

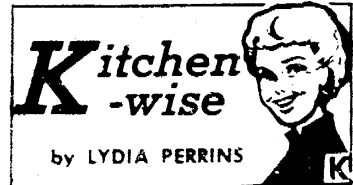
Construction Costs Cut By Electric Heating

Sandwich Making

Pretty sandwiches may be artistic, but the way to tell a good sandwich is by *smell* and by *feel*. Good bread makes a world of difference. Use a variety: whole wheat, cracked wheat, pumpernickel, tasty rolls, as well as good white bread. When the filling is delicate in flavor, use the lighter breads. With hearty breads, use plenty of butter or mayonnaise to avoid dryness. If you are making a lot of sandwiches, cream 1 cup of butter thoroughly with 1/2 cup cream. In this way, 1/2 cup of butter will spread as much as a 2-lb. sandwich loaf cutting 40-45 slices.

For savory meat sandwiches, flavor butter with Lea & Perrins Worcestershire before spreading (cream 1 tsp. Worcestershire with 1/4 cup softened butter).

SUGGESTED COMBINATIONS

Mix liverwurst, grated onion, horseradish, 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire. Sliced cheddar cheese, peanut butter, crumbled crisp bacon.

Sliced corned beef, sliced pickled cucumbers on Worcestershire buttered bread.

Thin-sliced Taylor ham, sliced Muenster cheese. These and again thoroughly frozen crab meat, with mayonnaise, 1/2 tsp. prepared mustard, chopped celery.

Leftover cooked hamburger, mixed with a little mayonnaise and ketchup, grated onion, top with sliced tomato.

LUNCH BOX TURNOVERS

Roll regular baking powder biscuit dough in thick. Cut to squares (any desired size), place spoonful chopped meat, fork or other filling in center of each square. Fold opposite corners together to seal. Bake in baking sheet, bake in hot oven (400°) 15 minutes.

RACE TO END

The time of decision comes next week in the Washtenaw Conference basketball race. On Tuesday night, Saline plays Ypsilanti, Roosevelt, U High travels to Dexter, and Chelsea will entertain Manchester.

Saline, U High and Chelsea will be favored in those contests but an upset of either the Hornets or the Bulldogs would leave the door open for the Cubs to get a share of the title.

In addition to the Chelsea-Saline contest on Friday, U High is host to Pinckney and Manchester entertains Dexter.

Manchester showed it was ready to give Chelsea a battle Thursday by pounding out a 36-29 decision over Roosevelt, a team that had surprised the Dutchmen, 46-44, in an earlier meeting.

Nine Dutchmen got into the scoring column and Bud England, Bill Cusley and Ron Fox shared scoring honors with eight as Coach Curt Prediger substituted frequently. For Fox, it was his first appearance in about six weeks after a broken bone in the knee had put him on the shelf.

Dexter also showed it should not be taken lightly by the Cubs next Tuesday. The Dreadnaughts hammered out a 60-27 triumph over a Pinckney team that had made plans for an upset.

Cliff Hubbard, getting 10 points in the second quarter got the Dreadnaughts under way after Pinckney led at the end of one period, 11-10. Hubbard was the night's high-point man with 6. Cliff Blossom scored 11.

The Little Dreadnaughts and the Little Rough Riders won preliminary games.

Bossy Tornado Makes Cow Uninvited Guest

The Jack Swink family, of Bethel, Okla., wondered if their time had come recently when they heard and felt an ear-splitting crash over their heads during a tornado.

When the storm died away, they discovered the violent winds had sent a 900-pound cow crashing through the roof of their home. They were just as amazed to see that the roof, except for the cow-shaped hole, was perfectly intact. Their asphalt shingles, designed to resist high winds, withstood blasts that were capable of lifting a 900-pound cow.

Three wind-resistant asphalt shingle roofing techniques are available to home owners who live in areas subject to high winds. These are self-sealing shingles that have adhesive applied in the factory, shingles unified surface, and three-tab, square-but shingles that are sealed down to the roof by hand with a spot of quick-setting asphalt cement.

RED CROSS NEEDS BUILDING SITE

The land committee of the Washtenaw Chapter of the American Red Cross was given authority by the Chapter's board of directors to continue looking for a site for a new headquarters building for the Chapter and to purchase the land if a suitable site is found.

