Opening-Day Deer Hunting Good Despite Coldest Nov. 15 In Memory

In line with their usual first full Saturday-Sunday upsurge, Michigan deer hunters went back to their stump-settin' chore this weekend with a long-range promise of moderate weather. (maybe just a little fresh snow) and memories—of heavy evidence—of one of the most unusual opening days, last Sunday, ever recorded. It was both miserable and wonderful.

Most hunters were familiar with opening days featured by (a) shirt-sleeve sunshine (b) cold rain (c) fog and/or (d) a combination of drizzle, wind, fog or blizzard, but few could remember when there was statewide ground cover of snow . . . and zero, sub-zero and near-zero temperatures on Nov. 15.

Hurts And Helps
The severe cold hurt and helped hunting. Some hunters waited for the sun to come up. Some who didn't wait returned to their cars in a hurry. But, for warmth's sake, more hunters moved around as the day progressed and the movement kept the deer stirring. Deer—and hunters—showed up well against the white background. Snow ranging up to 20 inches in some sections of the western Upper Peninsula, coupled with

low temperatures, kept a good many hunters out of their favorite areas. Back roads and trails were clogged.

In most of the northern Lower Peninsula, conditions were ideal by fairly early in the morning—cold but not too cold, sunshine, good visibility, tracking snow and deer retain the ridges.

Capsule Look
Boiling down information from the length and breadth of the state, here's a capsule look at the opening.

Definitely more hunters in some areas, "probably a few more" in several others, "about normal" in still others . . . and some speculation that license sales for the first time, might show up at half a million.

Hunter success, fair to very good. Opening-day harvest almost certainly equal to or better than first day last year on bucks, with evidence at some voluntary checking stations that a substantial number of "any deer" permit holders took their "any deer" without crying first for bucks.

Of bucks checked at the voluntary checking stations, 76 per cent were year-and-a-half-olds, with a big exception on the Pointe Baruch, opened to public hunting this year for the

first time. Here there was a high proportion of 2½-year-olds.

Accidents Down
Possibly because of snowy background and better visibility opening day, with peak numbers afield, was marked by only one gunshot fatality. The bear kill generally was light, but several large specimens were taken.

Violations appeared to be about as usual, but the picture was somewhat obscured by the fact that deer country Conservation Department personnel had to get along with far less help from Southern Michigan officers than ever before.

Adding up the opinions and impressions of many hunters, there was a marked decline in number of illegal kills seen in the woods.

At least seven elk from the protected herd in northeastern Lower Peninsula were illegally killed in the first two days.

Majority opinion of hundreds of hunters contacted in the field was that they were seeing "plenty of deer." A few didn't see any. As usual, great numbers saw does only. Presence of snow whittled complaints, because even where no deer were seen, tracks plainly showed there were at least a few around.

COUNTY DEER KILL HEAVY FIRST DAY

It was estimated that there were 25 deer killed in Washtenaw county the opening day of the deer season, according to Conservation Officer Don Boyer, who based his estimate on 20 confirmed kills and a belief that there were at least five more that weren't checked.

Boyer said the number of hunters on state lands in western Washtenaw county topped anything he had ever seen during the deer season.

He attributed the big turnout to the fact that Livingston county is closed to Sunday hunting, which made deer seekers who normally hunt these flocks into neighboring Washtenaw for the day.

He said that following the Sunday kill there were no deer reported killed during the first week.

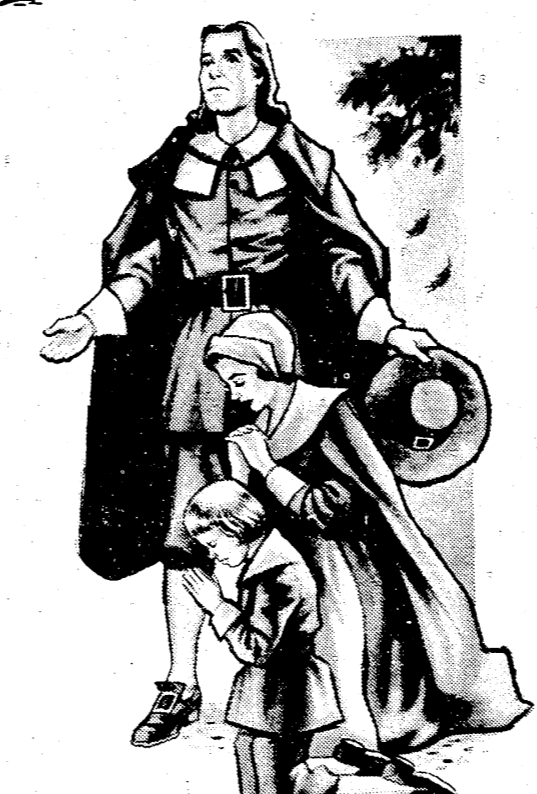
JURORS DRAWN

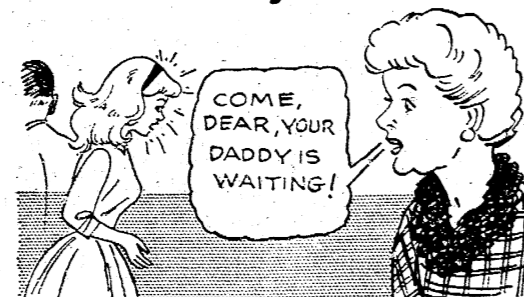

WINTER DRIVING— READY OR NOT?

