DAY CARE CENTER SLATED The first Day Care Service

Center for cerebral palsied children in this area is now being planned by officers of the United Cerebral Palsy Association of Washtenaw County.

Dr. D. C. Morley, senior clinician at the University Speech Clinic and president of the local association, said final plans for the new center were laid at a meeting this week. He said preliminary discussions about such a center for Washtenaw County began more than a

year ago. The Care Service is to be aimed at help for those children in the County who are severely afflicted with cerebral palsy. Such children will include those who can neither walk nor talk and whose severe handicap makes it impossible to fit them into regular schools or other

programs. Initally the group to be cared for by the Center will be small and will meet three mornings a week from 9 a.m. to noon. Dr. Morley said a location for the Care Service has not been set although several possible sites are under consideration. He said as soon as the place for the Center is set it will go into operation under the direction of Mrs. Chester Carter of 323 John Street and

This will be the first such operation in which all local governments have been asked to participate, and it is intended to test their present plans for Civil Defense emergencies.


