COUNTY ROAD FATALITIES TO TOP 1959

The number of fatal traffic accidents this year in Washtenaw county will exceed the total for 1959. This statement will hold true of the county if you believe statistics. So far in the 11 months of 1960, there have been 33 highway deaths in the county. This number equals the total for all of 1959.
 With snow, icy roads and bad driving conditions expected in the next 30 days, area law officials say it is "A 100 to 1 shot" against the county completing the year without at least one more traffic death.
 In the past five years, 214 persons have been killed in traffic accidents in Washtenaw county, an average of 42 per year. The county's all time high is included in this period.
 Officials believe that the total will not reach the 1956 total but it is believed that the total will be about 40. Last year there had been 30 fatal deaths by Nov. 30.
 In 1958 when there were 46 deaths, there had been 40 by this time.
 In studying the figures authorities agreed that area residents became so alarmed about the high death rate that they embarked in personal programs of safe driving throughout the following year.

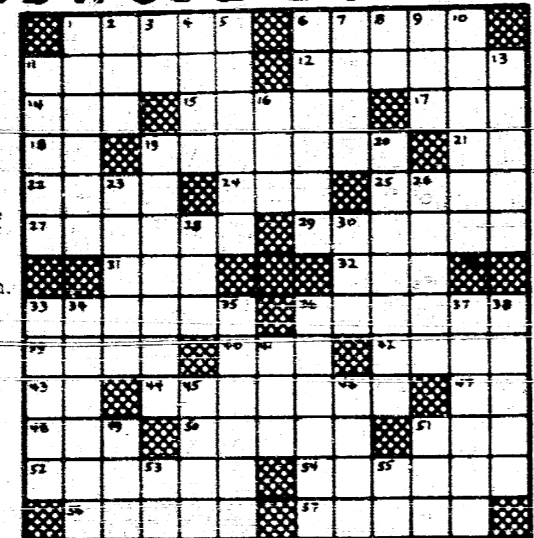
WASHTENAW COUNTY 4-H WINNERS

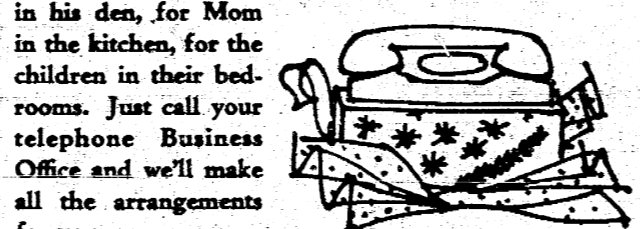

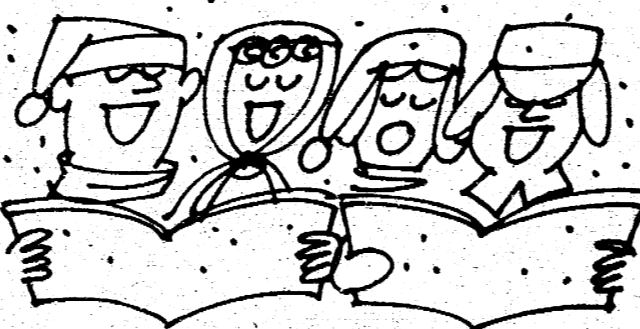

POINTS BURNED? CHECK SPACING

When installing breaker points in the distributor, keep in mind that correct spacing is very important to long point life.

If points are spaced too closely together (too much cam angle), burned contacts will result. If points are spaced too far apart (too little cam angle), ignition failure may result at high speeds.

LEAN CARBURETOR MAY CAUSE SPARK PLUG MISFIRING

If you're encountering spark plug misfiring while accelerating from low to high speed under full throttle. Why? Because voltage requirements are highest at this time and because the lean mixture requires more voltage to spark the plugs' gaps.

If the voltage required to fire the plugs is higher than the coil, spark plug misfiring will occur.

FALLOUT SHELTER PLANS CANCELLED

Civil Defense Director Gerald G. Miller has been informed that plans for building two prototype fallout shelters in Washenaw county have been cancelled by state and federal CD officials.

One of the shelters was to have been built in Ann Arbor and opened to the public to show how such a structure is constructed and encourage the building of fallout shelters at private homes.

A second shelter was to be of a new type steel construction which was to be built at an undecided location in the county for research and demonstrations including the sealing of a selected family in the shelter for a number of days.

State CD officials in Lansing and federal officials in Battle Creek were doubtful that funds would become available later to carry out the projects.

