## COMMITTEE STUDIES PUBLIC UTILITIES PUBLIC WORKS UNIT

Clayton Parr of Manchester township, chairman of the board of Supervisors has been authorized by the board to appoint a study committee to consider a proposed County Department of Public Works.

The committee will be instructed to work with governmental units in surrounding areas, including the city and mayor of Ann Arbor. Mayor Cecil O. Criss has expressed his opposition to the proposal of Supervisor William I. Scheel of Salem township, and "concern" about the proposal has been expressed by the Ypsilanti City Council.

The Salem supervisor said he believes that the county has given to such a point that it must consider such a department and that the creation of a county Department of Public Works would prevent a duplication of facilities.

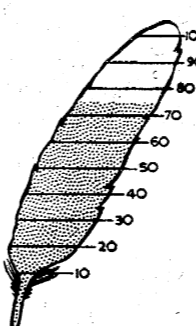
Wilfred de St. Aubin, executive director of the Washtenaw County Chapter of the Red Cross was elected president of the health division of the Bureau of Community Services.

A mud-covered Dutch football team thrilled the Manchester Homecoming crowd last Friday night by defeating University High School of Ann Arbor 12-0 on the local gridiron.

Manchester's first touchdown came in the first quarter of the game. Quarterback Ralph England carried the ball over the goal line for the Dutchmen from the 15 yard line.

In the fourth quarter University High's eleven penetrated to the Dutch 12 yard line, only to lose possession to Manchester. After a one-yard gain by the Dutch, England, aided by a key block thrown by Jim Miller, sped 88 yards down field for the second Manchester touchdown of the game.

Outstanding man defensively was Dave Shadley who made a key tackle in the fourth quarter to stop University High's threatening march toward the Dutch goal. Other key men on defense for Manchester were Bob Nickerson, Terry Huber, and Terry Ayers.

SENIORS AT WORK

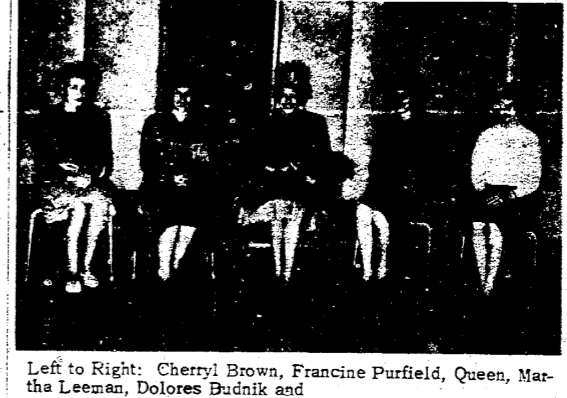

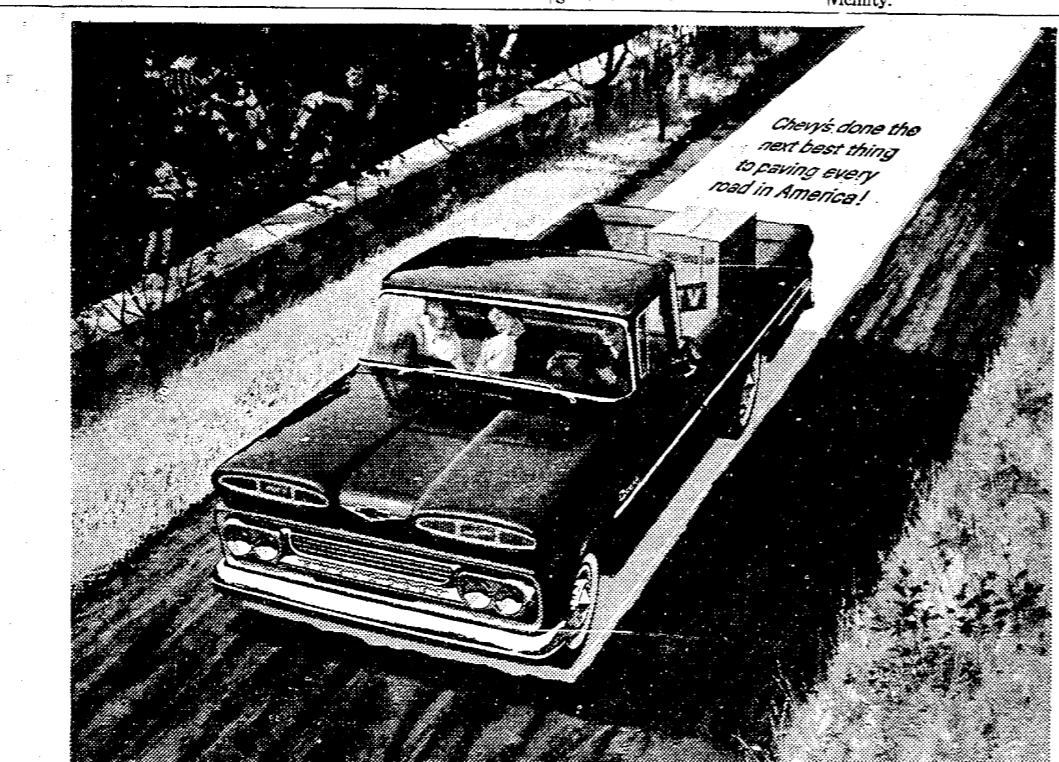
