NEW PARKING REGULATIONS AT SCHOOLS

Superintendent of Schools, Robert Masten, draws attention to the No Parking signs in front of the intermediate school and the Nellie Ackerson school, also Beaufort street (on the west side of the school) there is one way going north. These two new regulations he said were requested by the Village council as safety precautions for children crossing the road and being picked up by private cars. The school board has also requested a signal system for M-92. This Masten said will no doubt take time, as it must go through channels from the village council to the State Highway Department.

At the present time the State owes the school district here \$25,000 in back payments. There is enough money at this time for two more paydays and the regular monthly bills. The Board has held up \$12,000 in payments for yearly supplies. At the present time the State financial crisis makes school budgeting almost impossible, the superintendent said.

He noted that any child attending Manchester public school for a period of years will have many records of achievement and abilities on file in their principals office. This material is available for instructors and principal-parent conferences. Much of this information will be used for counseling in future years. This month there will be a testing program. All Third, fifth and seventh graders will take the California Mental Maturity Test. This is one form of an I. Q. test and will help determine a child's potential academic abilities.

Another note of interest is that the parent-teacher organization here has achieved the highest membership in Manchester history. The final membership drive held in the classrooms indicates that Mrs. Threl's sixth grade has the greatest parent membership. Mrs. Hausner's third grade second and Mrs. Flood's first grade is third.

The school calendar for the rest of the month includes the Manchester-Clinton Football game on November 13. The Senior play at the Intermediate school will be held on November 19 and 20 at 8 p. m. The name is "Meet Me In Saint Louis." The Band Boosters pancake supper at the Intermediate school is set for November 21 and school lets out for Thanksgiving Vacation November 26 and 27. On December 3rd there will be a P. T. A. Carnival at the Pleasant Lake School.

CONFERENCE IN METHODIST CHURCH

"The Fulfillment Years" is the name given to an older adult laboratory conference scheduled to be held in the Methodist Church in Manchester Michigan the week beginning November 15th. The Emmanuel, Evangelical and Reformed Church (The United Church of Christ) will participate with the Methodist Church in the school.

About twenty leaders from the state will be in attendance along with about thirty guests from the local Churches. The host pastors for the school are the Reverend Mr. Jesse Epps and the Reverend Mr. Ralph Kuehner. Resource leaders include: Dr. Wilma Donahue of the Department of Gerontology of the University of Michigan; Professor Woodrow Hunter, Research Assistant in Geriatrics at the U of M; Rev. Walter S. Ryan, Conference Director of Adult Work; and Rev. Byron Hatch, Minister at Escanaba, and Leader in Conference Adult Work.

The goal of the school is "better leadership and program for Older Adults in the local church. Better use of materials, facilities and resources of the Churches."

ANOTHER RECORD FOR MANCHESTER

One hundred percent was reached by the Manchester United Community Fund and Red Cross Drive one month from the opening date. Another record for Manchester \$8,016.01 was reported by November 31. There are still several organizations that want to make their donations after early November meetings according to Mrs. John Bunney, chairman of that division. The final report will be made the first week in December.

Unlike many fund collections most of Manchester's is in cash rather than pledges, which makes the record even more outstanding according to James C. Hendley, Community Chest Board president. The only portion of the Drive that is in pledges this year is 12% donated by the Double A Company and Union and 11% donated by the Ford Motor Company employees who live in this area and give through payroll deduction. The breakdown according to Divisions for the Drive is as follows to date:

Approximately 30% from the Industrial Division which includes the Ford Motor Company employees in the area. Double A Company and Union, Manchester Tool and Die, Chrysler Proving and Chrysler Company, Michigan Gas Storage, Union Construction Company and Wolverine Pipeline. The total for this division is \$2,463.10.

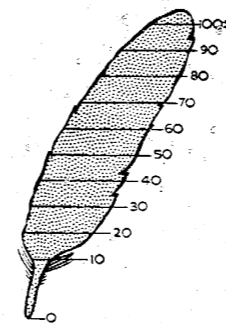
Business Division, including Main Street Businessmen, Manchester Public School staff and students, Schaffer Lumber and Ready Mix and out of town business reached \$2773.05 or about 36% to date. A slight increase is expected in this division according to Mrs. Phillip Kern, chairman of the out of town business solicitation. Residential Division attained over 31% with a \$2,523.86 collection from house-to-house solicitation in both village and rural areas in the Manchester school district and southwestern Washtenaw County.

The remaining 3% was collected from organizations and other contacts and totaled \$256.00.

At the beginning of the Drive, many Manchester people heard the talk, reproduced on WPAG, that Dr. Kenneth McFarland gave at the Ann Arbor United Fund kickoff meeting. He said, "Communities either make success a habit or failure a habit."

According to Mrs. Louis Vogel, Manchester's United Community Fund and Red Cross Drive campaign and business chairman, "Manchester is fortunate. Our citizens, our industries, our businessmen and those entrusted with the education of our children—our teachers, are willing to back our United Fund Campaign and are content with nothing less than attaining the goal."

Michigan Bell Telephone Company has started distributing its new telephone directories in four local communities, according to Nicholas J. Praliken, manager for the company in the Ann Arbor area.

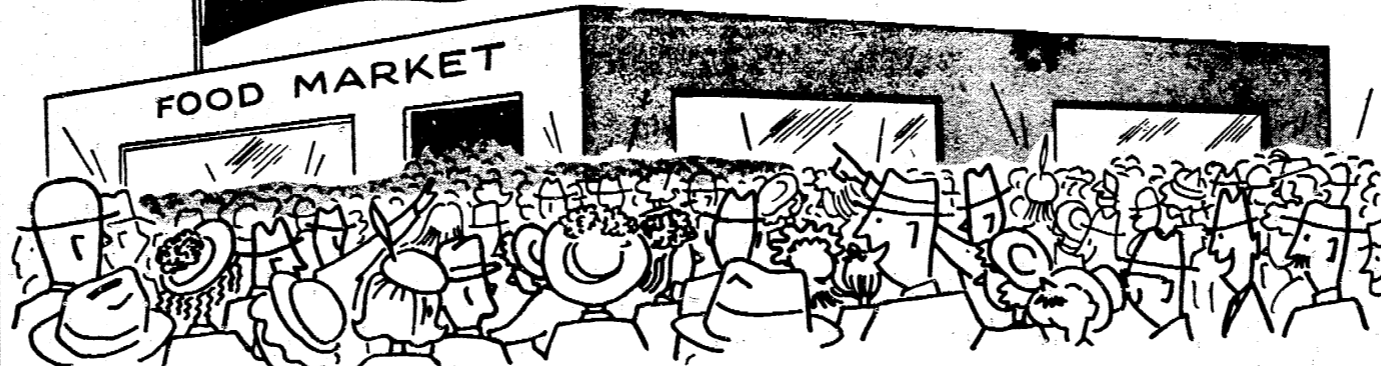