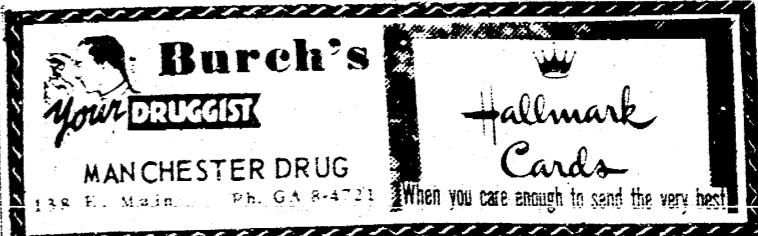

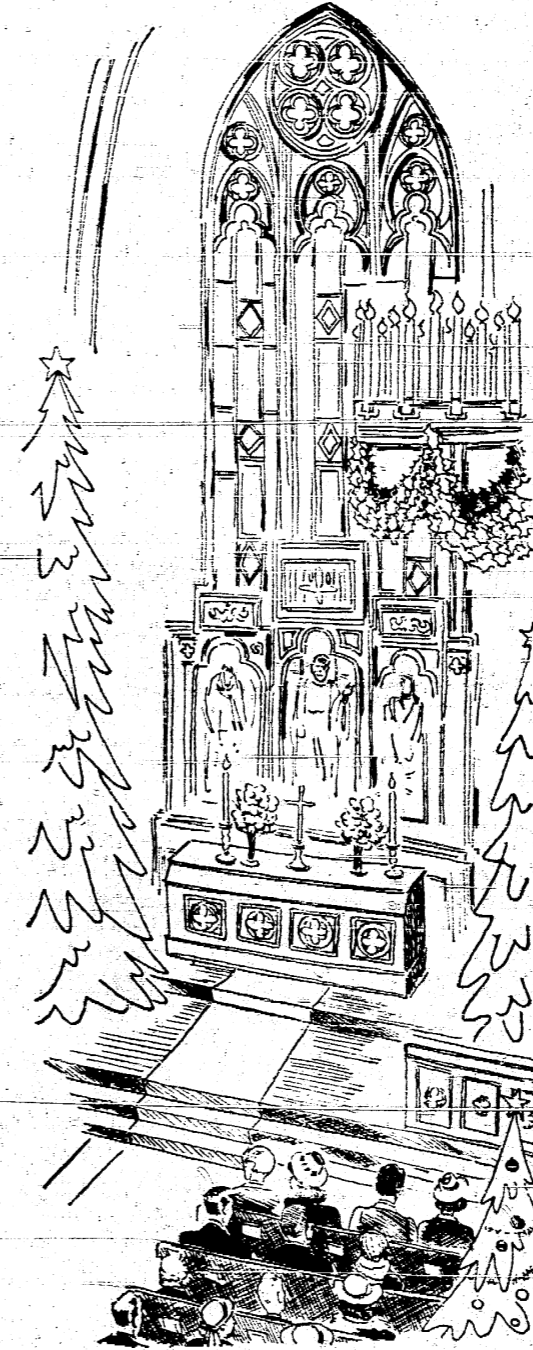

"In an auspicious corner, near a warming hearth, the Good Book rests on a small oaken stand."

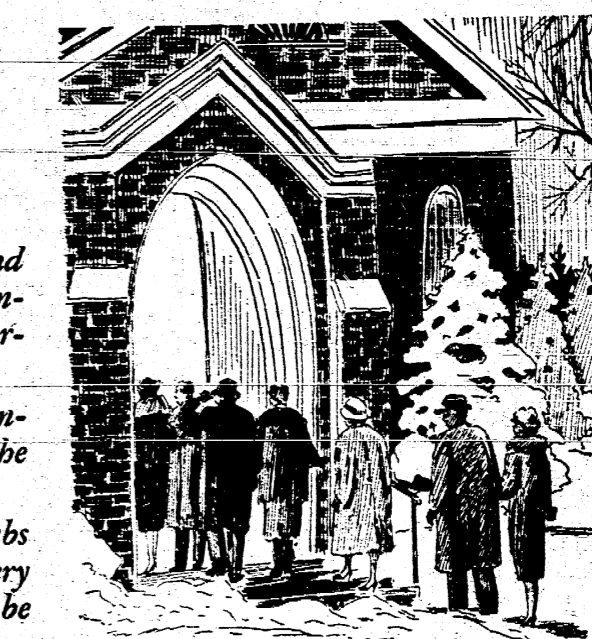
