### NEW DIRECTORIES TO BE DISTRIBUTED

New combined telephone directories for Ann Arbor, Manchester, Ypsilanti and six other neighboring towns will be delivered this week according to Nicholas J. Prakken, manager of Michigan Bell Telephone Company.

The combined area directory includes listings for Ann Arbor, Chelsea, Dexter, Manchester, Whitmore Lake, Willis and Ypsilanti, and contains a Yellow Page section of combined classified listings for all these communities.

The new directory replaces the individual directories that formerly have been issued for these towns. The appearance of the new book is a decided change from previous ones, Prakken pointed out. Ann Arbor listings, on white pages are followed by the neighboring towns on blue paper, followed by Ypsilanti on white. The combined Yellow pages make up the remainder of the directory and the cover is buff in color he said.

The new directory was compiled as the result of an area wide survey of telephone customers conducted by Market Opinion Research Co. of Detroit. It was decided the survey should be taken after Ypsilanti customers felt their social and commercial ties are more closely related to Ann Arbor, Prakken said.

In addition to the seven communities already mentioned, Michigan Bell also is including South Lyon and Saline in the blue-page section only. The latter is included because it is being added to the Ann Arbor local calling area on January 15, 1961, Prakken said.

The new directory arrangement does not change in any way any communities local calling privileges, he noted, adding that when the new directories are delivered to the area homes and business establishments, the distributor will pick up the old telephone books.

### HFAA ANNOUNCES PRODUCTION RECORD

The Holstein-Friesian Association of America announces the completion of an outstanding official production record by a registered Holstein cow in this area.

Leo Bur Invincible Nancy 3942650 owned by Leonard Burmeister, Ann Arbor, produced 14,221 lbs. milk and 648 lbs. butterfat in 348 days on twice daily milking as a 5 year old.

Michigan State University supervised the weighing and testing of production as a part of the official herd testing programs of the national Holstein organization. These programs provide continuing lactation and lifetime production records on every cow in more than 2,600 participating registered Holstein Herds.

### AYRSHIRE MAKES 100,000 POUNDS OF MILK

Taylorcraft Carolyn Sue, a registered 11 year old Ayrshire cow owned by Paul E. Taylor, Saline, Michigan, has produced over 50 tons of milk. She has accumulated a lifetime production record to date of 107,749 pounds of milk and 4155 pounds of butterfat. This is equivalent to 50, 115 quarts which at \$20 a quart would be valued at \$10,025.00.

In attaining the "Fifty Ton Club", Taylorcraft Carolyn Sue milked 2609 days, or an average of 41 pounds per day. This outstanding cow emphasizes the inherent longevity of the Ayrshire cow and her persistent production ability.

### REPORT FROM STATE POLICE

Summary of Activities for November 1960, Clinton Post.

Number of Men Assigned 14, Complaints Investigated 86, Total Arrests, 195, Verbal Warnings to Motorists 274, Assists to Motorists 39, Cars Investigated 213, Property Inspections 123, Liquor Inspections 24, Public Relations Programs 3.

In comparison of the traffic accidents for the month of November, 1960, as with November, 1959 showed a decrease of six accidents. During the month of November, 1959, officers investigated a total of 33 accidents, 25 of which were property damage, and 8 personal injury. During the month of November 1960, officers investigated a total of 27 accidents, of which 17 were property damage and 10 personal injury. 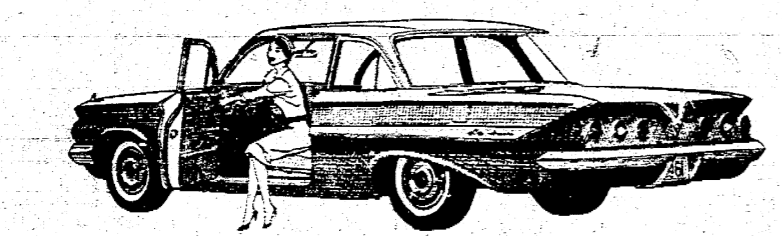

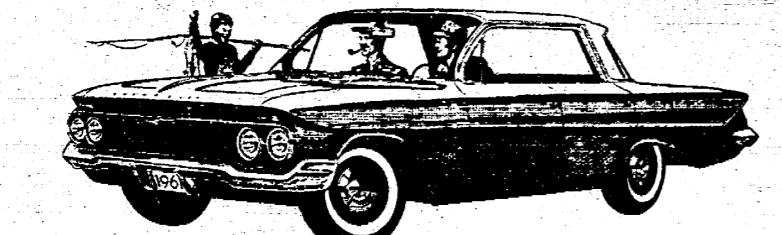

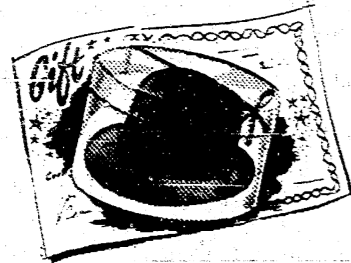

When fed free choice, hogs tend to overeat either corn or protein—slower growth and higher cost of gain result. Improved performance usually offsets the extra cost of preparing a mixed ration.

**PREVENT SELF-FED EWES FROM GETTING TOO FAT.** Normal self-fed ewes tend to eat too much and gain more than necessary. During early gestation, use a ration containing 70% ground corn cobs. Later in the gestation period and during lambing, more shelled corn and less corn cob can be fed. Ewes will maintain their weight and bloom without getting fat.

**TIMBER CAN GIVE EXTRA FARM INCOME.** Maintain a vigorous, healthy woodland by cutting out all overmature, defective and low quality trees. Trim and remove defective branches from remaining trees. This practice will allow more young trees to grow and flourish, making your woodland a greater potential farm crop in future years. Ask your county agent for farm woodland management advice.

**PROLONG TRACTOR TIRE LIFE** by maintaining proper inflation pressure. Check tire pressure every two or three weeks. Most tire manufacturers now recommend 14 pounds pressure for rear tires. 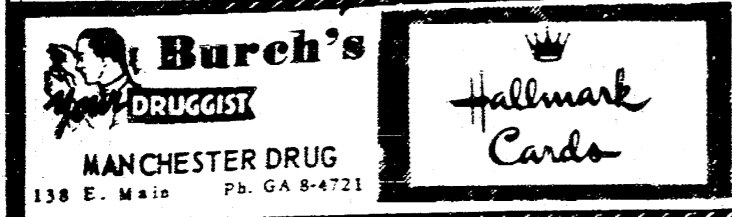
