FIRE LEVELS BARN NEAR BROOKLYN A barn containing a tractor, a few farm tools and a small quantity of hay was destroyed by fire Wednesday afternoon on the Joe Tilden farm, 113 Wamples Lake Rd., about 1 1/2 miles east of Brooklyn.

The roof of the 40 by 40 structure had collapsed before the blaze was discovered by a passing motorist, Mr. Tilden told Brooklyn firemen.

Summoned at 3:35 p. m. from a neighbor's house, firemen were able to save two other buildings, a granary and a chicken coop located within 20 feet of the barn. However, the two buildings were scorched.

Fred Snider, Brooklyn fire chief, estimated the loss, partly covered by insurance, at \$7,000 to \$8,000.

ONLY ONE HURT IN TRAFFIC

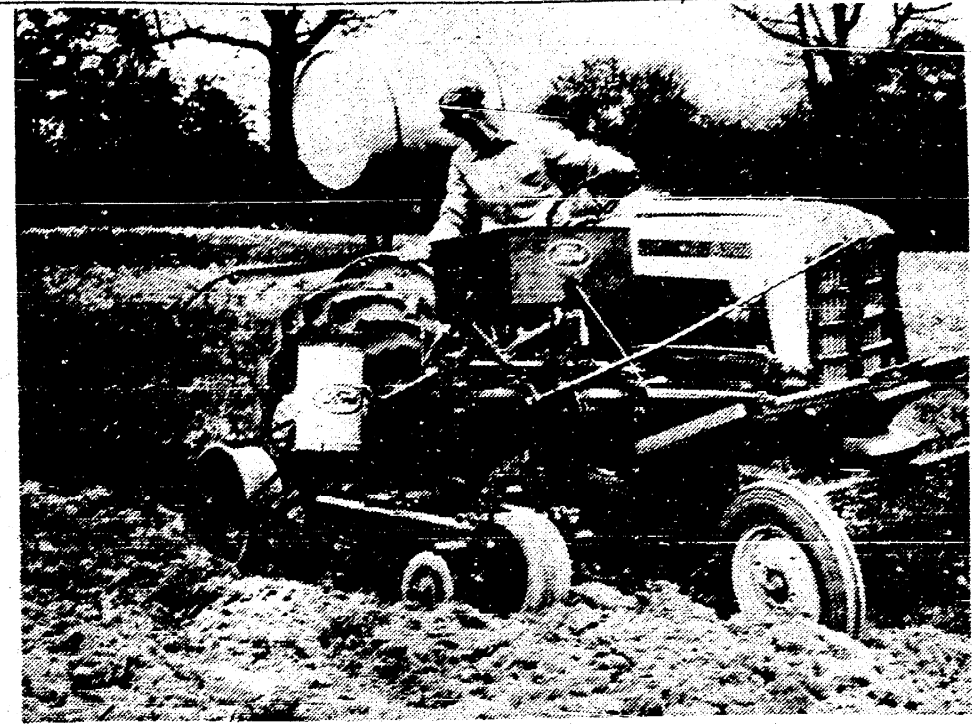
Only one person was reported injured Wednesday in Jackson county traffic.

"Plow-Plant" System Promises Savings

Michigan farmers may soon be able to eliminate three to four trips over their fields by plowing, fertilizing and planting corn and other row crops in a single operation, using experimental equipment now under study at Michigan State and Cornell Universities.

Directed specifically at farmers with small acreages, the "plow-plant" system could make possible the same savings gained by big operators who are now using specialized equipment to cut costs on larger farms. Work started at both Michigan State and Cornell in 1951, and since 1957 the two institutions have been working directly with a major farm implement manufacturer to perfect the new system.

