## DIMES MARCH WILL START THIS WEEK

The Washtenaw chapter of the National Foundation will launch a campaign for \$65,000 on Monday. Funds will be used to continue care of polio patients and for research in the cause and treatment of arthritis and birth defects in children.

Names of township chairmen for the drive were announced today by Mrs. Carlos A. Chapman, jr., of Ann Arbor, county chairman.

Mailing envelopes for individual appeals have been sent out in the county. County residents, with the exception of Lodi township, have been asked to mail their contributions. The envelopes in Lodi township will be picked up at the time of the Mothers March.

**Financial Aid Set**  
Mrs. Chapman said that as funds become available to the county chapter, financial assistance will be provided to children through age 18 who suffer from arthritis or certain birth defects.

About 250,000 children, or one in 16, are born each year with significant birth defects, Mrs. Chapman pointed out. The number of Americans suffering from some form of arthritis and rheumatism is more than 11,000,000, she continued. Among these are children afflicted with rheumatoid arthritis. There are more than 50,000 victims of paralytic polio still being aided by the March of Dimes, Mrs. Chapman said.

## ROAD COMMISSION SALTS ROADS

Washtenaw County was a huge ice-covered wonderland Saturday for about 3½ hours until rising temperatures started melting the frozen rain off trees and city and county road crews attacked glazed roads with salt.

The Washtenaw county road commission moved six units out of its main yard at Ann Arbor and two units out of each of its five other yards in the county to salt 1,500 miles of paved roads in the county.

## 8 - YEAR ROAD PROGRAM ENDS

Construction and maintenance of county roads in Washtenaw has cost \$9,108,510 since March 1952. At that time Howard G. Minier, Washtenaw County road commission manager, told of the commission plans for an eight-year program to be divided into four two-year phases.

Minier and Max Royce, commission office engineer, drew together the statistics and are pleased with the results. Excluding city and village streets there are 1,377 miles of county roads. Places end to end one could drive from Ann Arbor to Miami, Florida on that much road, Minier pointed out.

Of the \$9,108,510 outlay, \$3,157,172 went to new construction or reconstruction along 131 miles of primary roads. This is 35 per cent of the total expenditure and is well above the 2 per cent minimum required for construction under a given program by state law. Maintenance along 1,377 miles of county roads cost the remaining \$5,951,338 or 65 per cent of the total expenditure.

Construction along the 131 miles of roadways during the eight-year program has included 83 miles of new blacktop projects. Another 33 miles of reconstruction blacktop work has been completed along Pontiac Trails, Austin Road, Fuller Road, Clinton Road, Pleasant Lake Road and the Chelsea-Manchester Road.

Recapping with some base construction has been accomplished over 11 miles, while the remaining 4 miles have been constructed with gravel surface in preparation for blacktopping next year.

In breakdown the money came from the following places: Of the \$3,157,172 for new construction, \$2,415,939 constituted the county's share of the State Motor Vehicle Highway Fund, raised through gasoline and vehicle weight taxes and distributed through a formula along state, county and local road agencies.

Another \$95,037 came from Washtenaw township boards, while \$433,827 was received as this county's share of the Federal Aid Secondary Road Fund. The remaining \$212,369 was contributed by other sources, such as industrial plants, school districts, and cities interested in county road improvements in their respective areas.

Minier doesn't look for any new eight-year program. He expects future programs to be handled in more concentrated three-year programs.

Commenting on new construction over the past eight years, Minier said that although 83 miles of blacktopping work during this time does not appear to be a great record to many persons, it is all that could be accomplished with the funds at hand. He added that 300 miles of the county's 450 miles of primary roads are paved.

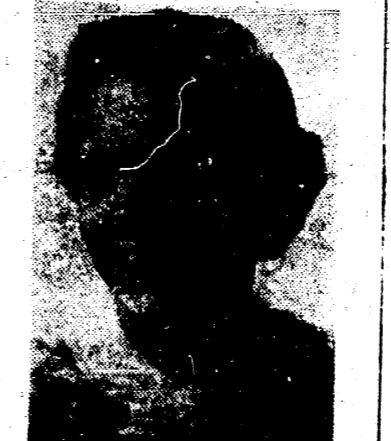

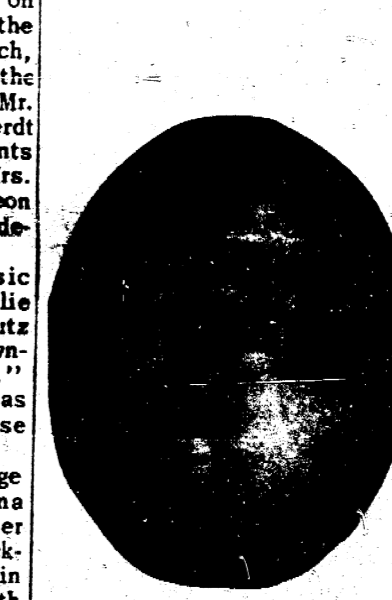

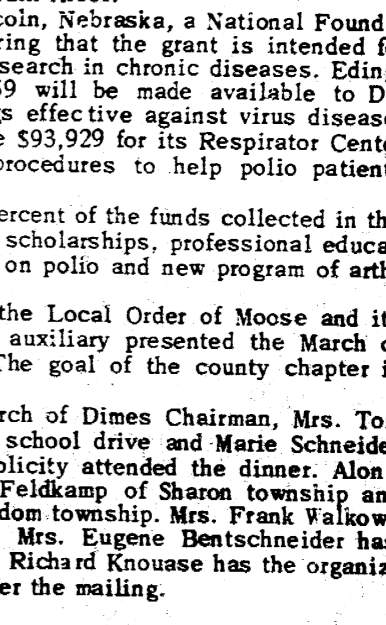
