

OFFICIAL DETECTIVE STORIES

On September 16, 1958, the body of a young woman, Agnes Whiteside, was found in a wooded glen about a mile and a half from a military installation in the eastern United States. She had been assaulted, and strangled to death. Local police and military police from the camp, by a process of elimination, came to the conclusion that one of the men at the camp had committed the crime. Every man who had a pass that night was investigated. In fact, a thorough check on all men was made—without result.

The killer of Agnes remained Old Simeon Whiteside, Agnes' father, hadn't had a

moment's rest since the crime. He was determined to find the man who murdered his daughter. He made a living doing odd jobs of gardening; his income wasn't much. But he saved his pennies, with one object in view; to hire a private detective to look into

the case. a detective of considerable reputation, state-wide Duncan went to work at once. His first task was to determine how many men still were at the camp, who had been there at the time of the killing. He found that 263 men fit that category. He arranged to interview each of these men separately.

The camp's commander and the military police were only too willing to cooperate. After spending days on the man-byman interviews, Duncan announced to the authorities that a young corporal, Elton Smith, was guilty.

Elton Smith said that on the night of September 16, 1958, he had gone to see the movie, GIGI, at the Star theater in town. Duncan checked and found that GIGI had indeed' played at the Star that night. If Elton Smith had gone to the movie as he said he had, to the only showing that began at 7:00 p.m., he couldn't have committed the crime because Agnes' body was found at quarter to nine that night and the examining Coroner declared that Agnes had been killed only an hour before the body was found. In other words, about a quarter to eight. Hence, Elton Smith, according to his story, couldn't have been near the camp to kill the girl.

Nevertheless, Detective Duncan persisted in his belief of Elton's guilt. Elton was placed under arrest on suspicion of murder. A severe grilling by local and military police finally brought about a confession.

Of the 263 men Detective Duncan interviewed, how could he be sure that Elton Smith and not any of the others had murdered Agnes? Solution can be found elsewhere in

JUST BETWEEN US SPORTSMEN - by Joe Bates, Jr., Guest Columnist

Luck has very little to do with success in fishing. In the long run, it's knowledge and skill that count. An important part of the catches a lot of fish, but it gets knowledge is in knowing where the fish should be (and how deep they should be), plus what types of lures to use, and how to use

Fish seek shelter, whether it be a weed bed or stump in a lake, or a submerged rock in the current of a stream. If the shelter is near a food supply, so much the better. Weed beds and gravel bars provide food, so we look for fish there. Currents bring food downstream, so we find fish in protected spots in or

near currents.

Since fish need oxygen, we rarely find them in backwaters, or in ponds containing too much decayed vegetation. They prefer moving currents in streams, or spots in lakes or ponds where wave action adds oxygen to the

Fish also seek comfortable temperatures. When the water is too warm or too cold near the surface, chances are that they of places above mentioned. Adding all this together gives us a good idea of where to fish, and where not to.

Too many lures are made to please the fisherman, rather than the fish. A few well selected lures are better than a whole tackle box of inefficient ones. Take plugs, for instance. Why pay good dollars for a big collection, when a few can do the vork of many?



can do the work of many is the famous "Diamond Jim", which was developed by men who really know their fishing. The "Dia-mond Jim" can be fished near the surface or deep down. It does the work of every kind o plug except a popper — and it can be fished so near the surface that a popper rarely is neces-

Apple Butter - Spreads 'N Fillings



In bygone days, it was common practice to cook apple butter for six or eight hours. The recipe given below doesn't take so long because the quantity is smaller and less cider is used. If you can come by sweet cider, substitute apple juice plus 4 or 5 drops of rec

minutes, or until brown as liked.

To Make Apple Butter—Wash, drain and slice 6 pounds (about ½ peck) tart apples into kettle. Add 1 pint cider and cook until apples are mushy. Press apples and juice through sieve to remove skin and seed. Boil apples until thick, then add 1½ teaspoons ground cinnamon, ½ teaspoon each cloves and salt and from 1 to 3 cups sugar, brown or white, to suit your taste. The general rule is ¾ cup sugar to 1 cup sieved apple, but you may prefer more or less. Cook mixture until thick enough to round up in spoon. Watch it! Takes a heap of stirring to prevent sticking and scorching. But-