Purchase of the site would be subject to approval of the Red Cross National Headquarters.

The Chapter has had its "temporary" headquarters in the rented space of the Nickels Arcade for more than ten years, according to Wilfrid de St. Aubin, executive director of the local County Chapter.

Two sites for the proposed new building have been under consideration, but neither may prove to be the best location for the new headquarters, he said.

He declined to name the sites, but said they are in areas involving annexation questions and other problems.

The board presented a plaque to Lawrence H. Ouimet, a member of the Chapter's executive board committee since 1955 and former Chapter chairman from 1955-57 for his "long and faithful service."

Mrs. Nicholas Schreiber, vice chairman of the Chapter's blood program, announced that forty one additional volunteers had been signed up as a result of the recent recruitment drive.

A total of four hundred fifty volunteers will be needed for the blood program alone this year, she told the board. The program has been increased by 70% in the past four years, she reported.

A "do-it-yourself" anti-drowning kit with instructions permitting anyone to make it up in about one hour at a cost of less than \$1.00 was displayed at the meeting. The kit can be used to safeguard home swimming pools and lakes with out life guards.

The board presented gallon donor pins to Clarence green and Robert Huston, both of Ypsilanti as representatives of more than fifty area persons who have given a gallon or more of blood to the Red Cross blood program.

The Business and Professional Women's Club being organized here will meet Monday, March 14 at the home of Alice Walz at 7:30 p.m.

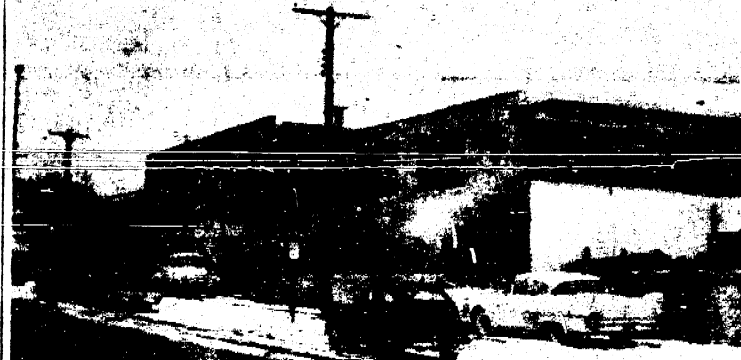

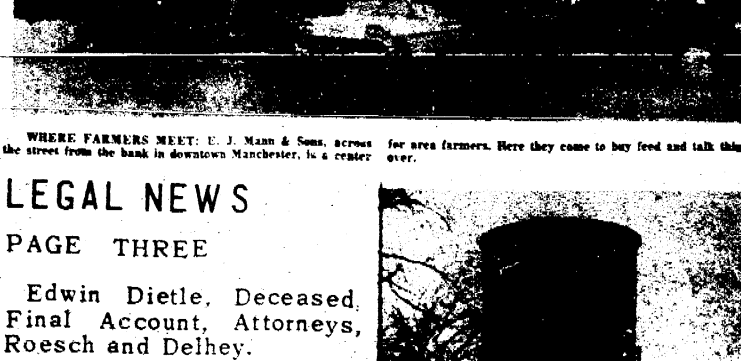
SCHOOL: The 14-room Manchester High School, former school system. The school district covers an area of 100 sq. miles. It is one of several units in the Washtenaw County school system.



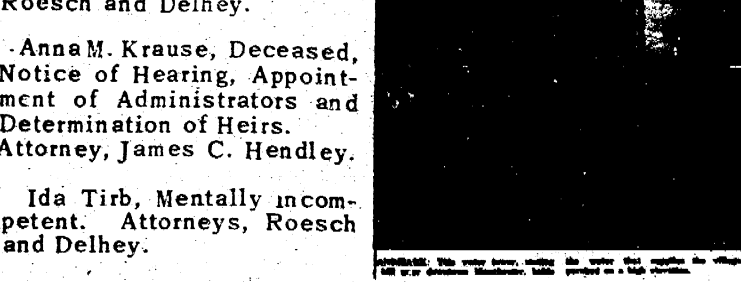
