

Two ex-convicts from Kalamazoo who police say broke into two business places were captured inside a service garage by state troopers and sherriff's deputies.

The two men, Boyd Slager, 31, and Eugene R. O'Connell, 30, were found in the Carl M. Schaible Garage at 512 W. Main St., by officers summoned to investigate a burglary.

Carl Schaible, the owner of the garage, was awakened about 4:30 a.m. when a burglar alarm which rings in his home was set off in the garage.
