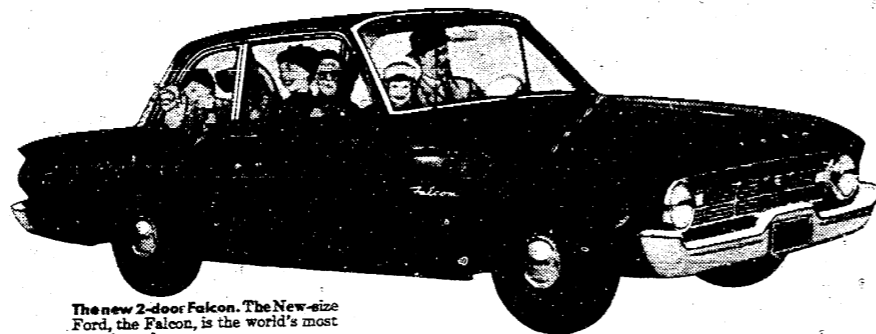