Here's some advice on how to ready your car for winter driving, care for it during the cold months ahead, and how to drive safely when streets are slippery and visibility is poor. These twelve tips come from George J. Cullen, director of service for the Plymouth-De Soto-Valliant Division of Chrysler Corporation.

1. When starting the car in the morning, depress the accelerator to half-open throttle to release the choke. **IMPORTANT:** Do not pump the foot accelerator.
2. After starting in the morning, DON'T let the car run at idle waiting for it to warm up. You're just wasting gas. Start gently and drive slowly until it warms up.
3. Keep your gas tank filled. Cold weather causes condensation and water will get into the gas line.
4. Have radiator flushed and fill with anti-freeze. Be sure that crankcase, transmission and rear axle lubricants are proper grades for cold weather. Have motor tuned and battery checked.
5. Keep windows clean. Be sure defroster operates properly. Windshield wipers are in good condition. Put anti-freeze in windshield washer.
6. When planning a winter trip, allow plenty of time to get there. Storms slow traffic.
7. Drive with extra caution in the winter. Slippery streets and poor visibility double the possibilities of accidents.
8. Never drive a car when you have frost or ice on the windows. Take a little time and scrape it off.
9. Be sure you have plenty of ventilation in the passenger compartment. Engine fumes can have serious effects.
10. Have your car washed regularly. Salt on pavements causes rust and corrosion.
11. In "snow country" carry tire chains, a shovel, a tow rope, and a blanket.
12. Avoid excessive speed, even when the highway appears clear. There may be ice around the next curve.

CHILDREN can slip their gaiters more readily if you fasten small notebook rings in the zipper pull. When the gaiters are removed in school, the rings can be placed together and the gaiters hung from a hook.

Contour sheets wear thin in the middle rather than on the sides. Sew flat mattress pads on to the sheet and you'll have a nice cover for the mattress that buckles in easily.

Plastic spoons make nice supports for potted plants. They don't rot as wooden sticks do and dirt doesn't cling to them.

If you can't wash hair during a spell of illness for fear of catching cold, wash your brush and comb every day and dry them in the sun. Brush and comb the hair frequently to get out the loose dirt. A bit of cologne on brush as well as on hair and scalp will keep hair fresh smelling.

Keep colored spoons of mending thread in a clear plastic box to find the right spool easily.

Use sleeves from discarded men's shirt around the broom to dust walls.

For Holiday Menus



Not a minute's cooking is needed to make this luscious Pumpkin Walnut Pudding which combines instant pudding mix, dessert topping, and canned pumpkin. The busy cook will find it perfect fare as an after-dinner or late-evening dessert that adds pleasant variety to holiday menus.

Walnut Crust Pumpkin Pudding

1 1/4 cups fine vanilla wafer crumbs	1 package vanilla instant pudding mix
1/2 cup chopped walnuts	1 cup canned pumpkin
2 tablespoons sugar	1/2 cup milk
1/4 cup butter, melted	1/4 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice
1 package Dream Whip	

Combine crumbs, walnuts and sugar. Add butter and mix well. Press half of this mixture over bottom of 8-inch square pan. Reserve remaining crumb mixture for top.

Prepare dessert topping as directed on package. Then combine 1 cup of the prepared dessert topping with the pudding mix, pumpkin, milk, and spice in a bowl. Beat slowly with an egg beater just until well mixed, about 1 minute. Pour into pan over crumb mixture. Sprinkle with reserved crumb mixture. Chill until set, about 2 hours. Cut into squares and serve with remaining dessert topping. Makes about 9 servings.

THIS WEEK'S RECIPE

Gingerbread Pancakes
(Makes 16 cakes)

1 cup pancake mix	1 tablespoon salad oil
1 cup milk	
1/4 cup molasses	
1/4 teaspoon ginger	
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg	
1/4 teaspoon allspice	
1 egg	

Combine all ingredients until just barely blended. Pre-heat griddle and grease. Pour on about 3 tablespoons for each cake. Bake until brown, turning once. These may be served with applesauce or sliced bananas and soured cream.
