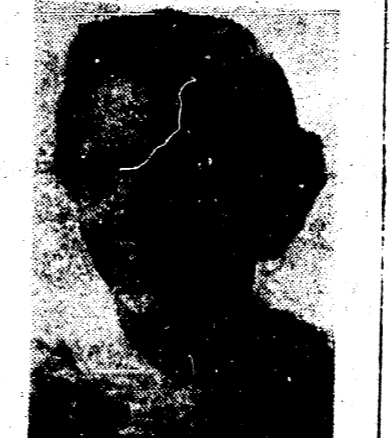
WOMENS CLUB MEETING HELD

A ten year administrative grant of \$294,000 to Dr. Thomas Francis, Jr. of the University's school of Public Health was announced at the annual Washtenaw March of Dimes kick-off dinner at the Moose Hall in Ann Arbor.

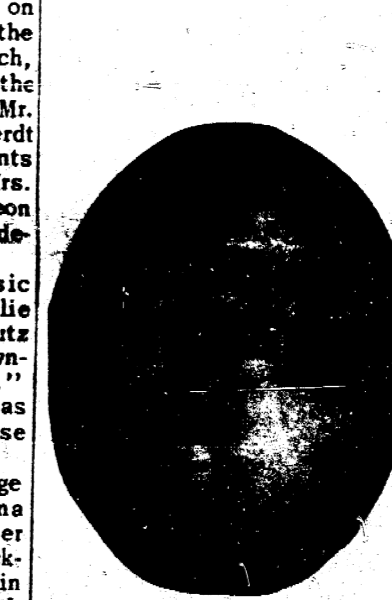
James E. Edington, of Lincoln, Nebraska, a National Foundation official told the gathering that the grant is intended for long-term epidemiological research in chronic diseases. Edington also said that \$183,159 will be made available to Dr. Francis for research on drugs effective against virus disease. The University will receive \$93,929 for its Respirator Center to teach techniques and procedures to help polio patients return to normal life.

It was pointed out that 50 percent of the funds collected in the March of Dimes is used for scholarships, professional education and continued research on polio and new program of arthritis and birth defect study.

The dinner was given by the Local Order of Moose and its Women's Auxiliary and the auxiliary presented the March of Dimes with a \$50 check. The goal of the county chapter is \$65,000.

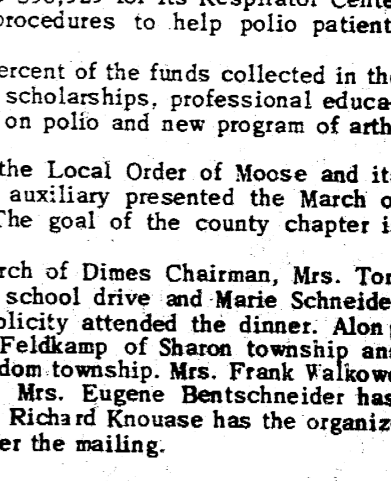

NAMED RAWSONVILLE SUPERINTENDENT

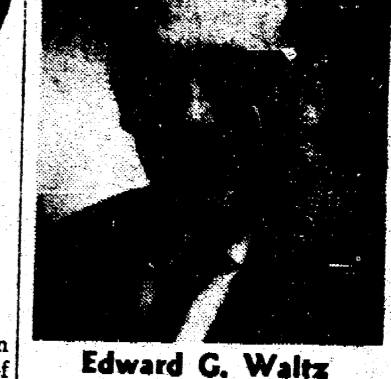

CATHOLIC SERVICES HOLD ANNUAL MEETING

The Catholic Social Services of Washtenaw county will hold its first annual dinner meeting at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, January 21 at the Newman Hall, 330 Thompson Street, Ann Arbor. Dr. C. J. Maternowski, chairman of the temporary executive committee will announce the officers for the agencies first permanent Board of Directors.

Speakers at the dinner will be Monsignor Wilbur Suedkamp, Director of Catholic charities, Detroit; Fr. John Trese, Director of Catholic Social Services of Washtenaw county and Miss Marguerite M. Parrish, executive secretary of Catholic Social Services of Washtenaw county. Each of the eight counties that make up the Archdiocese of Detroit now has a case work agency. The discussion will be supplemented by colored slides. The Washtenaw county agency has been in existence since May 1, 1959 and has since that time rapidly become an important part of the community.

