## MAIL EARLY FOR CHRISTMAS

Postmaster Merriman said today, "This certainly looks like a record breaking year for Christmas mail.

The Postmaster states that the present flow of Christmas cards is running about the same as last year, but the mailing of Christmas gifts is lagging somewhat. He suggests that all gift parcels be sent by Air Parcel Post from now on.

The postmaster further suggests that it is best to print the recipient's full name, street address, city, zone number and state on all mailing labels, making sure to include an extra label inside your gift packages.

The Postmaster expressed his thanks for the fine public cooperation to date and said, "If you'll just follow these simple rules:

- \*Be sure your Christmas card and gift mailing lists are up to date.
- \*Wrap your gifts securely.
- \*Address your cards and gifts legibly and correctly.
- \*Use complete address—Be sure the name of the street is complete. Avoid abbreviation of street and state names.
- \*And most important of all—MAIL YOUR CARDS AND GIFTS NOW!

It's sure to be a much merrier Christmas for everybody."

## COUNTY EMERGENCY PROSECUTORS NAMED

Washtenaw Prosecutor William F. Ager, Jr. has submitted to Civic Defense Director Gerald C. Miller the names of five attorneys in the county who will become prosecutors in the event that he and all assistant prosecutors in the county are unable or unavailable to act in an emergency.

Miller said the prosecutor made the appointment pursuant to a new law passed by the Michigan Legislature and which is scheduled to go into effect in the near future.

The new law requires that all county, city and township officials name "emergency interim successors" to their offices. The interim successors would act in the event of either a natural or man-made disaster, if the regular officials are unable to act in their official capacities.

Attorneys whom Ager appointed in accordance with the "continuity of government legislation" are Edmond F. Devine, former prosecuting attorney; Douglas K. Reading, another former prosecutor; Eugene B. Calder, Gus Crawford, Jr., and Jerome Lamb of Ypsilanti, former prosecuting attorneys.

## FORD ROTUNDA FANTASY

Thirteen choirs representing Detroit area churches, schools, civic and professional organizations will sing Christmas Fantasy currently features at the industrial showplace.

More than 100,000 persons visited the Rotunda in the first five days of the annual Christmas exhibit. In addition to Santa Claus, the Fantasy features a giant Christmas tree, a miniature circus complete with real clowns, hundreds of dolls and various animated displays. Cartoons are shown continuously in the Rotunda theater.

During the Fantasy, Rotunda visiting hours are from 8:30 a.m. to 9 p.m. daily. The show will end at 3 p.m. December 24.

## COUNTY STUDY OF RECREATION SITES URGED

County Planning Director, Robert D. Carpenter called on the Ann Arbor Metropolitan Area Planning committee to give its full support to an intensive recreational study of Washtenaw county.

"We should try to find some way to revive the recreation function of the county," Carpenter said. He noted that there are recreational facilities available in other parts of Southeastern Michigan and they are well used by county residents, "but if people get ten miles away it isn't recreation any more, it's work."

The county's chief planner, Edwin F. Drabkowski, said the biggest problem facing any study of recreation in the county is financing. He agreed that action should be taken immediately.

It was suggested that the sites for possible parks be placed on a metropolitan map, the metropolitan requirements of the area measured, then the group could decide whether it can do the planning on the project.

## County Deer Tally Doubles

### Officer Estimates Kill At 100 Bucks

Washtenaw county this fall yielded its best deer kill since hunting was legalized in 1949. Conservation Officer Don Boyer of Chelsea estimated the total bag at 100 bucks, about double the normal figure.

"There were more deer and more people hunting them," Boyer said in summing up the season which ended Monday. Weekend hunting pressure was heavy right through the season, especially in the mornings.

As usual, Washtenaw trailed its two neighboring counties—Livingston and Jackson—which have more deer range. The Livingston buck tally was estimated at 300, Jackson's at 150, making a total of 550 for the three-county area.

Boyer reported that Washtenaw's deer were more scattered this fall than in previous seasons. The kill in the Manchester area was up over past years, as was the bag in the Whitnore Lake vicinity.

Although hunting pressure was concentrated on state-owned lands in the Waterloo and Pinckney Recreation Areas, many bucks were shot on private farmlands, Boyer said.

Largest buck reported was a monster leopard killed near Chelsea, that dressed out at 223 pounds. Its live weight would have been close to 300. A 12-pointer bagged near Manchester dressed at 268. A 300-pound live-weight deer is considered big. About 20 per cent of the live weight is lost in dressing.

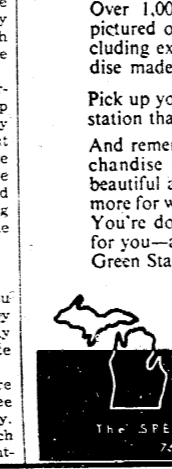

### Greetings in Good Taste

Christmas cards, traditional symbols of good will, will achieve their friendly purpose in fullest measure if good taste and common sense are used in ordering, signing and sending them. Here are a few hints that will prove helpful:

Buy your cards before December 1 (if you want them printed or engraved, order even earlier).

When your name is not printed or engraved, sign your complete name (there are millions of Johns and Marys).

When the complete family is listed, the father's name should be first, then the mother's, then the children according to age.

Send a card to husband and wife, even if you know only one (unless it is a semi-business card).

Red and green inks are acceptable for signing and addressing Christmas cards.

Envelopes should be addressed in handwriting, carefully and legibly. Use postal zone numbers for mailings to large cities. Re-check old addresses.

Use correct postage. A Christmas card deserves first class postage, in a sealed envelope with a four cent stamp.

A return address on the envelope will insure that your card won't hit the dead-letter file.
