MISSION FESTIVAL AT BETHEL FREEDOM TOWNSHIP
 The Annual Mission Festival will be observed at Bethel Church, Freedom Township, with services at 10 a.m. and 8 p.m. on Sunday, September 18th. Two speakers will represent separate types of work which are of great concern to the church at the present time. The speaker at the morning service will be Rev. Rudolph W. Raber, pastor of Hough Avenue United Church at Cleveland, Ohio. Mr. Raber is a native of North Dakota, and attended Elmhurst College and Eden Theological Seminary. For several years he was associated with Caroline Mission in St. Louis. Since 1952 he has worked in his present inner city mission project in Cleveland. This year he is also serving as Acting Secretary for Cultural Relation on the Council for Christian Social Action of the United Church of Christ. This past summer Mr. Raber was chosen to lead some of the opening devotions at the General Synod of the United Church of Christ where a new constitution was recommended to be voted on by the Congregational Christian Churches and the Evangelical and Reformed Church. ATTENDING CONVENTION IN CHICAGO
 Mrs. Hollie Ayres of the Manchester Frozen Food Locker is, this week, attending the National Convention of Locker and Freezer Provisioners, Chicago, Illinois. The convention, which is being staged in the Hotel Sherman, Chicago, is the 21st annual meeting of the National Institute of Locker and Freezer Provisioners. Highlights of the big national meeting include a special session on "portion control" with over 80 different exhibits of industry supplies, equipment, and merchandise; and talks, demonstrations, and reports by industry leaders and government officials.
