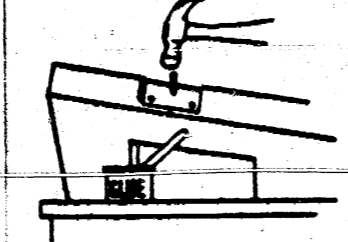

LOOSE DOOR HINGES

Sometimes the hinges on doors become so worn that the doors won't hold any longer. There are several remedies for this. You can try using longer screws. Or you can plug the screw holes with wooden dowels dipped in glue (as in the illustration) and reset your screws in them. Or you can fill the holes with solid wire solder and reset your screws in this. Or, instead of using solder, you can stuff the original screw holes with bits of steel wool.

REDA CROSS HELP NEEDED

Forty years ago this month an epidemic of Spanish influenza was sweeping the country, hundreds of Wash-taw County residents were ill, and there were 10 deaths in three days in Ann Arbor alone. Medical facilities of the community were over-taxed, and nursing service was not available to many who needed it.

An emergency call for volunteer nurses was issued by the County Red Cross Chapter, and was answered quickly by women who had completed courses in home nursing under Red Cross direction.

This has been the experience through the years. In times of disaster as well as in time of war, the Red Cross has responded to emergencies. But the work of this great humanitarian organization continues year in and year out, bringing help and counsel to millions of servicemen, veterans and their families, mending lives touched by personal tragedies, transporting the hand-capped, collecting blood for the injured and the sick and comforting hospital patients.

The key to the success of the Red Cross is its vast volunteer program. Only a few persons in each community are paid staff; hundreds of others are ordinary citizens giving a few hours a day, week or a month to one of the many activities of the apter.

More of these volunteers are needed in Ann Arbor, Milanti, Manchester and in the town and rural areas in Washtenaw County. A campaign for volunteers is being carried on this month in southeastern Michigan, and the Washtenaw County Chapter of the Red Cross is participating. A plan for new volunteers is being sponsored by Mrs. L. Shipman, Chapter chairman, at which time the plans of this Chapter will be outlined. Volunteers may give whatever time they are available.

Next year an average of 100,000 volunteers served more than 100 million people. Red Cross Motor Club had 24 regular volunteer drivers and five others. They contributed 100,000 hours of service and

SCHOOL BUDGET

The Manchester Board of Education has announced that so far this year the school budget is holding its own. The Board has borrowed money the first half year to tide the district over until local taxes and State aid are received.

School officials point out that this district has a definite advantage over many districts when money is needed. There seems to be two items that are mentioned by leading institutions concerning Manchester schools. They are: First, the school deficit is on the decline rather than increase; secondly (and no doubt the most important) the voters of the Manchester District have always provided for the district and therefore lending institutions believe that the school is a reasonable risk.

Many schools are not nearly so fortunate, school authorities point out. When the Board of Education asked for operating millage this last year they promised not to raise the school tax over two dollars per thousand on assessed valuation. In 1958 the total school tax was 17.9 on state equalized and this 1959 school year the Board levied 18.75 mills. When this .85 mill difference is applied to the assessed valuation of various townships the raises in school taxes are: Bridgewater 1.67 Freedom 1.72, Manchester 1.53, Sharon 1.77, Grass Lake 1.63, and Norvell 1.40 dollars per \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

Any other raise in taxes in the areas mentioned is levied by the County for operation so to finance the County Special Education Program, voted upon last July.

Mrs. Kerr said the coffee and donut sale at the Manchester Drug Store was very successful. The Boy Scouts netted \$67.23 at their balloon sale.

The local chairman points out that person who were not at home, or who want to make contributions to the March of Dimes may do so by leaving their contribution at the Union Savings Bank earmarked for the March of Dimes or by contacting her. She says there are still more contributions to come in. There will be the canisters in all of the local stores and the school collection to come in as well as additional dime card returns. Manchester has no set quota for the drive to raise funds to combat polio, arthritis and birth defects in children. But in past years the drive has been very successful. Incomplete returns in the County show a total of \$22,225 collected by some 1,200 women in the County in the door-to-door campaign. An additional \$6,300 has been raised through special events, mail receipts, special gifts and contributions from school children, bringing the grand total to \$28,825 or \$36,337 short

URGED TO BUILD SHELTERS

Civil Defense Director Gerald G. Miller in Washtenaw county has called on all city mayors, and village presidents in the county to build themselves survival shelters in the basements of their homes against radioactive fallout.

"Nobody in the county is voluntarily going to build a fall-out shelter until their leaders do," said Miller. He said he had given out 50,000 booklets with plans for shelters designed by the county.

Miller pointed out that a person can cut the amount of radiation his body is subjected to by moving inside a house, on the first or second floor. He can reduce the amount to 10 per cent by going to the basement and subject to 1 per cent by building a shelter and using it in an emergency.

A person can be subjected to about 340 reontgens of radiation before it will kill him, Miller pointed out. "If there are 1,000 reontgens of radiation falling out of the sky after a bombing, he will get 500 an hour if he goes in the house. If he goes in the basement he will get 250 reontgens, enough to make him sick but not to kill him."
