

COUNTY JAIL BUILDING PERMIT

A Washtenaw County Jail addition, five houses and commercial building accounts for the majority of \$372,730 worth of new construction scheduled this past week in the county. A total of 18 building permits was issued this way:

Ann Arbor, 11 permits, \$339,-352; Ypsilanti, tour permits. \$9,086; and Ypsilanti township, three permits, \$24,292.

The city Department of Engineering and Building Safety issued the permits for the County Jail addition which will be erected at 119 E. Ann St. for an estimated \$270,442.

The commercial building, which will contain doctors' of fices. will be built at 1825 W. Stadium Blvd. at a cost of \$29.-000. Kenneth Davidson of Ann Arbor is the builder. Other building permits issued were for smaller-size additions,
