Washtenaw Special Aid Classes Set

Manchester - (Special) - Since Washtenaw county voters last summer approved a half-mill tax to operate a program for the handicapped, a director of special education, three full-time staff members and one part-time staff member have been hired.

John B. Mader, former consultant in the special education department of the Macomb county board of education is director for the Washtenaw program.

Miss Alpha Turner is a teacher of the homebound, Glenn Olson is county psychologist and William Eary is visiting teacher.

Latest addition to the staff is a part-time diagnostician, Martin Gersh.

Seven children receive service from the homebound teacher on a regular basis. Nine children are on the active case-work list of the visiting teacher, to whom 35 referrals have been made.

Mr. Mader reported that in excess of 100 referrals for psychological evaluations have been made to the psychologists.

Another step taken in the program is the establishment of an inservice training program for all diagnosticians in the county. The group meets every two weeks.

Dr. Ralph M. Gibson, instructor in pediatrics and communicable diseases at the UM and the Michigan program for mentally retarded children, is serving as consultant.

Combining districts to serve handicapped children is being explored. The Milan and Saline districts have already agreed to operate a joint program. School officials in Manchester, Dexter and Chelsea also are exploring the possibility of providing joint services.

HURT IN ACCIDENT

Alger F. Clark, suffered facial cuts and bruises and a possible fracture of his collar bone yesterday afternoon when the car he was driving was involved in a three-car crash.

Two trucks heading east on Austin Rd. in Manchester township had stopped for a school bus that was headed west and had stopped to discharge some passengers.

Clark traveling east came over a crest in the road, sheriff's deputies said, and was unable to stop in time to avoid hitting the two vehicles that had stopped for the school bus.

Clark was taken to a Tecumseh hospital.

DEER DIE

A Detroit man narrowly avoided wrecking his cement laden truck early Thursday when a herd of 10 deer dashed into his path on US-12 west of the city.

Three of the deer were hit and killed by the truck. The driver, Kenneth Miner, told sheriff's deputies he was driving west on US-12 near Park Rd. in Scio township at 2:15 a.m. today when the accident happened.

Miner said the herd of deer suddenly appeared at the south edge of the highway and darted out in front of his vehicle. Miner said he slammed on his brakes but the heavy truck plowed into three of the animals. The impact did not damage the tractor trailer and Miner was unhurt.

Recently he has been employed as a mail carrier at the Ann Arbor Post Office. Schneider is a specialist with Company A, 107th Signal Battalion of the 46th National Guard. He is married and is the father of one child.

He has been assigned to road patrol duty out of the County Jail office on the midnight to 8 a.m. shift.

Lewis D. Smith
 Former Clinton Man Succumbs At 85

Lewis D. Smith, 85, of 105 Van Nest St., Dundee, a retired Lenawee County telephone supervisor, died Friday at his home, after a period of failing health.

He was born April 16, 1874, at Ransom, Mich., a son of Franklin and Mary E. Hill Smith. He married Frances Briggs of Lyons, O., on Nov. 7, 1898.

Mr. Smith lived in Clinton several years, moving to the Dundee area several years ago. He retired from the former Lenawee county, later called the Tri-County Telephone Co. in 1936 after working with the company for 39 years.

While living in Clinton he was supervisor of the Clinton telephone exchange. Surviving besides his wife are five daughters, Mrs. Otto (Irene) Trettin of Petersburg, Mrs. Arlette Huether of Dundee, Mrs. Claude (Marguerite) Higgins of Delmar, Ia., Mrs. Erwin (Dorothy) Walker of Brooklyn, Mich., Mrs. Bert (Leta) Weir of Fayette, O., three sons, Donald L. of Dundee, Cloyce M. of Manchester and Wendell D. of Clinton; 23 grandchildren; 40 great-grandchildren.