The "plow-plant" rig includes an ordinary farm tractor, a

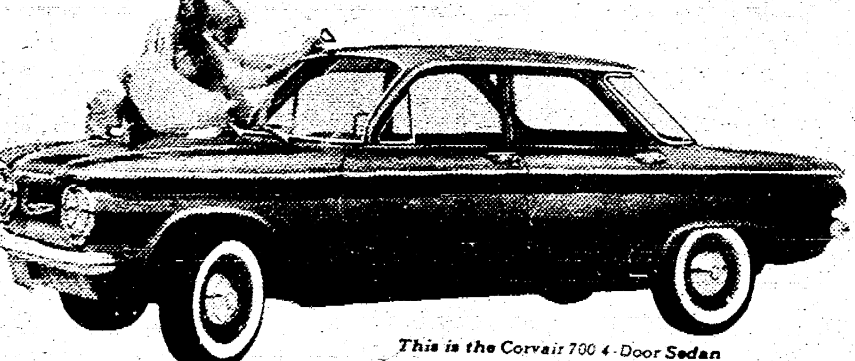

standard three-bottom plow, a standard fertilizer hopper, a subsoiler blade with hydraulic lift and speed control systems, a new equipment inventory, a one row subsoiler blade to be made available commercially.

Although used successfully in the experiments by farmers with more than 150 acres of corn, the system is believed to be more practical for those with less than 75 acres because plowing is done at the beginning of the planting season.

As that time the farmer is one pass over the field, plows for the seed beds, plants, fertilizes and applies a

pre-emergence weed spray. The conventional separate operations of disking, harrowing and plowing after planting are eliminated.

Other benefits beyond labor and operating cost savings have been realized on the experimental farms.

Because the no-tillage earthen spades work even in wet conditions, corn plants stand a better chance of reaching the soil and rooting before being killed by early fall frosts.

By leaving a rough ground surface between the planted rows, the system enables the soil to absorb and hold more moisture during the growing

season and reduces water and wind erosion.

Although not as major as planned, a new and the use of white noise of the new plant experiments are now conducted, the same method for equipment will be used with minor adjustments for most the soil.

**JOBLESS INCREASE**

estimated 5,000 persons—8.1 per cent of a labor force of 69,500—are out of work in Washtenaw county, the Michigan employment security commission has reported.

Some 2,600 are on a two-week layoff from General Motors Fisher Body and Corvair plants in the Ypsilanti area, the MESC said. They are expected back at jobs when 1961 models begin coming off the assembly lines.

This means that an estimated 4.3 per cent of the area labor force—about 3,000 workers—is on longer term joblessness, an increase over a year ago when unemployment stood at 3.8 per cent (2,500 workers) of a worker force of 66,200.

The statistics are cited in a labor force and employment estimates report compiled by the MESC. It shows that the majority of the unemployment is in the automobile manufacturing category with 1,900 employed as compared to 12,600 in May.

NEW STAMP FEATURING "WHEELS OF FREEDOM"

Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield announced today the forth-coming issuance of a 4-cent commemorative stamp honoring the automotive industry. The stamp featuring the theme "Wheels of Freedom" will be placed on first day sale on Saturday, October 15, 1960, in conjunction with the opening of the National Automobile Show in Detroit.

The stamp, to be printed in blue, was designed by New York artist Arnold J. Copeland. Superimposed upon a background of the world are three illustrations centered in a symbolic steering wheel, featuring a passenger car, a tractor and a truck.

The initial print order of these stamps will be 120 million. Further details as to the design will be announced later. Collectors desiring first day cancellations may send addressed envelopes to the Postmaster, Detroit 33, Michigan, with remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed. Each envelope must be marked, in pencil, in the upper right corner indicating the denomination to be affixed, and the number of stamps (singles, pairs, blocks, etc.).

An enclosure of medium weight should be placed in each envelope and the flap either turned in or sealed. The outside envelope to the Postmaster should be clearly marked "First Day Covers 'Wheels of Freedom Stamps.'" Collectors are cautioned to send "Wheels of Freedom" first day cover requests separately. Any orders containing requests for other issues will be returned unreserved by the Postmaster at Detroit, Michigan. Collectors are also cautioned that orders must not include requests for uncancelled stamps.
