COUNTY JAIL BUILDING PERMIT A Washtenaw County Jail addition, five houses and commercial building accounts for the majority of \$372,730 worth of new construction scheduled this past week in the county.

A total of 18 building permits was issued this way: Ann Arbor, 11 permits, \$339,352; Ypsilanti, four permits, \$9,086; and Ypsilanti township, three permits, \$24,292.

The city Department of Engineering and Building Safety issued the permits for the County Jail addition which will be erected at 119 E. Ann St. for an estimated \$270,442.

The commercial building, which will contain doctors' offices, will be built at 1825 W. Stadium Blvd. at a cost of \$29,000; Kenneth Davidson of Ann Arbor is the builder. Other building permits issued were for smaller-size additions, alterations or repairs.

WOOL MARKETING YEAR ENDS

Chairman Max M. Kalmbach of the Washtenaw County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee today reminded wool growers that the marketing year for purposes of the 1959 wool program will end March 31.

The wool program is conducted under the National Wool Act of 1954. Payments under the 1959 program will be made this summer when payment rates are determined on the basis of the national average price received by producers for shorn wool during the 1959 marketing year.

For a completed sale, Kalmbach said, title must have passed to the buyer, the wool must have been delivered to the buyer (either physically or through documents), and the last of the factors (price per pound, weight, yield, etc.) needed to determine the total price must be available.

The current wool marketing year is April 1, 1959 through March 31, 1960. Applications for payment under the county ASC office not the 1959 program must be filed later than April 30, 1960.

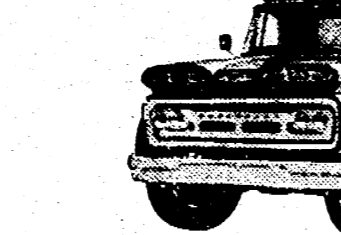

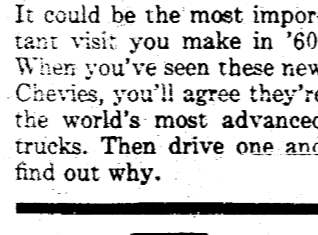

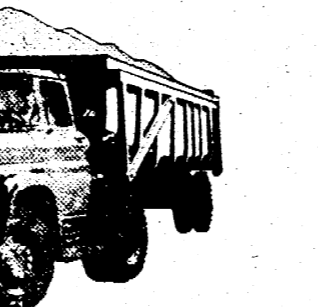
