HOMECOMING GAME FRIDAY

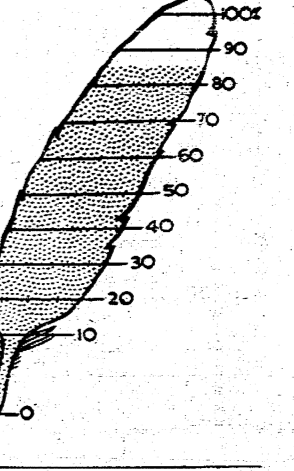
Manchester's homecoming queen will be announced at a special pep assembly Friday afternoon and will be crowned by football captains, Jerry Creech and Bob Nickerson.

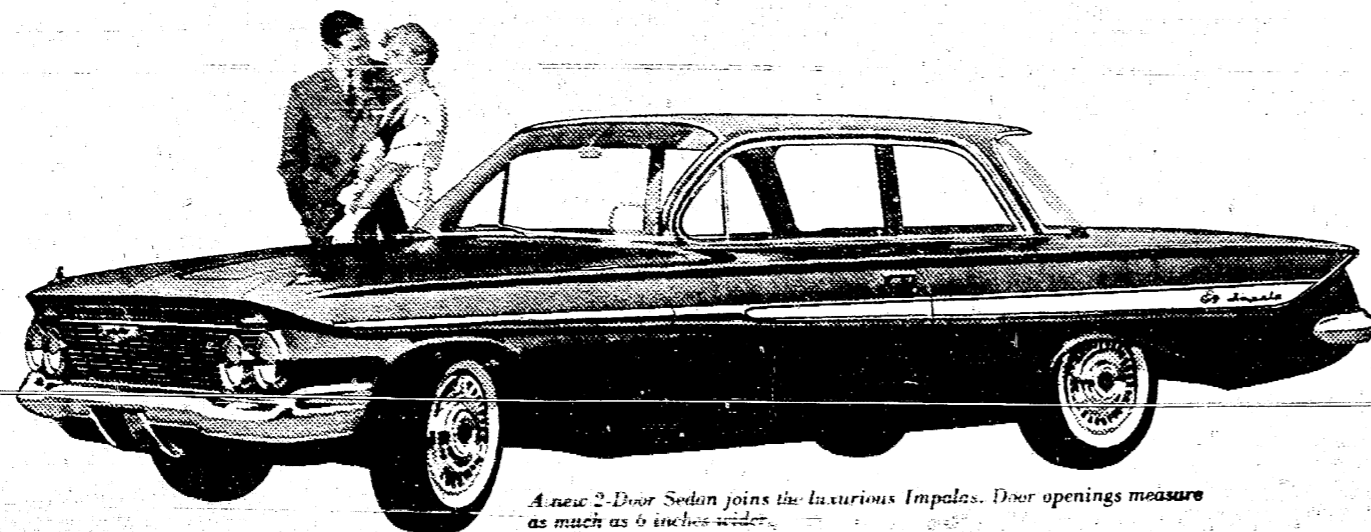

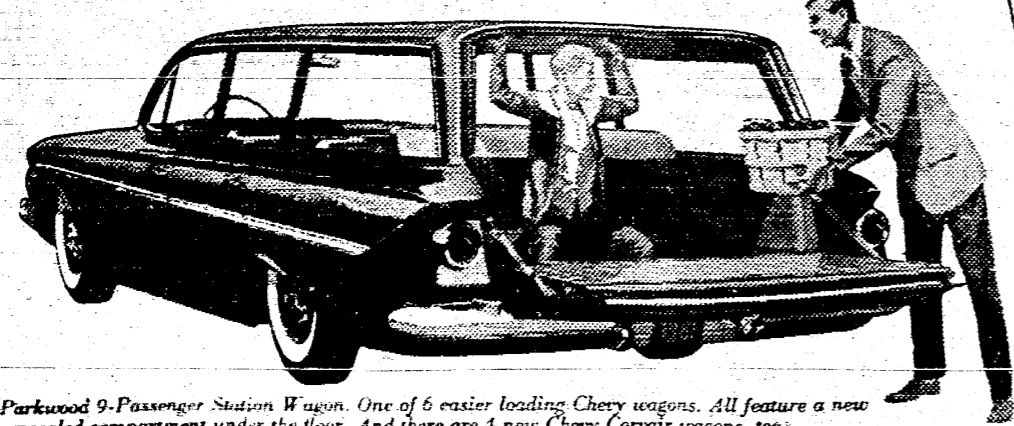

MANCHESTER LIBRARY OBSERVES NATIONAL EDUCATION WEEK

Manchester Township Library observes National Education Week with new books and an invitation to adult public, especially, to visit the library this week, November 6 through 12.

Manchester adults may not be aware of the numerous new books available at their local library or the changed atmosphere of the building with its recent redecorating and repair. Now is the time to get in the habit of reading during wintertime leisure periods. Periodicals are also available for borrowing as well as books.

Three best sellers were added to the list this week—"The Lovely Ambition", a novel by Mary Ellen Chase "Mistress of Mellyn", a romantic novel of suspense by Victoria Hold, and "Bom Free", a most remarkable animal story by Joy Adamson which was recently reviewed in "Life" magazine.

Education Week is announced to the student by the addition of three outstanding reading as well as historical study. These are "America Grows Up," and "America Moves Forward." The series was written by Gerald W. Johnson a distinguished journalist and authority on history. These books were purchased especially for teen-age history students, but adults will find them most entertaining for fast reading.

Classics are usually passed up by the student because of the unattractive ancient volumes available. Two new editions of stand-by reading "Kidnapped" by Robert Louis Stevenson and "The Last of the Mohicans" by James Fenimore Cooper have been added to the Young Peoples collection. For historical background reading there is "The Winter at Valley Forge" a Lendmark book by F.V. W. Mason "Ticonderoga—the Story of a Fort" by Bruce Lancaster and "Washington and the Revolution" by Lynn Montross.

New books will be announced each week with special attention November 13 through 19 for younger children during Book Week. Library hours, which have remained the same for over a year, are posted on the sign in front of the library. They are: Tuesday, Thursday and Friday from 1 to 5, 5; Wednesday, from 1 to 5 and 7 to 9 in the evening, and Saturday, 9:30 to 12:30.

A glimpse of our files tells us that during the second week of September, 1881, the following events were occurring in our village:

Louis Koebe threatened with horse power 100 bushels of wheat in 70 minutes. Youngsters were planning a nutting expedition. The sidewalk in front of Hoeussler's Drug store was being repaired. James A. Field was planning a deer hunt in the north-wood. The Methodist church planned a picnic at Short's Grove Bridgewater, for Saturday.

The iron clad liquor law went into effect and, the Enterprise reported, there were nearly 700 convicts at the Michigan State Prison, Jackson. At Grass Lake, the new town hall was fast approaching completion, and it was reported that S.D. Felt had shipped 3,500 sheep to Kansas. And at Sharon, in the vicinity of the church and town hall, residents were considerably excited over the appearance of a new

and dangerously looking worm, and in such quantities as to seem truly alarming. Carr's cider mill is doing a rushing business. John Koch is having a large number of barrels filled there. (Ed. Note: John Koch was the proprietor of the local brewery.) A number of our democratic citizens went to Sharon yesterday afternoon to assist in raising a pole at Schulte's corners.
