Ypsilanti To Dedicate New Police Building

Ypsilanti's new Police Department building was formally dedicated in public ceremonies preceding an open house Sunday.

Commissioner Joseph A. Childs of the Michigan State Police is scheduled to attend the dedication and speak briefly.

Nearly 300 invitations to the dedication have been sent to local and area civic, municipal and law enforcement officials, as well as former members of the Police Department, Chief Emil A. Susterka said today.

The police station, completed last month at a cost of about \$215,000, is the first such new municipal building to be constructed here in years.

Road Aide Says Autos Not Hurt By Rock Salt

The rock salt spread on ice and snow-covered Michigan highways does not damage your car, a state highway engineer said today.

S. W. DuBee, chief road maintenance engineer for the State Highway Department, has debunked the popular notion that sodium and calcium chlorides eat into auto bodies.

Many motorists brand rock salt the curse of winter driving.

"Not so," said DuBee. "Ironically, the stronger the salt solution and the colder the weather, the less corrosive it is to cars."

"In fact, I've been told by engineers that rainwater is more corrosive than the salt solution we use to melt ice on highways."

Talk of Experiments

DuBee said the department experimented with anti-corrosive solutions that can be added to rock salt but abandoned the idea "because they aren't worth much."

Complaints about salt damage to cars have fallen off con-

siderably since World War II, he said.

"We got a lot of complaints during the last years of the war and right afterward because lots of motorists had cars that were almost 10 years old and starting to fall apart," he said.

"They blamed the solution we were using for causing the rust."

25,000 Tons Stocked

Preparing for winter's onslaught, the Highway Department and county road commissions have stocked 25,000 tons of rock salt.

Wayne county, the largest user because of heavy traffic, got about 10,000 tons. DuBee estimated about 100,000 tons would be needed during the winter to keep highways open in bad weather.

"I know the winter resort people are hoping for an early snow, but I'm not," he said.

"I think we deserve a break this year. Last winter was the earliest, longest and worst in the 26 years I've been with the Highway Department."

"Key to Family Fun by Car" was the theme of a talk given by Miss Carol Lane, an authority on Automobile travel director of Shell Oil Company when she spoke in Ann Arbor High School Auditorium, Monday, November 2nd.

Miss Lane will employ visual aids in demonstrating how to pack, how to travel easily with children and the art of vacation budgeting. She will also discuss other vacation ideas, such as how to take a "tourlette" on week ends.

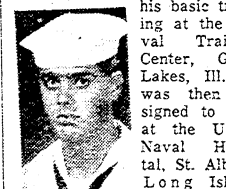

Sentenced in Death of 15-Year-Old Girl

Two 18-year-old youths who were involved in a drag race on a country road last May 7 that resulted in the death of a 15-year-old girl were sentenced Wednesday by Circuit Judge John Simpson to serve 15 months to 2 years in prison.

Horace A. Leeke, of 11523 Sharon Valley Rd., and his companion on that fateful day, Bradley M. Harris, of 413 Mill Rd., Norvell, took the sentence calmly. The father of one of the boys broke down and cried.

COURT COMMENTS

Both young men had pleaded guilty Oct. 14 to a charge of negligent homicide in connection with the death of Sharon Clark, of 3005 Esplanade Rd., Grass Lake. The charge carries a maximum term of two years.

Along with the sentence Judge Simpson said he was recommending the two youths be transferred to the Cassidy Lake Training school.

Before passing sentence Judge Simpson told the two young men: "I have given this case much deliberation. This is a deplorable situation and the court always wonders if it has done the right thing. But whatever I do here cannot bring that girl back."

ON NORVELL RD.

Miss Clark died of injuries she received after a motor scooter on which she was riding with Robert Sellers, 16 of Grass Lake, was struck by a car driven by Leeke. The accident occurred on Norvell Rd. while Leeke and Harris were racing.

Sellers was critically hurt and hospitalized.

According to Assistant Prosecutor James G. Fleming, the sentencing of Harris is the first time in the state that a person involved in a fatal automobile accident, but not the driver of the death car, was ever convicted of negligent homicide.

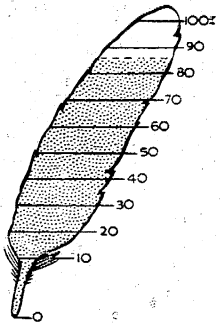
COMMUNITY FUND

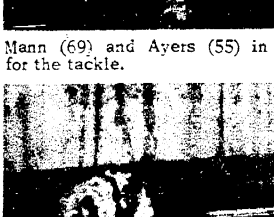
