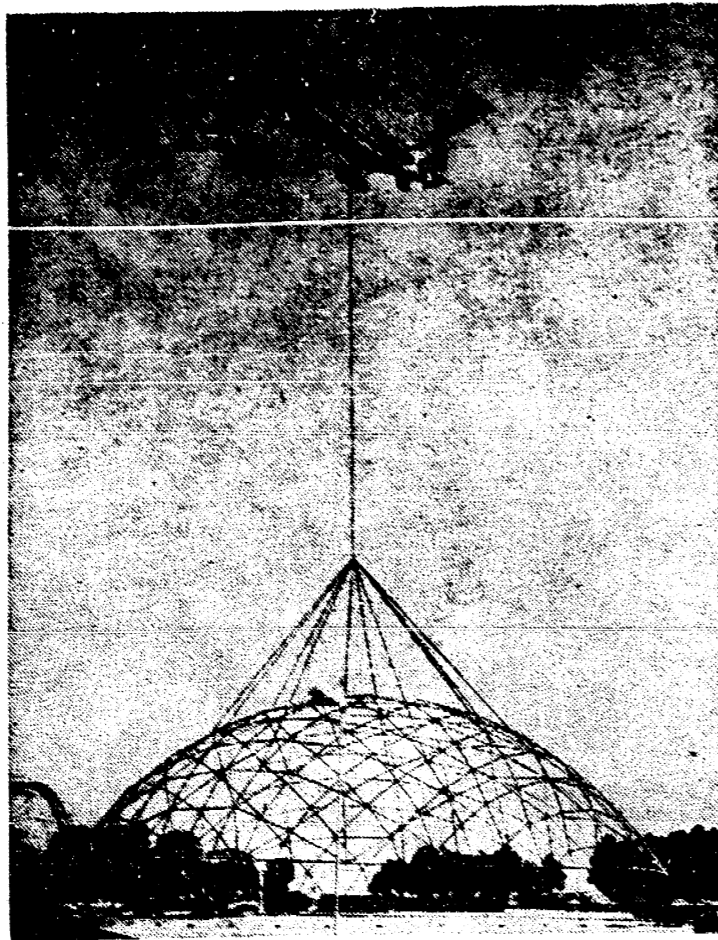

KLUMP RUNS FOR SHERIFF

With a pledge to abolish a "code of censorship" in the Sheriff's Department and to fight for the rights of deputies, Elmer F. Klump, 66-year-old Whitmore Lake man, today announced he is a candidate for the Republican nomination for sheriff in the Aug. 2 primary election.

Klump, a uniform deputy himself, is the second Republican to announce his candidacy for his party's nomination for the post now held by Sheriff George A. Petersen, also a Republican. John L. Tice, a former sheriff's officer, entered the GOP nomination race March 17.

Klump said if he is nominated and elected sheriff, complaint books will be "open in their entirety to the press—without deletions or omissions—at any time of day or night."

Klump further said he will seek "equal rights and equal working conditions" for deputies if he is nominated and elected.

"For years the uniform deputy... the man who is out on the road day and night, winter and summer... has been neglected, abused and forgotten by the heads of the Sheriff's Department. These men, who are risking their health and many times their lives each day in performance of their duty, have never been given proper consideration," Klump asserted. "If I am nominated and elected I mean to remove these officers from the status of second class citizens."

Klump, who served as Northfield township commissioner from 1952 until his appointment as a regular sheriff's deputy in 1958, said a "major trouble" with the present Sheriff's Department is that command officers are "almost wholly ignorant of the workings of the shifts which they are responsible."

He said were he to be elected he would require each command officer to ride road patrol on a regular schedule with deputies. A "road sergeant" would also be assigned at various times to different shifts and would act as liaison between command officers and the sheriff.

Klump said county taxpayers "are not getting their money's worth" in the present assignment of duty for sheriff's officers.

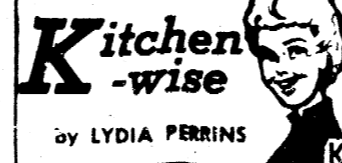
Klump was born in Sharon township, attended schools in the Grass Lake area and for a number of years worked in and operated garages in the Detroit and Jackson vicinity.

In 1948 he purchased a service station at 9885 N. Main St. at Whitmore Lake which he still operates.

As Northfield township constable for six years he operated a township-owned police car and was also a fee deputy for the Sheriff's Department. Since his appointment Jan. 1, 1958, as a full-time sheriff's officer he has been assigned to the as road patrol. He currently is on the midnight shift out of the Willow Village substation.

