DIMES MARCH WILL | COUNCIL MEETS

The Washtenaw chapter of the National Foundation will launch a campaign for \$65,000 on Monday. Funds will be used to continue care of polio patients and for research in the cause and treatment of arthritis and birth defects in children.

Names of township chairmen for the drive were announced today by Mrs. Carlos A. Chapman, jr., of Ann Arbor, county chairman.

Mailing envelopes for individual appeals have been sent out in the county. County residents, with the exception of Lodi township, have been asked to mail their contributions. The envelopes in Lodi township will be picked up at the time of the Mothers March.

Financial Aid Set

Mrs. Chapman said that as funds become available to the county chapter, financial assistance will be provided to children through age 18 who suffer from arthritis or certain birth defects.

About 250,000 children, or one in 16, are born each year with significant birth defects, Mrs. Chapman pointed out. The number of Americans suffering from some form of arthritis and rheumatism is more than 11,-000,900, she continued. Among these are children afflicted with rheumatoid arthritis. There are mare than \$6,000 victims of paralytic polio still being aided by the March of Dimes, Mrs. Charman said.


