

FOUR PROPERTY SALE FOR TAXES

The annual delinquent tax sale for Washtenaw County has begun in Room 117 A of the County Building in Ann Arbor. A record number of properties in the County were placed on sale for taxes which are three years or more in arrears.

This year's sale listed 200 lots in the County compared with 350 last year, which is about average. Among the 200 lots are 453 in Northfield Township, 117 in Ypsilanti and 47 in Ann Arbor.

Gerald Roberts, accountant in the County Treasurer's Office said that since last October 1st when the list of properties on sale for delinquent taxes was made up, more than 1,000 property owners had paid their back taxes, removing them from the sale.

Selling of the properties at a tax auction does not mean that the owners will lose title to their properties immediately. They have until the next annual sale to redeem their property by paying the amount of the sale plus 1 percent interest.

After the year is up, a property owner may redeem his property by paying the purchase price plus 50 percent and certain fees. Six months after a sheriff's notice is served the tax deed holder obtains absolute title to the premises.

PINEAPPLE FRITTERS

1 cup flour
1 tablespoon sugar
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 eggs, separated
1/4 cup milk
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 cup pineapple tidbits, drained

Put together four sugar, baking powder and salt into a bowl. Mix together egg yolks, milk and lemon juice; add to flour mixture. Stir until quite smooth. Beat egg whites stiff, but not dry, fold into first mixture with pineapple tidbits. Drop by tablespoons into deep fat heated to 375 degrees F. and fry until golden brown on one side; turn to brown other side. Makes about 12 fritters or 4 servings.



SUMMER READING

Miss Nellie Ackerson, chairman of the Book Committee of the Manchester Township Library, announces plans for the 1960 Summer Reading Program at the Library, from June 7 through August 12. It will be divided into three divisions this year. Division I is for boys and girls who are in grades 1 through 3 and their books are marked E, J, and their books are marked as OJ.

A child participating in either of these Divisions will register at the library and receive a Reading Record Booklet. The booklet will be filed at the library for convenience during the ten week program and a librarian will record the books as read. After the child has read two books his name will be placed on the Honor Roll.

At the end of the program, the six children in each division who have read the greatest number of books will receive Honorable Mention. Each reader will, however, be limited to not more than four books from his age level of reading, per week.

Division III is for young people who are in seventh grade or above and their books are marked YP. Summer reader credit in this division will be given only on books borrowed from a Selected Reading Shelf. (Other books may be borrowed but will not count toward reading program credit). Each reader's Record Booklet will be filed at the library so that the books may be recorded as returned.

After five books from the Selected Shelf have been read the participant's name will be placed on the Honor Roll. Each participant in this division will be limited to one book per week for credit. The four young people who read the most books in this Division will receive Honorable Mention.

Miss Ackerson also announces that there will be a Story Hour at the Library during the eight weeks that there is Summer Recreation, June 22 through August 10. Story Hour will be on Wednesday afternoon from 2:00 to 3:00 and it will be planned for children from five through eight years old. Mrs. Mabel Pardee is chairman of the Story Hour program.

LIBRARY RULES

Library rules are sometimes confusing, because parents do not know they exist. Mrs. Audley Smith, librarian, has the complete rules posted at the library for all to see, so only a brief resume is given here.

All borrowers must have a library card. Children fourteen and under must have their library cards signed by a parent or guardian.

A child may borrow two books at a time.

A book may be borrowed without charge for two weeks and some books may be renewed at that time for two weeks more.

A fine of 2c per day is charged, for the days that the library is open, for each overdue book.

Library hours are still the same as they have been all year.

WHEAT DISPOSAL DEADLINE DATE SET FOR JUNE 10

Chairman Max M. Kaimbach of the Washtenaw County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee today reminded wheat growers that the deadline for disposing of excess wheat is June 10. That is the date by which the grower who wishes to comply with his 1960 wheat allotment must dispose of any excess acreage.

The grower who brings his acreage for harvest down to this allotment, Kaimbach said, may market his wheat without penalty, is eligible for wheat price support and Conservation Reserve payments and gets credit for acreage diverted from wheat in computing future allotments.

Farmers who have any questions about excess wheat disposal are urged to get in touch with the county ASC office for further information.





MILLAGE FOR ROADS REQUESTED

Washtenaw county tax allocation board was asked at a hearing to grant two-tenths of a mill of the 15-mill property tax for repair and maintenance of streets and roads which suffered damage from the winter breakup this spring. Supervisor E. A. Wolterm, chairman of the board of supervisors put in the request for the millage for the roads. The board has been asked by the county road commission for the emergency appropriation. The county was given a preliminary allocation of 4.25 mills on a tax base of \$650,802,500 recommended by the state tax commission. Any increase in the county's share will automatically decrease the Ann Arbor public schools' share of the 15 mills by a corresponding amount.



SELECTED TO ATTEND WOLVERINE BOYS' STATE