He is married and has three children.

Klump says he plans to continue employment with the Sheriff's Department until the start of active campaigning in the primary election.



Dinner For Two

Nobody home for dinner but you and Papa? Here's an easy dinner for two that will provide leftovers for a fine casserole to-morrow night.

Boil a 1-lb. Taylor ham until thoroughly hot. Let stand ten minutes before removing from water. Cut away the cotton sheath and cut ham in 1/2 in. slices. Serve with boiled cabbage, buttered sliced carrots and Worcestershire Creamed Potatoes. (Boil sliced carrots with 1/2 tsp. sugar added to the water to bring out flavor.)

WORCESTERSHIRE CREAMED POTATOES

2 or 3 boiled potatoes, cubed (or 1 lb. can Irish potatoes cut in halves or quarters)
2 Tbsp. butter
1 Tbsp. all-purpose flour
1/2 cup milk
1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. Lea & Perrins Worcestershire

Melt butter in top of double boiler over direct heat. Add flour, stirring until smoothly blended. Cook, stirring constantly for 5 min. over low heat. Add milk gradually, stirring to keep smooth until it reaches boiling point. Reduce heat and cook 3 minutes longer. Remove from fire, add 1 tsp. L&P Worcestershire Sauce. Blend in thoroughly. Add cubed potatoes, mix gently with sauce. Place over hot water to keep hot. When ready to serve, top with an extra pat of butter and paprika.

HAM AND MACARONI CASSEROLE

1/2 lb. cubed ham
1/2 lb. cubed elbow macaroni
1/2 lb. cubed cheddar cheese
1/2 cup sliced mushrooms
1/2 cup sliced green peas
1/2 cup sliced carrots
1/2 cup sliced celery
1/2 cup sliced onion
1/2 cup sliced tomato
1/2 cup sliced lettuce
1/2 cup sliced celery tops
1/2 cup sliced onion and lettuce sliced carrots, with oil and vinegar dressing.

To make Glazed Pineapple Fingers, sift together 2 cups sifted enriched flour, 1 tablespoon baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt and 1/2 cup sugar. Cut or rub in 1/4 cup shortening until mixture is crumbly. Combine 1 beaten egg, 1/2 cup pineapple syrup and 1 cup drained crushed pineapple. Add to flour mixture, stirring only until flour is well moistened. Using 2 forks, drop batter on greased baking sheet, shaping the batter into long narrow bars about 1 x 4 1/4 inches. Press sides smooth. Bake in hot oven (425°F.) 15 minutes. Frost with Lemon Icing, mix 1/2 cup confectioners' sugar, 1 tablespoon hot milk and 1/4 teaspoon lemon extract until smooth. Makes about 1 1/2 dozen Glazed Pineapple Fingers.

COUNTY ROAD EMPLOYEES ASK BOOST

Washtenaw county road commission has been requested by a union which represents commission workers to grant employees a 45-cent across-the-board hourly pay increase as of April 1.

The request was signed by Miles C. Sexton, president of the Washtenaw County Road Commission Employees' Local 453 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, and Willard Bowling, secretary of the local.

They said the request is "designed to bring the pay level of the Washtenaw county road commission hourly rated workers to equivalent rates of similar or identical job classifications in the comparable metropolitan area."

"Other factors which enter into this request are the failure of the board to increase wages of its hourly rated employees for more than two years and the inadequacy of the present cost-of-living formula," they added.

Mr. Walt Schaible, a local retailer, has been officially named by the Chairman of the State Retail Committee for Michigan.

