CLINICS IN MANCHESTER

Annual vaccination clinics to give anti-rabies shots to digs are sponsored by the Washtenaw County Veterinary Medical Assn. and the county health department. The clinics will start Thursday.

Township clerks will be at the clinics to sell dog licenses, which must be purchased by March 1, after which an additional fee of \$3 is charged. Dog license fees until March 1 are \$2 for male dogs and \$5 for female dogs.

The annual clinics have almost eliminated cases of rables in the county. A veterinarian attends all of the clinics to give the vaccinations. Fees charged by the clinics are \$1.50


