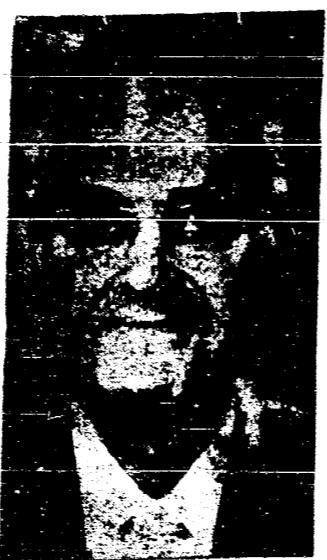

NEW YORK — Singer Kate Smith warned today that American newspapers, magazines and TV are creating a spinner complex among modern women.

"Our society is far too insistent on marriage as a mark of success," she says in her autobiography in the current (October) issue of McCall's. "This attitude not only necessitates a defensive attitude in the unmarried, but also tends to rush young people into marriage before they are fully prepared for it."

She criticizes newspapers, magazines and TV for their "exhortations to dance your life away" in search of parties, fun and a husband.

"Many a frightened, immature single woman actually fears unhappiness long before it comes," she writes, "because she has been conditioned to expect to be happy. She fears loneliness as the curse of being single; she forgets that a married woman can be just as alone as she is."

She states that actually there are many women who should not marry — "women who are gifted, and every ambitious, and those who are extremely self-centered, and those who are domineering and aggressive."

"These are the women who usually have some strong interests of their own and therefore should make a career of them; they should be emotionally independent enough to face life alone."

"A woman should have a career or a marriage, but not both... It seems to me that very few women who want to do justice to a career can also do justice to marriage."

OLD TIME MANCHESTER RECIPES

MEAT CAKES

Chop any kind of fresh cold meats very fine. Season with salt and pepper. Make a nice batter. Lay a spoonful of batter on the griddle, which must be buttered to prevent sticking, then a spoonful of chopped meat, and then a second spoonful of batter.

When browned on one side, turn carefully and brown the other. It makes a palatable breakfast dish if served hot.

ORANGE JELLY

Make a syrup with one pint of water and one pound loaf sugar. Boil with the thin rind of four oranges and two lemons.

Skim carefully and add juice of eight oranges. Let it boil about 20 minutes. Skim and add the juice of a lemon and gelatine dissolved in half pint of water and clarified with whites of eggs.

Peel a couple of sweet oranges, coring them to eliminate pips, and cut them in thin slices. Proceed to fill the mold.

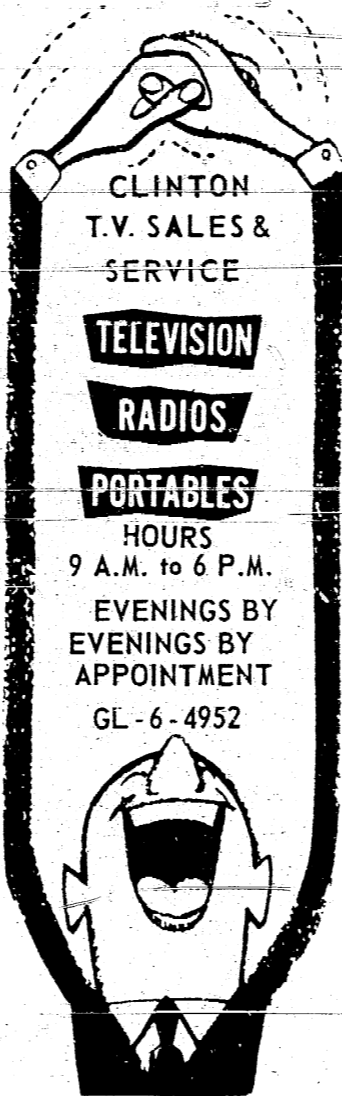

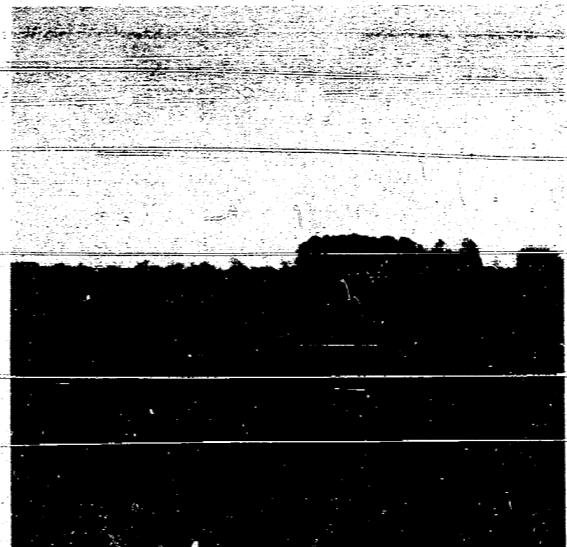

WELKER W. FIRST DIES AFTER LONG ILLNESS

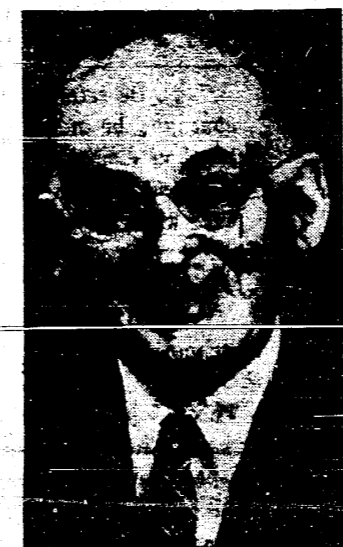