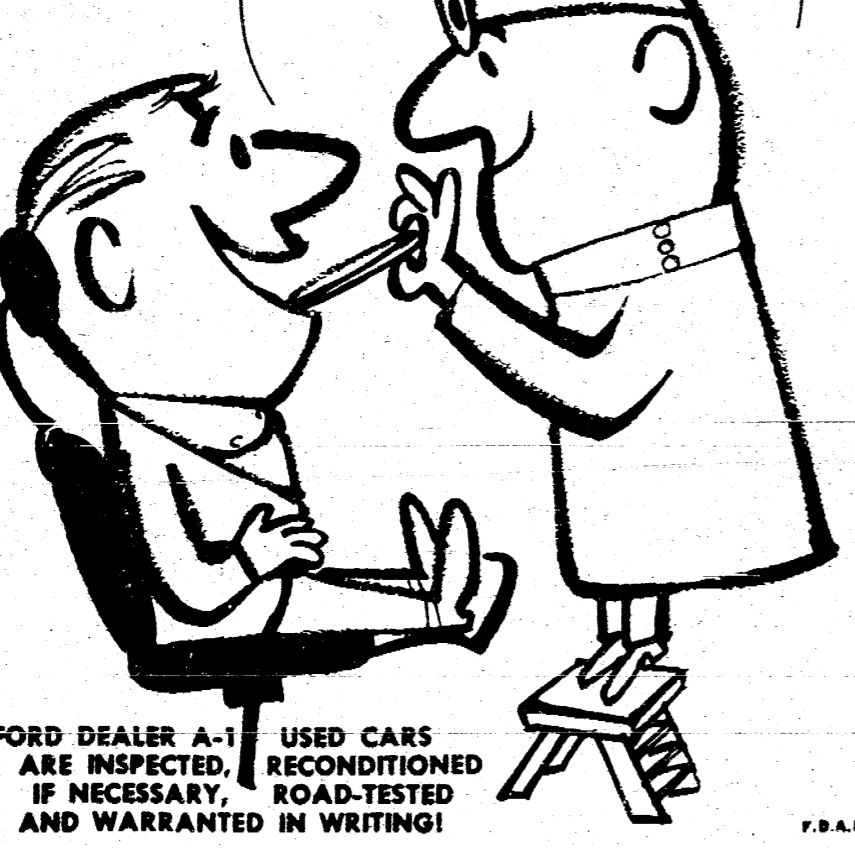

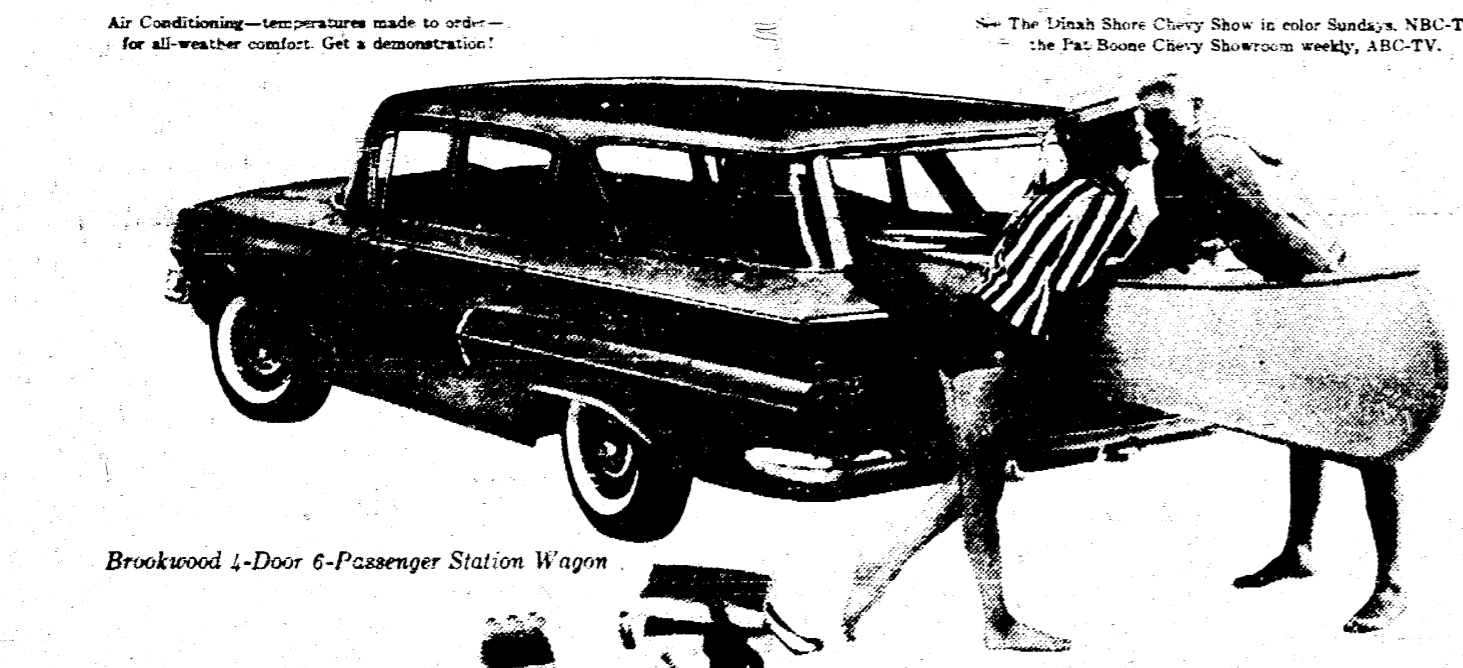
