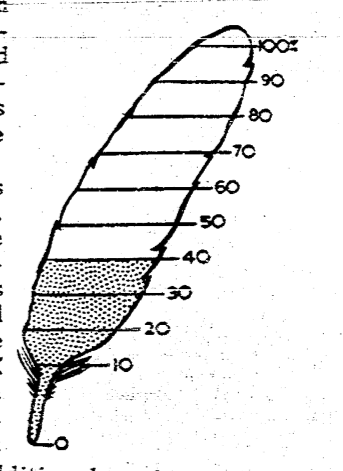

**IT WILL COST COUNTY \$11,602 TO JOIN REGIONAL BOARD**

ORDINANCE NO. 55

Village of Manchester Traffic Code

An ordinance to repeal Ordinance No. 39, as amended of the Village of Manchester, and to adopt by reference the "Uniform Traffic Code for Townships, and Villages" which has promulgated by the Commissioner of the State Police, and compiled under the supervision of the Secretary of State for the State of Michigan, made effective February 14, 1958, which is a code to define the duty and authority of the Chief of Police and officers of the police department to administer and regulate traffic within the boundaries of the Village of Manchester; to set forth the responsibility of all persons to obey traffic regulations; to authorize the placing of traffic control devices and to set forth the meaning of signals emitted from these devices; to define the rights and duties of drivers and others; to regulate the operation of bicycles, motorcycles, and by vehicles; to define pedestrians' rights and duties; to regulate stopping, standing, and parking; and to provide penalties for violation of the provisions of said code.

THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ORDAINS: 1. That Ordinance No. 39, Ordinance No. 49, and Ordinance No. 52, be and hereby are repealed. 2. That under the authority of Act 62, Public Acts of 1956, the "Uniform Traffic Code for Cities, Townships, and Villages" as promulgated by the Commissioner of the State Police, and compiled under the supervision of the Secretary of State, made effective February 14, 1958, is hereby adopted by reference as if each and all of the regulations, provisions, penalties, conditions, and terms of said document were fully set out in the ordinance.

3. That this ordinance shall become effective 20 days after its enactment. 4. The foregoing ordinance was adopted at a regular meeting of the Council of the Village of Manchester, held at the Village Hall, in said Village, on October 17, 1960. Said ordinance and a notice setting forth the purpose of said code and the fact complete copies of the code are available at the office of the Village Clerk were ordered published in the Manchester Enterprise, a newspaper having general circulation in the Village of Manchester, within one week after its passage, and was so published October 20, 1960.