The services of the Washtenaw agency are available free of charge to any adult or child living in Washtenaw county irrespective of racial, nationality, religious, social or economic background. The agency provides adoption and boarding care placements, assistance to unmarried mothers, and marriage, personal and family counseling. Mrs. George Annen, a member of the Temporary executive committee and president of "The Good Samaritans" the agency's volunteer group is general chairman in charge of arrangements. Mrs. Marvin Kirk is Manchester's representative on the board. The Rosary Society of Willow Run is sponsoring the dinner. Other assisting Mrs. Ennen are Mrs. Vern Austin of Saline, Mrs. George Steffen of Chelsea; Mrs. Peter Kelly of Whitmore Lake and Mrs. Leo Hoey of Dexter. The agency is supported by the Archdiocesan Development Fund.

ANTI-RABIES CLINICS IN MANCHESTER

Annual vaccination clinics to give anti-rabies shots to dogs are sponsored by the Washtenaw County Veterinary Medical Assn. and the county health department. The clinics will start Thursday.

Township clerks will be at the clinics to sell dog licenses, which must be purchased by March 1, after which an additional fee of \$3 is charged. Dog license fees until March 1 are \$2 for male dogs and \$5 for female dogs.

Dog vaccination clinics were set up by the county health department to facilitate compliance with a 1948 ordinance which requires a dog to be vaccinated against rabies within 12 months of the time a license is issued.

The annual clinics have almost eliminated cases of rabies in the county. A veterinarian attends all of the clinics to give the vaccinations. Fees charged by the clinics are \$1.50 per dog.

Vaccination clinics will be held at two locations this Thursday. They are from 4 to 6 p. m. at the Superior township hall and 6:30 to 8:30 p. m. in the fire hall at Saline.

In Manchester the clinic will be held from 7 to 8:30 p. m. Saturday, Jan. 23 in the county road commission garage here; and from 8 to 9 p. m. on the same Saturday in the fire hall at Saline and from 7 to 9 p. m. in the equipment building at Milan.

Other clinics will be on Saturday, Jan. 16 in the fire station at Dexter. Others are scheduled from 9 to 6 p. m. Saturday, Jan. 16 in the fire station at Whitmore Lake and Thursday, Jan. 23 from 7 to 9 p. m. in Chelsea.

Deputies said a station wagon driven by Willard R. Guest, 20, of Chelsea, headed south on M-92 north of US-12 in Sylvan township, turned in front of Mrs. Gorton's car which was northbound on M-92. Guest received lacerations but declined treatment.

Dr. Lewis Beeson, 58, of East Lansing, suffered body bruises and face lacerations at 12:45 a.m. today when his car smashed into a parked car on E. Stadium Blvd.

Police said Dr. Beeson's car, moving west in the 1900 block of E. Stadium Blvd., smashed into a parked car owned by Robert E. Mancell of 1905 E. Stadium Blvd. The impact drove the Mancell car 73 feet across a lawn extension.

Police said they found the East Lansing man lying on the floor of his car. Officers said Beeson may be charged with a traffic violation later today. He was taken to University Hospital following the accident.

There will be the annual donut and coffee sale at the Manchester Drug Store on Tuesday, January 26, when all money collected for sale of donuts and coffee will go to the March of Dimes. Mr. and Mrs. Lynn Burch, owners of the store will donate the coffee and Mrs. R. C. Kerr will donate her own homemade donuts.

The Boy Scouts are planning a balloon sale later this month, the date has not been set. Robert Duhan, high school principal says that there will be a record hop to benefit the March of Dimes with John Small of WOIA radio station to emcee the affair. The date has not been set.

Officers elected are Carl Hakes of Hanover, president; Robert Kirk of Manchester, vice-president; Clifford Bohne of Grass Lake is secretary-treasurer.

One of the outstanding parts of the program was the demonstration of a new type of knife which leaves part of the wool on the sheep rather than shear it all off. This new type knife leaves about 1 1/2 inch of wool on the sheep as a protective covering against sudden changes in weather. Edward Warner of Sun Beam Electric in Chicago was on hand to show the latest in developments in shearing equipment and how to care for shearing equipment.

Grayden Blank of Michigan State University and Lee Bell, shepherd at the University were among those present as well as Don Johnson, Washtenaw County Agricultural Agent. Mr. Johnson told the group that there will be a sheep clinic sometime in March which care of lambs will be discussed. Details of this will be worked out later.

Also present were representatives from the eight wool buying companies in the state. Rolland Burkhardt of Pandora, Ohio, winner of the sheep shearing international championship in Chicago for several years demonstrated the "easy way to shear sheep."
